1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

As a unit of U.P. Government higher education, Km. Mayawati Govt. Girls Post Graduate College, Badalpur is providing quality education to the girls of rural areas in order to achieve the empowerment of women through education. It is a matter of pride, that a college which was started in 1997 with 26 students & 5 teachers, presently UG/PG/research students along with 49 permanent and 2 temporary teachers. The increasing number of students is itself the proof of continuous process of development and the fact that the result of every session is above 90%, is also proof of the continuous efforts made by teachers, students and the leadership.

The College is successfully running 20 subjects at the UG level (B.A.,B.Sc. & B.Com.) and 10 subjects at PG level. Under the professional courses, B.Ed. course with 100 seats has been started since 2015. The college has a research center almost in every subject where altogether 53 scholars are registered as Ph.D. and PDF students. Two B.VOC. Courses (ATHM,MMDT) also have been started in the college from the last session. The College also has 10 certificate courses in different streams running as Add- on- Courses ,for providing some extra knowledge to the students. The college regularly organizes national seminars, workshops and symposium (funded by UGC, ICSSR or DHE-UP) to energize the thought process of all the stakeholders. The faculty of the college are using new innovative teaching technologies to impart quality education to the students.

To make the girl students self- dependent, and to develop the qualities of leadership the unit of NCC, NSS and Rangers are registered in the college. In order to deal with dropouts the college has started the center of IGNOU, running successfully for the last five years. The College also took many initiatives for making the campus a green and clean campus. It is a matter of pride that our college has emerged as the only Govt. college in UP to be awarded the ISO: 9001-2015 certification by Otabu, UK this year

Vision

The progressive administration of the college is the result of smart leadership and the complete reflection of vision and mission of the college. For fulfillment of the objective of the college, the leadership strives to maintain an open and interactive environment. The college has well qualified faculty to provide leadership and

management at various levels. The student centric approach and the quest for excellence by the institution, helps it to achieve its mission. Important National Days are celebrated throughout the year, where students are encouraged to participate and inculcate loyalty to their nation. The Fundamental Rights and Duties enshrined in the Constitution have been prominently displayed at the entrance of the building, as also the vision and mission of the College. Student representatives are included in all committees where their participation is necessary, to develop leadership skills and provide a democratic atmosphere in the running of the College. The faculty members are given ample freedom and responsibility by the Principal to develop academic leadership in order to ensure holistic growth of the institution as a whole.

Mission

The teachers of the College are highly qualified and fulfill the criteria laid down by the UGC for selection to their posts. They have all been selected by the U. P. Public Service Commission, against permanent positions. Emphasis is laid by the management of UP Government and the teachers themselves, on the overall development of the students, who mostly come from the adjoining rural areas. Besides the teaching process, to develop the intellectual and reasoning qualities of the students and for the all-round development, debate competition, poem recitation, essay writing, slogan writing, rangoli making, poster and general knowledge competitions are organized by the departmental councils of the college every year. To encourage the students, the winner students are awarded in the Annual Function at the end of every academic year. The faculty of the college are using new innovative teaching technologies to impart quality education to the students through well-equipped smart classrooms. PPT's are one of the mode of teaching. The use of ICT is sought to be promoted through computer labs, mobile apps etc. Moral values are sought to be inculcated through famous sayings on leading a good life, displayed prominently on the college walls. Tolerance towards others is promoted through various sensitization programmes. Student representation, involvement, and participation in all the activities of the college is our real strength to achieve our mission.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The college has a good number of well-qualified staff, selected by the U.P. Public Service Commission Allahabad. At present 51 permanent faculty members are serving in our college in which 37 are Ph.D. There are 20 departments functioning including Science, Commerce, Arts and Education with Post Graduation Degree in 10 subjects. B. Voc. is also introduced with two courses. Ten Add on Course approved by University, are also being conducted for skill and personality development of the students.

