Glenwood Post: July 14, 1900

### THE WAY OF THE TRANSGRESSOR.

#### Preliminaries Held and Prisoners Bound Over.

Monday afternoon Lucy Moore, the colored woman who has spent the past two weeks in the county jail because of a suspicion of the officers that she was implicated in the robbery of O. A. Arnold, of the New Era restaurant, was given a preliminary examination before Justice Hedden.

The result was that Lroy, as well as Oscar Louttit and G. C. (Bo) Arnold (colored) was bound over to the district court. O. A. Arnold, Jessie Wade and Lucy Moore were the important witnesses.

The two women testified to a disgraceful drunken soiree soon after the robbery occurred in which Oscar, Tennie Simons and the fair and the dusky maiden participated. "Bo" Arnold, ever and anon throughout the evening, imposed his dusky presence on the gay quartette to the great embarrassment of the fair Jessie whom he importuned to fly de coop and skip with him by the light of de moon, warning her that she would see trouble if she remained here, and assuring her that he had sufficient "dough" to provide for all expenses, whereupon the chameical blonde rudely informed him that she did not walk the street with colored gentlemen, and the crestfallen "Bo" was forced to retire.

The testimony of both of these women showed that Oscar, on the night in question, had plenty of money, while Lucy testified that Oscar told her he intended to rob Arnold, and in her presence sharpened the knife with which to cut the screen from the window through which he entered Arnold's room.

Louttit and Arnold, as well as their female companions, in the absence of bonds, will occupy cells in the county bastile until the regular fall term of the district court.

Tuesday afternoon James Parks, accused of robbing the cash register at Ethel's saloon, was given preliminary hearing before justice Hedden.

John Corwin, M. J. McGlynn, Sheriff Adams, A. O. Arnold, U. S. Devor, and policeman Malaby were strong witnesses against the prisoner.

The following note, found on the desk in the saloon soon after the burglary, was submitted in evidence and identified by sheriff Adams as the handwriting of Parks:

My Dear Friend I was here as you was not here I took what I wanted

Yours trolly  
Your frend

After the testimony for the state was all in Jim told a very plausible story of his conduct while in Glenwood, but Judge Hedden considered the evidence sufficient to warrant him in binding the prisoner over to the district court, which was done.
