Prescribed Burn & Restoration Plans

Infill planting continues at the burn sites, especially the north savannah and the All-Star savannah, as well as random in-fill planting at other sites. Burns will continue in future years, although likely to be smaller areas and with less frequency. The next burn is tentatively scheduled for spring 2012, and will be preceded by the removal of invasive shrubs and trees and hazardous tree limbs.

A solarization sheet has been put down at the former Picnic Site 7 to prevent weeds from spreading to adjacent Tablelands restoration sites.

Weir at South End of Grenadier Pond

We have determined that the adjustable weir at the southwest corner of the pond meant to regulate the pond's water levels has not been operated for a number of years. Park Operations has indicated that it is not part of their duties and that it is not something volunteers should do. Forestry is attempting to get this matter addressed by Toronto Water, which operates the Wendigo Pond weir.

In general, responsibility for the land portion of the park is well-defined, but responsibility for the pond is not. We plan to continue our efforts to make sure this significant natural feature is given due attention.

Grenadier Pond Interpretive Signs Project

The heron prototype sign is now in production. Seven others have been submitted, along with photos, for layout by City staff, then to be produced and installed in 2012. TD Friends of the Environment is providing a grant for these signs.

Restoration Site near Lower Duck Pond & BMX Bikes

The City's Urban Forestry team initiated restoration of a degraded hillside in the south area of High Park in May after a staff assessment concluded that continued informal use of the site as a BMX freestyle skills park was not sustainable. Some of the steeper hills were graded, and large amounts of oak leaves were deposited in an effort to trap topsoil and improve the organic content. Later, some planting of hardier species will be done.

The City's Natural Environment Trails Program staff have been investigating the possibility of establishing a formal facility for BMX bikes, possibly in High Park. We have requested a meeting with Trails staff to discuss this matter and express concerns about the difficulty of limiting such an activity to the designated area and the amount of unauthorized bike activity it may attract to the park.

Parks Plan Review

Parks Forestry and Recreation is preparing a Parks Plan that will guide acquisition, development, management and operation of the system of public parkland in the City of Toronto over a five-year period. Four public consultation sessions are being held. We have participated in a consultation session for stakeholder groups.
