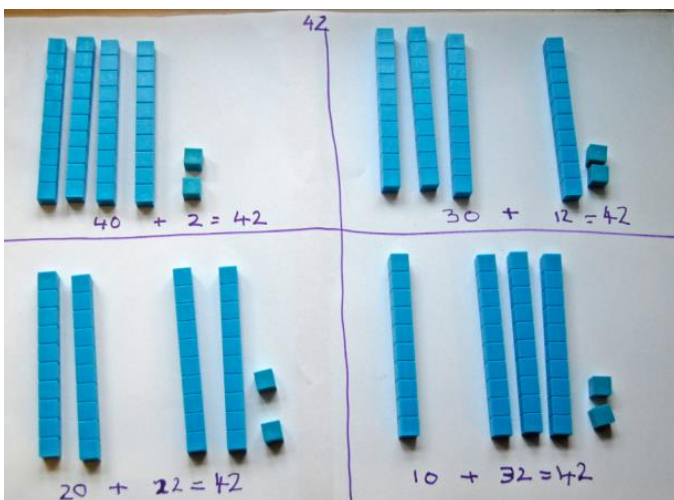
Today we are going to partition two-digit numbers into different combinations of tens and ones. You can use drawings of tens and ones or create lists of sums by working systematically and recognising patterns, explaining your thinking as you work.

To begin, start with a two-digit number, such as 72.

Then, partition the number into tens and ones – $70 + 2 = 72$

Next, partition the tens (in this example, 7 tens) into different combinations working in an order. Keep one set of the tens with the ones. Use drawings and write lists to support, just like the examples below.

- $10 + 62 = 72$
- $20 + 52 = 72$
- $30 + 42 = 72$
- $40 + 32 = 72$
- $50 + 22 = 72$
- $60 + 12 = 72$