Technology aids teaching learning and offers opportunity for evolving flexible curriculum catering to different

strata of society, so most of the departments have their own LCD Projectors and computers which facilitates the students for techno world education. Besides one Interactive multi-purpose hall, which is well equipped with high-tech podiums, there are 12 labs (5 in science faculty, 5 in art faculty, one in B.Ed. faculty and computer lab). All the labs are well equipped with projector facility and have sufficient equipment to carry experiments and other practical work. College has four smart rooms. The faculty serves in the eminent bodies such as EC, BOS and sports etc. The research facilities are also available in almost all the departments. 53 Ph.D. & PDF scholars are pursuing their research under the supervision of college faculty. Departmental council activities provide a platform to boost our student's creativity. The college has the provision of remedial classes for slow learners. College has all the sports facilities with state of art Gym.

The college has been conducting seminars, conferences and workshops for the benefit and promotion of research atmosphere engaging faculty to involve in paper presentation and publications. More than 183 research papers in peer-reviewed journals and 170 research papers in seminar proceedings have been published by the faculty of the college for the past 5 years. Many of the teachers have authored books to their credit. Newsletter 'Pritibimb', college magazine 'Gyananjali' and research journal 'Prajnana' are the publications of the college.

Institutional Weakness

K.M.G.G.P.G.C. Badalpur, Gautam Buddha Nagar is eager to achieve its mission step by step despite limited resources and its rural location. The growth trajectory has not been matched by growth in the land area or buildings. The College is spread in a total area of 1.7160 hectare of land which houses two buildings comprising 4 blocks for various academic purposes, so we have limited land area with limited class rooms, although the student strength demands separate buildings faculty wise. Non availability of hostel facility is also a constraint to outside students. Some departments are one faculty department which proves to be a constraint in creating a culture of learning, although we are doing well by collaborative actions. The college library also needs to be upgraded to match research standards. A number of posts are lying vacant in several departments, which leads to overload of work on the remaining teachers. The Mathematics Department had to function with adjunct visiting faculty for the last five years as the incumbent teacher is away on overseas project. There is also a shortage of administrative and technical staff. Being a girl's college, there is also the problem of dropouts, if the students get married in the middle of a course, or are not allowed to pursue their studies further due to family financial constraints.

There is a post of librarian in the college, but it is lying vacant for the last five years. We are managing the library with a teacher as in-charge, a daily wage qualified helper as an assistant librarian and all teachers helping with the issue of books. Likewise, the post of a sweeper is also vacant and being managed by daily wagers.

Institutional Opportunity

The college provides a great opportunity for imparting UG-PG-Research education to girls at their doorstep. It fulfils the idea of the U.P government of increasing the reach of higher education to the students of rural areas, and the socially and economically backward classes. The college offers a disciplined campus to the teachers and students, where the use of ICT technology is also used as a method of teaching. Proximity to New Delhi makes the national libraries and institutes like U.G.C., I.C.H.R. I.C.S.S.R, and Nehru Memorial Museum & Library etc. easily accessible to the teachers and students. The college is recognized by the U.G.C. under the

section 2f and 12 B, which gives the faculty a great opportunity to apply for projects and seminars which provide a great opportunity for the students. There are 20 departments functioning including Science, Commerce, Arts and Education (including research facilities) with Post Graduation Degree in 10 subjects. B. Voc. is also introduced with two courses (Airline, Tourism and Hospital Management & Medical Lab Molecular Diagnostic Technology) to go in for vocational and career-oriented courses. These courses have 100 percent placement potential. Various MoUs have been signed with many organizations (e.g. Guatam Buddha University, Greater Noida, Namo Gange New Delhi, ITS Engineering College, Greater Noida, Adon System Limited New Delhi, QT Analytics New Delhi, IGIS New Delhi and Clear Medi Hospital & Cancer Centre Delhi) by virtue of which college can do wonders in different area. So college has infinite opportunities to flourish as an academic institution of higher education.

The College also lacks transportation facilities, and students and teachers either have to depend on personal or public transport.

