All members of staff, governors and teaching assistants accept responsibility for 'socially disadvantaged' pupils and are committed to meeting their pastoral, social and academic needs within the school environment. Hook Primary School is committed to 'Narrowing the Gap' between vulnerable pupils and the pupil premium forms a vital part of that process. The governors reserve the right to allocate the pupil premium funding to support any pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.

Reporting Pupil Premium

It is the responsibility of the governors to explain pupil premium expenditure to parents in the form of an annual statement. There is no set format for the report of pupil premium. This report aims to detail information on how Pupil Premium has been used within school. This report will detail the attainment and progress of pupils who are covered by the premium and the intervention that has been supported by the additional funding. It will also give information on any resources bought through the funding. Reports will also detail the progress made towards narrowing the gap. Regular reports will be presented on the progress of pupils supported by Pupil Premium to the Governing Body at Hook CE VC Primary School.

Reporting to Parents

Parents will be able to obtain information on the pupil premium via the school's website. This will be updated annually.

Principles

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils

- In making the provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged

- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged
- Pupil Premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals, and in doing so give the best possible chance of achieving national expectations.
