



William Deaville

Mr. Deaville's past includes a conviction on April 15, 1983, when at 16, Mr. Deaville committed his first adjudicated sexual offense against a 6 year old boy who was returning home from school. When questioned regarding the incident, Mr. Deaville admitted to oral contact with the boy, as well as 50 other children.

He confessed to asking two other children to remove their pants. At age 17, Mr. Deaville sexually reoffended while still on probation for the offense against a 6 year old boy. He offended against 3 young boys between the ages of 4 and 6 over an extended period of time.

According to police reports, Mr. Deaville threatened to hit his victims on the head with a hammer if they told anyone. Mr. Deaville sexually reoffended while detained at the Echo Glen Children's Center, occurring against a 13 year old boy, including grabbing the boy's genitals and asking the boy to put the boy's penis in Mr. Deaville's mouth in exchange for car pictures, gum and snacks. Mr. Deaville offended again at age 22, not long after his release from the Echo Glen Children's Center, where he was observed sexually offending a 10 year old boy in the bushes behind an ice cream store in Bremerton. He has admitted to anally raping this boy in a treehouse.

The police investigation revealed another victim at that time, an 11 year old boy, boy Mr. Deaville had molested over an extended period. In an Annual Review, Mr. Deaville reported that he knew a majority of his victims from his neighborhood paper route. He stated that he typically offended against his victims "around the house, in a field, in a tree fort, or down the block."

On March 11, 2011, the Court granted Mr. Deaville a conditional release to a LRA, but it did not last. On April 14, 2011, Mr. Deaville stated that he wanted to return to the main SCC facility, as he could not cope with the pressure he felt following his release to the LRA. In a 2014 Annual Review, the court records show that Mr. Deaville continued to struggle with his emotions and feelings of rejection by peers despite encouragement to learn to cope with his feelings. The reviewer noted Mr. Deaville was unsuccessful and therefore was relocated from a low management unit to a medium management unit, i.e. increase security. The reviewer noted that his motivation and engagement in treatment appeared to decrease at that time. Mr. Deaville has been placed in the moderate-high risk category for being charged with or convicted of other sexual offenses, estimated to sexually re-offend at a rate of about 21.2% in 5 years and about 32.1% in 10 years.

According to the records, Mr. Deaville's condition makes him predisposed to act on sexual urges involving children, he has difficulty controlling his behavior and sexual urges, even while in confinement. According to Lorien J. Newsome's, PH.D., January 2, 2017 report, Mr. Deaville's mental condition seriously impairs his ability to control his behavior and renders him likely to engage in acts of sexual violence if he was unconditionally released.