Institutional Challenge

Though the college has PG in a subjects, there is no separate P.G Block, and lack of funds is a constraint here. The arrangement of all U.G. and P.G. in the available space poses a huge challenge. The small size of the campus also becomes a constraint when we feel the lack of staff quarters and a sports field with all indoor-outdoor facilities for all games. Being situated in a rural area, the erratic supply of electricity poses problems, as does the slow speed of the internet. The CCS University, Meerut with which our college in affiliated, is situated far off, so matters requiring University approval and notification pose a challenge or the management and students, and take long to get resolved. The college comes under the control of the U.P. Government in administrative matters, and under the University, for matters of curriculum and examination, due to which, there is very little scope for experimentation and/or a free hand in decision making; therefore, trying to do one's best under limiting circumstances, itself is a challenging task. The attitude of parents/ stakeholders towards higher education goal, career orientation of students is not encouraging, therefore hampering college efforts towards their placement. Alumni meet and parent teacher meets have low foot fall despite regular meetings over the years, due to above facts. The students are not tech savvy and do not usually own smart phones/ mail ids which hampers the smooth functioning of MIS and mentoring.

The College also lacks transportation facilities, and students and teachers either have to depend on personal or public transport.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

K.M.G.G.P.G. College, Badalpur, G. B. Nagar, U.P. is a constituent college of C.C.S. University, Meerut and follows the unified syllabus effective in all the colleges affiliated to the university. There are 20 departments comprising the Faculty of Science, Commerce, Arts and Education with Post Graduation Degree in 10 departments. B. Voc. has also been introduced in two subjects ATHM & MMDT. Ten Add on Courses, of three months duration, approved by the University, are also being conducted for skill and personality development of the students. The faculty has consistently strived to contemporize its academic content and

implement new technological knowledge, human values and professional ethics through various courses which are the part of B.A. B.Sc. and B. Com Syllabus prescribed by the University. The syllabii is further divided through the 'Academic Calendar' and lesson plans of the departments, which clearly specifies time duration for the completion of each unit, field surveys to be conducted, Internal Evaluation Exams & tests for the performance evaluation. Excursions, celebration of important days, extension and career counselling lectures also form an integral part of the academic calendar.

Technology aids teaching learning opportunities, for evolving flexible curriculum catering to different levels of learners and for overall development of the students using ICT equipped smart class rooms, mobile technology and wifi. Classrooms are airy, well lit naturally, equipped with Green/White Board and adequate furniture for aiding the teaching learning process. There is an interactive multi-purpose hall too, which is well equipped with high-tech podiums & Acoustic Sound System. The faculty serves on the C.C.S. University's eminent bodies such as Executive Council, BOS and sports committees/trials etc. The research facilities are also available in almost all the departments. Approximately 11825 books are available for students and access to various e-journals sites which aids quality Research.

The remedial classes have also been there for the slow learners and a free coaching for competitive exams is provided by some teachers. All the P.G. departments/teachers also help in guiding the students to prepare for UGC-NET exam. Some students from almost all the departments have passed the NET exam over the years.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The Institution is a government establishment and is affiliated to C.C.S. University, Meerut. From admission to examination all the processes are regulated according to the directives of C.C.S. University and Govt. of U.P. In the last five years total of 9677 students have taken admission in which 1960 are general, 5802 are OBC and 1915 are SC/ST. Total 52 students belong to other states, majority from Delhi. 4 differently abled students admitted in the last five years. All the faculty members have been duly appointed as per U.G.C. norms. No. of posts for permanent teachers in the college are 57. In 2018-19 total number of appointed teachers are 49 in which 35 are Ph.D. Besides 2 temporary/contractual teachers appointed recently in UGC sponsored BVoc courses are also Ph.D. In the current session there are 21 teachers registered as Research Guide. In the session 2018-19 there are 322 students enrolled in PG and 1661 in UG. At UG level, the mentor-mentee ratio is 1:35 and at PG level is 1:10.

At the beginning of every session there is an orientation programme which gives an insight into the entire curriculum, facilities in the college, committees, staff introduction, rules and regulations etc. Every year academic calendar is prepared both at college and department level which helps the teachers and students in organising various curricular and co-curricular activities in a planned way.

