

## Key Stage 2 Results 2019 and Performance Tables

There were changes to the end of Key Stage 2 assessments in 2016. For the fourth year, the assessments have been based on the national curriculum that has been taught in schools since September 2014.

The assessments show how pupils have performed against a national standard for:

- Maths
- Reading
- Writing
- English Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (EGPS)

As the assessment process changed in 2016, the results differ from those in previous years and therefore cannot be compared directly. As standards are now higher, nationally fewer children have met the 'expected' standard than in the years prior to 2016.

The following tables show 2019 teacher assessments and test results for our Year 6 pupils. For Writing, there is only teacher assessment shown, as there is no external test for this element. For EGPS, Reading and Maths there is only an external exam and no teacher assessment.

### Teacher Assessment Outcomes

Teacher assessment uses a range of progress and assessment measures over time and gives an accurate picture of a child's performance on a day-to-day basis, and in a range of contexts.

In the exceeding expected standard category percentages are only produced for Writing.

## Average Scaled Score

A pupil's results in each test are reported using a scaled score. A scaled score of 100 represents the expected standard. If a pupil is awarded a scaled score of 100 or more, they are working at or above the expected standard in the subject. If a pupil gets a scaled score of less than 100 it means that they may need more support to reach the expected standard. The highest scaled score possible is 120, and the lowest is 80. The average scaled score is the school's average in the tests.

## Headline figures

These are the overall key figures awarded to schools in the annual tables.

The main headline figure for the school is the percentage of pupils achieving the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Mathematics combined. As before the 2018 National and Wokingham percentages are also given:

## Average progress scores

Alongside attainment, schools also have average scores for progress. These have been calculated nationally for each school based on a comparison of pupils' KS1 Average Points Scores (from the previous assessment system) and where pupils are at the end of KS2. The national score is set at zero and then the school score is a figure either above or below zero

Scores for the school, based on 2019 methodology, are:
