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Message from Mr Usher



It has been quite a week at Emmbrook Junior School. We started with a confirmed case of Covid-19 in Y3, this meant closing the year group on Tuesday and quickly reverting to remote learning. Luckily the child was not in school during the infectious stage and we were quickly able to reopen Year 3 the following day. I have to thank our Year 3 team for the speedy way they got the remote learning up and running with very little time. Thank you also to the parents and carers for their understanding and the quick organisation of child care (including members of staff). The fact that we have had no other children or staff with symptoms or positive test results gives us a good indication that our controls are working well. This appears to be a case of community transmission and we are confident that our risk assessment remains

robust. We continue to be vigilant with our Covid-19 controls and ask that you do the same.

The main symptoms of COVID-19 are:

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot, for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- a loss or change to sense of smell or taste this means they cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If your child has any of the main symptoms of COVID-19:

- 1. Get a PCR test (test that is sent to a lab) to check if they have COVID-19 as soon as possible
- 2. You, your child and anyone else you live with should stay at home and not have visitors until you get the test result only leave your home to have the test.

Anyone in your childcare or support bubble should also stay at home if your child has been in close contact with them since their symptoms started or during the 48 hours before they started.

This week we have also carried out interviews for the teaching position that will be made vacant at the end of this academic year. We are very pleased that we had 10 applications. The final three candidates were all very good and would have made a fantastic addition to our team. We have made an offer which has been accepted and once we have written confirmation we will share with you who our new teacher will be.

All the children have also been very busy with Year 3 being 'Junior River Rangers'. I very much enjoyed the Greek salad and Thai style summer rolls that Year 5 made for my lunch this week, as well as the very tasty potato cakes and carrot chutney that Year 6 made and shared.



Thank you to the 'Parents' Forum' for their valuable input this week, we had another productive meeting.

Only one week until half-term and I think we all need a rest, I only hope we get some better weather. **Have a great weekend.**


Start/End of the day reminder

Please remember that school starts from 8:30am. We have noticed some children arriving earlier than this. The gates are open before 8:30am by the site team as they have to be at the front of the school at this time. This does not mean children should be arriving at school before 8:30am. Classroom doors may be open to ensure enough ventilation in line with our covid-19 risk assessment but this does not mean that staff are ready to receive them. Children arriving before 8:30am will need to wait outside while staff prepare for their arrival. Additionally, the playground gates will be shut at 8:50am and anyone arriving after this time should report directly to the office. We will be reminding children that they should not be riding scooters or bicycles on school premises at any time and we'd be grateful if you could reinforce this message at home. Racial Equity

This week's learning share is from Mrs Tinson.

To develop my understanding of racial equity, I decided to read the book 'Black and British - A Forgotten History' by David Olusoga. Having studied history at school, I couldn't remember being taught anything when



covering social history during the Industrial Revolution! It dawned on me that here was a large chunk of history that had passed me by. A huge section that for whatever reason was not discussed in school or covered in the media, until quite recently. I decided to try and rectify this by broadening my own knowledge. As a school teacher, I wondered how I could cover any pertinent topics with the children, when I only had my own life experiences and news articles to back up my limited understanding. Having watched Hollywood films like 'Gone with the Wind' and reading 'Uncle Tom's Cabin' as a child - I stopped to wonder what had they taught me? Probably, a rather superficial picture of the difficulties of living in a Western society.

However, I started work in the 1980s and I was lucky enough to work in a large and proudly multi-racial company, at a time when race relations and gender discrimination were starting to be discussed. Personally, I enjoyed meeting people from different cultures and soon learned about cultural differences first hand -enjoying their various life stories. This was a time when some politicians were recognising the need to create legislation to protect large sections of society for the first time. I felt a sense of trying to take steps towards equality for all. In 'Black and British - A Forgotten History' however, I soon saw how legislation had been used (in the past) to keep the country wealthy and ensure the 'best' for the empire and its all-important trade; at a great human cost. It was easy to see how politics had greatly influenced the

lives of non-white citizens with many twists and turns, depending on the economic and employment needs of the country at the time. I found it hard to keep pace with the legislation quoted and wondered on the negative impact of this on the lives of real people.

Looking back in history, if only the human cost of creating a wealthy nation and wealthy individuals was questioned far sooner things may have been different. I just think how hard it must have been for people to feel powerless and subjugated. It is clear many of these notions still linger today even if realities have changed, especially as many social inequalities which were created by those political and economic decisions back then still require solutions and many imbalances still exist.

To help society begin to treat everyone with equity, school is the ideal setting. Here young children can mix freely and form friendships away from other influences; opening their minds to equality, equity and non-discrimination. To help today's children to recognise how each we can celebrate our differences as well as recognise our similarities must be an important lesson.

This week in Year 3, we hosted a zoom assembly and workshop with Charlene Duncan from the South East Rivers Trust. This fitted in perfectly with our learning journey Flow – where we investigate our local rivers and those around the world, learn more about the water cycle and consider the human













impact on our water system.

Charlene explained about the work that the trust will be doing in partnership with Wokingham Borough Council to improve a stretch of the Emmbrook at Riverside Park, just by Morrisons.

She also told us about how we could become Junior River Rangers and enter a competition to win certificates and badges for ourselves and a river investigation kit for the school.

In the workshop we learnt about the river habitat, how to limit pollution into our waterway and ways to improve the Emmbrook. Charlene also showed us the different activities that we could do to become River Rangers. Ash class were surprised that they had already completed many of the suggested activities in the competition during Year 3's wander down the Emmbrook last week!

We would like to encourage as many children to participate, it is free, you earn a badge and certificate and will help the school to try and win the competition. There are many activities to choose from and can be done in the evening, weekend or during the half term holidays. Brothers and sisters are welcome to take part too.