To identify the advanced and slow learners, teachers have personal interaction with students and analyse their previous result and classroom performance. The faculty members conduct group discussions, seminars, debates, exhibitions and demonstrations which help the students to get a clear understanding of the topic. Students are motivated to use internet, youtube videos, whatsapp, magazines and e-Journals to enhance their knowledge.

The college administration and internal examination committees ensure that all the queries or problems related to examinations are resolved with utmost transparency and immediate response. Common program outcomes are knowledge enhancement, research aptitude, career advancement, character building, life skills development and personality development etc. For Students' Satisfaction Survey college gets information through feedback

entries and mentoring through personal interaction.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college RDC monitors and promotes research activities. 21 faculty is work as research guide and 53 PhD scholars are registered under their supervision. Two student have been awarded doctorate degree and one PhD and 5 PDF scholars have submitted their thesis Faculty member are engaged not only in research activities but also undertake minor and major research projects from various funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR,DST etc.

The college has been conducting seminars, conferences and workshops for the benefit and promotion of research atmosphere engaging faculty to involve in paper presentation and publications. More than 183 research papers in Peer reviewed journal and 170 research paper in seminar proceedings have been published by the faculty of the college during the past 5 years. Many of the teachers have authored books to their credit. Newsletter (Pritibimb), college magazine (Gyananjali) and research journal (Prajnana) are publications of the college. The college follows policy guidelines for plagiarism prevention and has stated code of ethics to check malpractices and plagiarism in research. IPR cell has been established in Year 2017 to sensitize the students with current issues and challenges in the field of IPR. Efforts for setting up of incubation center is under way. Apart from academic excellence the college is also actively involved in extension and outreach program to help society by its service. Extension lecture, sewing machine training, adult education, water conservation awareness programme are being conducted throughout the year.

The college NSS, Rangers, NCC and several departments render social and community services. They sensitize the faculty and students on institutional and social responsibility through awareness programs, blood donation camp, seminars on social issues like female foeticide, tree plantation, anti-plastic rally, best out of waste completion, health and hygiene, water conservation program, waste segregating and waste disposal/segregation program. Besides, college has adopted 2 villages where various social and innovative programs are organized with the help of students and faculty to create awareness among villagers.

Linkages and MOU with a number of organizations have been signed to exchange new knowledge and technology and also serve academic and research purposes.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is spread in total area of 1.7160 hectare of land on which the several faculty blocks have been constructed with robust concrete structure. There are total 22 class rooms for teaching of U.G., P.G. and B.Ed. classes. Each classroom has adequate size and has enough lighting, air ventilation and good ambience. There are 12 labs (5 Labs in science faculty, 5 labs in art faculty, one lab in B.Ed. faculty and a computer lab.) All the labs are well equipped with projector facility and have sufficient equipment to carry experiments and other practical work. College has 4 smart rooms with LED projectors and white board. The institution is equipped with a multipurpose hall of approximately 2250 sq ft area equipped with modern facilities like e-podium, screen, projector and is fitted with state-of-the-art acoustics & visual / lighting effects.

The institution has well equipped facilities for sports (both indoor & outdoor) and cultural activities. The institution has gymnasium and yoga centre apart from Badminton Court, Volley Ball Court, Cricket Pitch, Table Tennis facilities and indoor hall for carom & chess which are open to students and staff during the college hours.

Km. Mayawati Govt Girls P.G. College, Badalpur has a central library which comprises of 11,646 text and reference books published by renowned publishers. It also has system of feedback and as per their response facilities of library are improved. Online Journals of different subjects, e-books, research reports etc are also available on DELNET and INFLIBNET. The average footfall for last year (2017-18) was 65 students and 25 teachers per day.

The college has ample IT related resources such as LED projectors, computer labs, biometric attendance machine, CCTV cameras, laptops, LAN connection, interactive boards, video conference rooms, besides a canteen, day care and guest house etc. to facilitate effective teaching learning process.

