



Champ Camp Communicable Disease Plan (CDP)



Purpose Statement

The Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation (AARBF) prides itself on providing a safe and healthy environment in which burn survivors, volunteers, and staff can come together to meet the mission and objectives of the organization. When communicable illness presents itself, it can negatively impact the mission and objectives in unforeseen ways. This Communicable Disease Plan outlines prevention, response, recovery, and mitigation policies and procedures to lower the impact of a communicable disease on programs. Some policies and procedures are subject to change depending on the rate of transmission, severity of symptoms, and availability of treatment for a disease.

For the purpose of this document, when describing Campers, Parents, and Staff, they will encompass the following:

- Campers: All Campers and Counselors In Training (CIT'S) as identified in the Champ Camp Manual
- Parents: Any legal guardian of a Camper
- Staff: Any Counselor, Program Staff, Support Staff, Medical Staff, and Foundation, paid or volunteer, as identified in the Champ Camp Manual.
- It is understood that, at times, some staff members are given approval for their children to be on site for certain programs. It is understood, for the purpose of this document, that all Staff children and their childcare must meet all of the same guidelines as those identified as "Staff" or what is identified as age appropriate. (i.e. A staff member's child shall meet the guidelines set forth for campers).
- The Communicable Disease Plan Team (CDP Team) consists of the following: Medical staff, Camp Director, Foundation Representative, Operations Manager, and Board Representative.

PREVENTION

It is the highest priority to provide for a safe and healthy environment for all who attend programs for AARBF. Prevention is the first step in ensuring this. Proper education and identification of illness is crucial for a safe and healthy program. The process identified in this section will outline the necessary steps that must be followed in order to participate in any program. AARBF reserves the right not to admit anyone who poses a communicable disease risk to others.

AARBF requests that all individuals arrive at camp healthy, free of any symptoms of illness . If any individual is showing signs of a communicable disease, we ask that they receive proper medical attention. AARBF reserves the right to not admit an individual until healthy.

Pre-Camp ([A Healthy Camp Begins and Ends at Home](#))

Screening

- Pre-screening
 - All staff and campers attending camp are required to complete the health history form within the registration process before arriving at camp. This information is reviewed and used by the camp nurses when caring for and treating staff and campers for illnesses and diseases.
 - All campers are required to have a physical exam completed by a physician and submit the paperwork with their registration.
 - All staff and campers should self-screen for the presence of symptoms of a communicable disease for 14 days before arriving at camp.

- Initial screening
 - Medical Staff will conduct an initial screening with each staff and camper when they arrive to camp. This screening includes a lice check, confirmation of health information, and discussing medications.
 - See additional screening related to COVID-19 in the attached Addendum.

During Camp

AARBF takes seriously the well-being of every camper and staff member. Therefore, anyone with symptoms of a virus or illness will not be able to remain with the general population of camp sessions and will be placed in isolation until arrangements can be made for them to be taken home.

Health Parameters

- Ongoing screening
 - All staff and campers will be monitored daily for symptoms of communicable diseases.
 - See additional screening related to COVID-19 in the attached Addendum.

Preventing Spread

- Healthy Practices at Camp
 - We will diligently pursue healthy practices at camp through:
 - Hand Hygiene
 - Communicable diseases can pass person to person through contact. An individual's hands are one of the most common culprits and should be consistently cleaned to lower the spread of a disease.
 - All staff and campers will be encouraged to wash their hands for at least 30 seconds with soap and water:
 - Before eating food.
 - After being in contact with someone who is sick.
 - After touching frequently touched surfaces.
 - After using the restroom.
 - After using common items, such as activity and sports equipment.
 - After coughing, sneezing, or blowing your nose.
 - Hand sanitizer will be located around camp for hand cleaning when soap and water are not accessible.
 - Cover your cough or sneeze into your arm
 - Don't touch your face
 - "Toes to Nose"
 - All individuals will not be allowed to have their heads at the same end of the bed as the bunk next to, or above or below them.
 - Physical Distancing
 - Depending on the contagiousness of a disease, social and physical distancing procedures may be implemented into camp programming. These procedures will be determined by recommendations from health and governing agencies.
 - Common area bathrooms will be cleaned, sanitized, and maintained by EWonder Valley Staff in accordance with current health guidelines.

