Update on the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (Derek Priddy and Gwen Palmer)	D=Derek Priddy, coordinator shared handouts and other educational materials to member present. Guidelines for Pediatricians were sent out regarding mandated testing for Medicare. Treatment is to remove the lead from the environment. Military currently provides testing to all kids.	A= The program is working on letting public know about the program and when to get tested for lead poisoning. The goal is to increase compliance, currently the compliance is around 30%.

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SHSP Occupant Protection Data Overview (Kari Benes)	<p>D=10 year review of fatalities, seat belt use rate and unrestrained occupant fatalities explained. Overview of protective factors of restraints, 99% of those in crashes who were restrained were not ejected from vehicle; and majority using restraints at time of crash did not sustain apparent injury. In comparison, those who did not wear a restraint at time of crash, sustained a fatal injury.</p> <p>Age distribution of unrestrained occupants who were fatality injured, 51% were between 16-30 yrs of age, more men than women were fatally injured, and more often at night (65%) occurred at night.</p>	A=SHSP update process will include: strategy progress, strategy consolidation, data review.