Student Support and Progression

The College publishes its updated prospectus at the commencement of every academic session which provides information about the college history, general rules, admission policy, list of faculty members & non-teaching staff and other facilities available for students. College organises orientation session for the students, to make students familiar with academic programs, examination process, rules and regulations etc.

Being a Govt. college, the students who are meritorious and have regular attendance receive financial assistance in the form of scholarships from the Social Welfare Department of the U. P. Government. More than 727 girls have benefitted (With total amount of 4940160=00) from this scheme in the session 2018-19. Besides it, if a student is very poor, but is not being granted the govt. scholarship due to some reason, the college has a student welfare scheme of its own with contribution from all the teachers, which pays the students fee etc. from this fund.

At present 1919 UG-PG students with 53 Ph.D.-PDF scholars are studying in the college. The students are taken care of by providing various facilities in the form of indoor and outdoor sports, encouragement for participation in co- curricular activities, NSS, NCC and Rangers, library facilities. College has well established career counselling cell for guiding students towards a better career opportunities and to display job information on the notice board. For the students' support, college has many committees such as Women cell, anti- ragging cell, Students welfare cell, grievances cell etc. In addition, the college has student's representatives in various administrative bodies and academic committees. Alumni meets are held regularly .Most of the students who graduate from the College, go on to do post-graduation and even P.hds if their parents allow them. For their further progression, the college is providing free coaching for various competitive examinations.

The College has established language lab for the improvement of student's communication and spoken skills. We are going to establish state-of-art audio- visual equipment to aid imparting language skills.

College members engage students in personal counselling to solve academic and personal problems with effective mentoring system.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Our College is a Govt. organization. All the process regarding recruitment, selection, posting and promotion is organized by U.P. Government. For fulfillment of the objective of the college, the leadership strives to maintain an open and interactive environment. The college has well qualified faculty to provide leadership and management at various levels. The student centric approach and the quest for excellence of the institution help

it to achieve its mission. The faculty members are given ample freedom and responsibility by the Principal to develop academic leadership in order to ensure holistic growth of institution. The college is practicing decentralization and participative management. Principal formulates committees like IQAC, Examination, Student Welfare, Parent Teacher Associations, Alumni, Scholarship, Grievance Redressal Cell and many more. The IQAC has been constituted as per NAAC guidelines and regular meetings are held with all stakeholders to plan for growth and development of college. Student participation is integral for all the activities of the college. All the workers, office staff and attendants are performing their duties sincerely to maintain the decorum of our esteemed college. The policies and the strategies for the development of the college are formed on the rules set by the State Government, parent University and the UGC. All the policies and deployment documents are available on the website of State Government and university. Being a government college, the college follows all the policies and the rules implemented by the Govt. of U.P. All the construction work, renovation and purchasing are being done through e-tender process. As per the norms set by the Govt. the college is practicing the conduct of Internal as well as external financial audit. The grants received from the external funding agencies are effectively utilized in implementation of projects by procuring the suitable equipment. Availability of such equipment has further improved the research interest of the faculty and students. Enhancement of library facilities leads to novel learning practices and accordingly requisite funds are utilized for this every year. Adequate funds have been utilized for development ,upgradation and maintenance of very good infrastructure for the an effective learning atmosphere in the College.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

As a unit of U.P. Government Higher Education, KMGGPGC is providing the quality education to the girls of rural areas in order to achieve the empowerment of women. The increasing number of students is itself the proof of the continuous of development. The College is also bound to develop the intellectual reasoning qualities of the students for their all- round development. Short certificate course and lectures are arranged to promote the thoughts of great personalities. Unit of NCC,NSS and Rangers are registered to make the girl students self-dependent, disciplined. A Gandhi Gallery and Wall of Heroes paying its tribute to the soldiers & freedom fighters is also present in college.

Solar panel and rainwater harvesting are part of the college green initiative. Green-blue dustbins have been kept in college. Electric bulbs and tube lights of the college has been replaced with LED bulbs.