Camp Staff (All Program Staff and Volunteers)

- Our camp staff will be trained to make sure that daily best cleaning practices are observed to keep the safety of our camp as the highest priority throughout each day. We will also make an effort to have an appropriate number of professional medical workers on hand to serve the needs of our campers and staff in the best possible manner.

- Self-Monitoring
 - Our staff will do daily checks within their cabin to make sure they don't show any symptoms (ie. cough, sore throat, fever, chills, vomiting, ect.) are getting enough rest, hydrating well, and physically able to participate in the day's activities.

Cleaning & Disinfection

- Cleaning and disinfection practices will differ for different areas and equipment. In general, cleaning and disinfection will happen multiple times throughout a day in common use areas, and daily for activity area equipment.
- In the event of some type of incident (ie. bathroom accident, vomit, an injury involving blood, etc.) additional cleaning will be done in the area of the incident.

Training

- Staff will be trained on preventing spread and illness reducing strategies, cleaning and disinfection, and their role in the response plan to cases.
- Staff will provide campers with training on proper handwashing and other illness reducing strategies.

Communication

- Foundation staff will communicate to campers and parents, informing them of the screening process, safety measures, and the Communicable Disease Plan.
- Program staff will communicate with counselors, informing them of safety measures, the Communicable Disease Plan and other educational resources, as well as any changes to camp policies and procedures.

INTERVENTION

Outbreak Occurs

In the event of a suspected case of a communicable disease in the camp community:

1. The individual will be taken to the infirmary for care.
2. The camp Medical Staff will triage the patient to identify the individual's symptoms and the possible illness.
3. If the illness is not communicable or a danger to the rest of the camp community, the individual will receive necessary care and return to their group or position when deemed safe by Medical Staff. as soon as possible.
4. If the illness cannot be identified or is identified as a communicable disease, the individual will be isolated in the infirmary or other designated isolation room. The camp

Medical Staff will contact the Camp Director and Foundation representative having authority. The Camp Director or Foundation representative having authority will then contact the family of the infected individual.

5. The individual will be removed from the camp by camp staff or their family and taken to receive further medical attention. When a diagnosis is confirmed, this information will be given to the camp.

In the event that a suspected case of a communicable disease is confirmed:

1. Staff and campers who were in contact with the infected individual will be checked for symptoms, monitored daily for symptoms, and isolated from other staff and campers.
2. The areas used by the infected individual will be closed off, cleaned, and disinfected. Communication will be sent to families with information about the illness and next steps.
3. Camp programming will continue for any unaffected staff members and campers.
4. If other individuals begin to show symptoms, they will be immediately isolated and removed from camp as soon as possible to receive further medical attention.
5. As the outbreak progresses, the Camp Director and Foundation representative having authority will make decisions regarding the feasibility of continuing camp.

RECOVERY/MITIGATION

Resolution

Assuming the control measures were effective, the number of new cases will eventually start to decline. The length of time these control measures need to be implemented will be determined by the communicable disease. Control measures should not be removed too soon due to the danger of the re-emergence of the disease. Camp staff will be in contact with local health officials for assistance in this area.

All records and reports of the outbreak should be properly processed. Debriefing with the staff should be done as a group and individually. With all this information about the outbreak and response, the Communicable Disease Plan should be evaluated and updated.

Fatigue in staff after the outbreak is over is expected. Rest and recovery time for staff will be given over time and for the necessary amount of time.

