


What is on Medline?

Mid Year Seminar

MSPTM Mid-year seminar was held on the 18/8/2006 (Friday), 10.00 am at Dewan Ungku Omar, IMR. Two speakers delivered their talks:

Laboratory diagnosis of parasitic infections: a clinical perspective, by Prof. Dr. Rohela Mahmud (Department of Parasitology, Faculty of Medicine, University of Malaya)

Synopsis:

This presentation is mainly to introduce the activities of Parasitology Lab, Faculty of Medicine, University of Malaya. One of the main activities is to provide diagnostic services to University Malaya Medical Centre, University Malaya Specialist Centre and other government and private hospitals and clinics.

The presentation also highlights some of the parasitic infections seen in the laboratory especially those associated with immunosuppressed patients. It is important for the medical consultant of the laboratory to liaise well with doctors in the wards to get the right specimens and to give proper advice on specimen collection. A definite and correct diagnosis is important for proper management. In immunosuppressed patients, doctors should be aware of specific parasitic infections such as toxoplasmosis, cryptosporidiosis and strongyloidiasis.

This presentation also aims to make the doctors aware of parasitic infections that are brought into Malaysia by immigrant workers. Malaysian traveling to endemic areas may be at risk of being infected with some of these parasitic diseases.

With the burgeoning of Japanese restaurants in Malaysia and as supplies of raw fish are imported from Japan, doctors should also be aware of the likelihood that patients developing parasitic infection associated with eating raw fish.

Current AIDS situation and management, by Dr. Christopher Lee (Infectious Diseases Unit, Department of Medicine, Hospital Kuala Lumpur) (synopsis not available)

Dr. David Gibson of the Natural History Museum, London gave a talk on **"Helminth collection, databases and systematics"** at the Institute of Biological Sciences (ISB) on the 14 September 2006. MSPTM was the co-organiser of this talk together with the British Council and ISB, UM. Dr Indra Vythilingam represented MSPTM to present a souvenir to Dr. Gibson.
