Agenda item 10 – New Business: Ottawa Neighbourhood Study

The Ottawa Neighbourhood Study (ONS) is asking for advice about how they have described Ottawa's neighbourhood boundaries. ONS reviews and revises neighbourhood boundaries every ten years (reflecting two full census cycles). ONS examines the physical and social pathways by which Ottawa's neighbourhoods affect health and well-being and then provides citizens with facts that can support evidence-based decision-making. Evidence is mounting that the neighbourhoods and communities in which we live affect not only our health but also the gap in health between rich and poor.

ONS research focuses on a definition of neighbourhood that includes residents' perceptions of the communities in which they live work, play, and raise their families. These "natural neighbourhoods" are custom geographies that do not necessarily coincide with the political, administrative or statistical units that have resulted from imposing standardized divisions of convenience on geographic space (for example, census tracts, dissemination polygons, postal codes, municipal wards, etc). Over time, populations may grow or shrink, imposed environmental elements may evolve, residents' perceptions of neighbourhoods may change, and/or there may be changes to the social, economic or health-related processes taking place within the described boundaries.

ONS believes that community groups may have insights and perspectives that can assist ONS to make necessary adjustments or modifications to neighbourhood boundaries. ONS are conducting this review now to be assured that 2021 census data will be analyzed appropriately by updated custom geographies. In addition, the timing of this review will provide ONS with an opportunity to compare revised neighbourhood boundaries with new approved ward boundaries when approved.