Ramps have been constructed in all the buildings for especially abled persons and students. Wheel-chair facility, brail-script and restroom are also available in the college for such students. The college is bound to follow the rules and codes of conduct enunciated by U.G.C and U.P. Govt. In college, we follow several best practices out of which two best practices are mentioned below-

1-Department council activities

In college to fulfill the motto of all round development of personality of students Department council is established. Activities like participation in debate, drama, music, essay competitions are held under the roof of departmental council. It also enhances the creativity and aesthetics domain of students. The selection of secretary, treasurer and class representatives help in enhancing the leadership skills. It provides the opportunity to the students for self expression.

2- Creating Research culture

Research is the back bone of any educational institutions. Therefore college has been giving dynamic thrust towards developing the research activities in college. In most P.G.Courses dissertations & projects based on real situations and social needs are been completed by students. As a result 11 departments have been recognized as research centers by C.C.S.University, Meerut since the last cycle of NAAC we have increased research scholars from 0 to 53.

Response:

The College is affiliated to C.C.S. University, Meerut, U.P. The curriculum followed in the college is the unified syllabus as effective in all the colleges affiliated to the university. The curriculum is meant not only for the bookish knowledge but developing their skills for growth and career, social and cognitive development. The whole syllabus is divided into units as prescribed by the university which is further divided through the 'Academic Calendar' of college which clearly specifies time duration for the completion of each unit, field surveys to be conducted, Internal Evaluation Exams & tests for the performance evaluation, Assignments for practical aspects, seminars and presentations to be conducted thereby covering all the details so that every task will be completed on time and the students will be benefitted there on.

There are 20 departments functioning including Science, Commerce, Arts and Education with Post Graduation Degree in 10 departments. B.Voc. has also been introduced in two subjects from 2018-19. Each department has its own LCD Projector and computer which facilitates the students for techno world education. Classrooms are equipped with Green, Black and White Board for the teaching learning process. One Interactive multi-purpose Hall, which is well equipped with High-tech podiums., acoustic sound system and flashlights. Four smart classrooms and all labs with LCD Projectors help time to time delivery of lectures using ICT tools in order to use knowledge into the practical world. Extension lectures related to subjects, field visits from each department are taken so as to bridge the gap between the theory and practical. Every subject which requires practical implementation has its own laboratory for experimenting and exploring the new technologies. College has its own physical and e-library with approximate 11825 books which are issued to students time to time according to their need. Access to various e-journals sites like Shodh-Ganga, DELNET etc. is also available which enhance the quality of research of the students.

Students are the actual mirrors of the teaching learning process. A well planned feedback is taken every year from the students so as to know the actual effectiveness of the whole implemented process. The feedback is taken in both soft as well as hard copy. For the regularity of students' attendance, Registers are maintained and parents are also informed if any lone is found lagging behind. The record of short attendance is sent to the parents of the students so that they can keep a check of their presence in the college. Biometric attendance is also meant for teachers for the regularity and sincerity in terms of time devoted to college.

The remedial classes have also been there for the weaker students. Extra classes also conducted in college. The PG dept also help students to prepare for NET for lectureship, and students from almost all the departments pass through the NET in the last few years.

Ph.D, and PDF both are being conducted in the college. This is the only college in this rural area providing opportunities of quality higher education

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates cross- cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum

Response:

Two courses which are part of the compulsory curriculum, to integrate cross cutting issues relevant to environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics are Bhartiya Sanskriti and Rashtriya Gaurav and Environmental Studies. Besides, the college, through its efforts, has added two more optional ones, on Personality Development and Women Entrepreneurship Development Program on Digital Marketing conducting in 2018-19 with plans to continue then in future.