- Communicable Disease Plan Team evaluation
 - Provide critical incident debriefing, review all operational activities to determine effectiveness and identify potentials for change, and update policy/procedures.
- Documentation
 - Confirm completion of documentation by all required individuals – medical staff, Director, Program Staff, Foundation Staff, Wonder Valley, etc.
 - AARBF Should receive copies of all documentation for Foundation records.
- Debrief Camp and facilitate return-to-camp practices

- Foundation staff and the Camp Director will listen to experiences of all staff and campers who wish to share their experience. Allow time for staff rest and recuperation.
- Update/revise staff, parent and camper materials to more effectively address CDP

Addendum to the Communicable Disease Plan for COVID-19

March 1, 2021

COVID-19 is a respiratory illness caused by a virus that can spread from person to person and currently the most effective form of protection is limiting spread. As a result, the Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation will implement the following guidelines, adapted from recommendations given by the CDC and American Camp Association.

Screening

- Pre-Screening
 - The following pre-screening procedures will be required for individuals attending camp for overnight programming:
 - Self-screening by taking and recording their own temperature as well as monitoring for the presence of symptoms (fever of 100.4°F or greater, cough, shortness of breath, diarrhea, fatigue, headache, muscle aches, nausea, loss of taste or smell, sore throat, vomiting, etc.) for 14 days before arriving at camp using the pre-screening form provided by the camp.
 - Determining if the individual has traveled nationally or internationally within 14 days before arriving at camp.
 - Determining if the individual has been in close contact with a person who has been diagnosed with, tested for, or quarantined as a result of a communicable disease within 14 days before arriving at camp.
 - Anybody attending camp will need proof of a negative COVID -19 test from three days prior to camp and are then encouraged to isolate to the best of their abilities from that point until arriving at camp. Staff will not be allowed at camp and campers will not be allowed on the bus/van without proof of a negative COVID-19.
 - All staff and campers will be encouraged to refrain from high exposure activities for 14 days prior to arriving at camp.
- Initial Screening

- Additional screening procedures when arriving to camp and at the pick up location include:
 - Checking each individual's temperature.
 - Asking questions about possible symptoms of COVID-19.
 - Asking questions about contact with other individuals who have been diagnosed with, tested for, or quarantined as a result of COVID-19.
 - Asking questions about each individual's traveling.
- Camp staff will work with the Fresno County Office of Health to provide on site testing for COVID-19 prior to camp beginning or at the pick up locations prior to our campers traveling.
- Ongoing Screening
 - Trained staff will provide screenings each morning including a temperature check and asking questions about possible symptoms for individuals in overnight programming.
 - Any individual who becomes sick or develops symptoms of COVID-19 will be removed from camp activities immediately and triaged by medical staff. If Medical staff determines that a test is needed, they will first isolate the individual, then administer a Rapid test to the individual. If the Rapid test comes back positive, we will contact Fresno County Department of Public Health and then determine the proper method of transportation home for the individual. The confirmed diagnosis of the sickness should be reported to the camp staff. If the test comes back negative, medical staff will recommend the best steps to care for the individual and determine if/when the individual can return to camp activities. Additionally, all members of the Family Group will be monitored for symptoms as well.
- Cohorts (Family Groups)
 - Participants will be assigned to a cabin with no more than five campers and two counselors. Three cabins (no more than 21 people) will be grouped together and considered a family group. Therefore, we will keep these groups together for activities throughout the week. Masks will be used whenever possible, but will not always be required in this cohort.
 - We will protect the camp through eliminating visitors unless absolutely necessary. Anyone who leaves campus will need to be screened again for any symptoms of COVID-19 before being allowed on campus.
 - Cloth masks will be distributed for use daily. New masks will be distributed by counselors each morning. Each day will be a new color for easy verification.
 - Mask usage will be required when inside a building (other than in their own cabin) and physical distancing of 6 feet cannot be maintained.
 - Ventilation guidelines require that the HVAC fans will be constantly running

while participants are inside.

