<b>1</b>	<b>Haiku</b>
<b>2</b>	<b>Couplets</b>
<b>3</b>	<b>Narrative</b>

	Gives clues to help you solve a <b>puzzle</b> .
<b>8</b>	Poems where the <b>formation or font</b> of the letters used represents an aspect of the poem. E.g. car = fast, metal, traffic, wheels.
	Poems that will make you <b>laugh or smile</b> .
	A type of poetry from <b>Japan</b> . Three line in order of: LINE 1 - 5 syllables, LINE 2 – 7 syllables and LINE 3 – 5 syllables.
	Poems where the <b>first letter</b> of each line <b>spells out a word or phrase</b> .
	Poems which tell a <b>story</b> .
	Poems with <b>five lines</b> , usually are very <b>funny</b> .
	Poems where the <b>visual layout reflects the shape</b> of the poems subject. (shape of a tree and writes about a tree).
	Poems that have <b>two consecutive lines</b> of the same length and <b>rhythm</b> .
	Poems that rely on alliteration and are <b>difficult to say fast</b> .