Preventing Spread

- Hand Hygiene
 - Staff and campers will be taught to wash their hands using these steps:
 - Wet your hands with clean, running water.
 - Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Make sure to lather the back of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
 - Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds (about the time it takes to sing “Just Hang Loose” twice).
 - Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.
 - Dry your hands using a clean paper towel.
 - Use a paper towel to turn off the faucet.
 - Additional hand washing and hand sanitizer stations will be set up throughout camp for increased frequency of hand cleaning.
 - Hand sanitizing will be required before and after each activity.
 - Posters on how to properly wash hands will be placed throughout camp both in English and Spanish.
- Physical Distancing
 - Campers will be placed into family groups, or cohorts, along with volunteer staff. These groups will not change throughout the week and will not mix with other family groups. Groups will stay at least 6 feet apart from other groups.
 - When groups are not able to stay 6 feet apart or when a group is interacting with a staff member who is outside their family group, masks will be worn by both staff and campers.
 - Family groups will be assigned together for each activity throughout the week as to reduce contact with other campers and staff members as well as assist with contact tracing if any staff member or camper contracts COVID-19.
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
 - Masks will be required for staff and campers when the family group is inside and unable to physically distance from other family groups or staff outside the family group.
 - Masks will be required for staff who are inside and unable to physically distance from each other or when in contact with a different family group.
 - A new mask will be provided for all campers, counselors, and staff daily. Additionally, mask brackets and extension straps will be provided to those who need them for medical reasons in order for a mask to properly be worn.

- Changes to Normal Camp Programming
 - Meals- Wonder Valley Staff will serve meals instead of traditional buffet style serving. All cabins will gather outside the main lodge in marked staging areas at their assigned mealtime.
 - Masks shall be continued to be worn at all times except when actively eating.
 - Once all campers and staff of the cabin are accounted for.
 - Cabins and staff will be called and then will proceed to the Lodge and will use hand sanitizer prior to entering the lodge.
 - Only one cabin will be allowed in the Lodge at a time to get food. While a cabin is inside getting food, another cabin will be called up to sanitize their hands.
 - Campers and staff will receive plates and silverware from a member of the kitchen staff.
 - Kitchen staff will all be wearing masks and gloves and will serve campers and staff
 - There will be no self-serve areas, including any alternative meal.
 - Only kitchen staff will be permitted to touch the serving utensils and distribute food to the rest of camp.
 - Once food is received, campers and staff should exit the Lodge and proceed to their table.
 - Cabins will sit together at all meals. Once cabins are seated, they can remove masks
 - If food is still available, Staff will call up each table to get seconds. Campers and staff must sanitize their hands prior to getting seconds on new plates etc.
 - Every camper and staff will dispose of their plate, bowl, and silverware at the end of the meal.
 - Showers - There will be no use of the Shower house. All showers will be taken in each individual's assigned cabin.
 - Flag Pole - Flag Pole will be conducted at the stage to allow for more spacing between family groups. (Masks must be worn)
 - Camp Fire - Campfire will be conducted at the outdoor stage to allow for more spacing between family groups. (Masks must be worn)
 - Singing - Singing can take place with members in the same family group, and with proper distancing and mask wearing.
 - Counselor night activities and night watch - To limit gatherings outside of each family group, there will be no evening counselor activities. Counselors may gather only with other counselors within their family group. However, one counselor must be in each cabin with their campers for purposes of night watch.
 - Mixing of Family Groups - Mixing members of other family groups will not be

allowed.

- Visitors- Due to current restrictions, there will be no outside visitors allowed at camp this year. This includes, but is not limited to, Chili Cook-off participants, Wind & Fire, Woodworking, Forest Service members, Media, all outside vendors.
- Travelers - All campers who require international travel will be invited to partake in Virtual camp and the Camp in a box this year.
- Trips during camp - There will be no off site trips this year. This includes but is not limited to outcamp, waterslides, and CIT movies.
- Transportation: There will not be large charter buses used this year. We will be using either family to deliver and pick up their camper, or smaller vans to transport campers in smaller groups to and from camp.

Cleaning & Disinfection

In response to the high risk of spread of COVID-19, camp will implement a plan of increased frequency of cleaning and disinfection. Cleaning and disinfection practices will differ for different areas and equipment. In general, cleaning and disinfection will happen multiple times throughout a day, and after one family unit leaves and before the next one arrives at an area.

- Cleaning Practices to include a two step cleaning process which included cleaning and disinfecting.
 - Cabins
 - Bathrooms will be cleaned and disinfected daily by the cabin occupants.
 - Soap, water, and cleaning solutions and supplies
 - EPA suggested disinfectants
 - High use surfaces such as door knobs will be sanitized daily by the cabin occupants.
 - Cabins will be fogged daily with a virus-killing solution by logistics/camp staff.
 - Common Bathrooms
 - Will be fogged daily with a virus-killing solution by logistics/camp staff.
 - WV staff will clean and disinfect per their protocol.
 - Common areas
 - Will be fogged daily with a virus-killing solution by logistics/camp staff.
 - Food service & table sanitization
 - After every meal all serving and eating surfaces will be cleaned by WV staff.
 - Soap & water
 - Disinfectant
 - Let stand for 10 minutes
 - Rinse

- Trash will be removed around camp daily.
- See appendix A for sanitation guidelines for each activity station.

Training

- Staff will be trained to recognize the signs and symptoms of COVID-19.
- Staff will provide campers with training on proper handwashing, proper wearing of PPE, social/physical distancing procedures, and other illness reducing strategies.

Communication

- Camp staff will be in contact with local health and government officials to determine quarantine guidelines, outbreak control measures, and the overall safety of running camp programming.
- Camp staff will communicate to campers and parents, informing them of any schedule changes, program changes, additional safety measures such as pre-screenings, and the Communicable Disease Plan.
- Camp staff will communicate with volunteer staff, informing them of additional safety measures, the Communicable Disease Plan and other educational resources, and potential changes to their role.

INTERVENTION

Outbreak Plan

In the event that an individual has COVID-19 symptoms:

- The individual will be taken to the infirmary for care and will wait outside to be triaged.
- The camp Medical Staff will identify the individual's symptoms and will administer a Rapid COVID test if the individual has COVID-19 symptoms.
- If the illness is not COVID-19 related or a danger to the rest of the camp community, the individual will receive necessary care and return to their group or position as soon as possible as deemed by medical staff.
- If the illness is identified as COVID-19, the individual will be isolated in the designated isolation room in the medical wing. The camp Medical Staff will contact the Camp Director and Foundation representative having authority. The Camp Director or Foundation representative having authority will then contact the family of the infected individual as well as Fresno County Department of Public Health.
- Camp Staff will then determine the best form of transportation for the individual to be removed from camp and will organize that as soon as possible.
- In the event that a suspected case of COVID-19 is confirmed:
- Staff and campers who were in contact with the infected individual will be checked for symptoms, monitored daily for symptoms, administered a Rapid COVID-19 test if

deemed necessary by Medical Staff, and isolated from other staff and campers. The proper contacts will be notified for minors.

- The areas used by the infected individual will be closed off, cleaned, and disinfected.
- Communication will be sent to all families providing next steps.
- Camp programming will continue for any unaffected staff members and campers.
- If other individuals begin to show symptoms, they will be immediately isolated and removed from camp as soon as possible to receive further medical attention.

In case of an outbreak of more than one COVID-19 case, Champ Camp will make sure we are prepared to give the best possible care we can to those who are ill and protection for those who have not shown symptoms.

- Convene meeting of the CDP team (Medical staff, Camp Director, Foundation Representative, Operations Manager, and Board Representative)
- Communicate with the Fresno County Health Department about the situation and our action plan.
- The official spokesperson is to be the Foundation Representative, Daniel “Apollo” Chacon.
- The Camp Director and Foundation representative having authority will make decisions regarding the feasibility of continuing camp.
 - Tipping point - If COVID-19 is confirmed in more than one family group, camp will be ended and arrangements will be made to get everyone home safely.