“Bhartiya Sanskriti and Rashtriya Gaurav” and “Environmental Studies” are prescribed and included in the University Syllabus in BA., BSc., BCom and faculties as compulsory Qualifying papers. These courses address and explain the relevance of peculiarities of Indian Culture and creates the awareness about its conservation . The curriculum includes studies on Indian heritage , art and architecture, philosophy, mathematics, science, medicine and healthcare, ancient Indian culture, social and political structure, astrology and geography. It depicts the richness of Indian Culture which surely develops human values and pride in our rich intellectual heritage knowledge of which is necessary for any individual, institution, society and country as a whole.

Environmental Studies” course creates public awareness about the natural resources, both renewable and non-renewable, ecosystem bio-diversity and its conservation, environmental pollution, solid waste management, social issues related to environment and impact of population growth on environment. The paper also includes field work to provide practical knowledge and to connect with the environment.

For professional development two courses are being conducted at the college level – “Medha” -an NGO, was brought on board in 2018, for inculcating soft skills and personality development program among students followed by placement assistance. Two batches were conducted in Dec 2018 and Jan.2019, wherein 35 students participated in each course of 30 hours duration. The objective of the course was to prepare students for their future career, industry exposure, and develop leadership abilities through group discussions, extempore, presentation and other activities conducted by the organization . Assistance was provided for placement through a job fair. The program benefits students by developing confidence in them for facing the interviews.

“Women Entrepreneurship Development Program” was conducted by ITS Engineering College Greater Noida and Department of Science and Technology Govt of India from 12.11.18 to 11.12.18. The course coordinator was Mr. Manveer Singh Chaddha and the course was for B.Sc. Students. The objective of this program is to create awareness among the students about entrepreneurial development, preparing business plans conducting Market Survey, digital marketing identification of business opportunities and guidance

about various schemes of assistance for MSMEs/Financial agencies/Institutions and IPR. For providing practical knowledge a field visit was also conducted to Mother Dairy on 14.11.2018. 25 students participated and benefitted from the course.

Besides the above, gender sensitization programs like short plays and lectures etc. arranged through the college Womens' cell and anti- sexual harrasment committee. Human values have been displayed through "neeti vaakyas" displayed all over the campus walls. Waste segregation through green-blue dustbins, a 5 KVA solar unit installed over the M.Sc. block and water management programs enhance the emphasis on environment sustainability.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity**2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners****Response:**

Every class has advanced learners and slow learners. To identify the advanced and slow learner teachers have personal interaction with students and analyse their previous result and classroom performance. Teachers in some departments conduct class tests to analyse the performance of their students and to improve their abilities in the university exam. This help teachers to categorize students as slow learners and advanced learners. Advance learners need acceleration so that they can progress through the curriculum at their fast learning pace and slow learners need extra attention to cope up with other students. To increase the intellectual ability and creativity of both, teachers organise various programs which help them to enhance their capacity of learning.

Programs for advanced learners

Class Seminar: Most departments organise class seminars/lecture of their subject for their students with two goals in mind: to provide a regular academic platform for students and to give a motivation to speak boldly in front of audience. Oral presentation of information and facilitation of discussion by students through seminar is very beneficial for their intellectual growth. For example -English department organized class seminar for PG students on the topic of “Feminism in English literature”, History department on the topic of “Different dimension of historiography” etc.

Class Presentation: Some departments give an opportunity to their students to make presentations, related with their subject. Thus students learn how to prepare material for public presentation.

All PG departments felicitate brilliant students in annual function, who brought highest marks in PG and faculty toppers are also rewarded for their achievements by the University.

Teachers motivate advanced learners to secure ranks in university merit. Sarita (MA, Year-2019) of Sanskrit holds the IInd rank in CCS University

Talented students are motivated to participate in extra – curricular activities, workshops, exhibitions and cultural competitions.

Advanced learners are introduced advance techniques of knowledge by teachers, such as eContent, eBook and eLibrary etc.

Advanced learners, also benefit from the coaching for NET/ Competitive exam Preparation.

Programs for slow learners

Personal counselling and interaction with students: Teachers do personal interaction with students, which help them to understand their students better. Sometimes students are not comfortable to discuss their problems in front of the class, at that time personal counselling is very beneficial.

Interaction with parents: Our Institution organises parent teacher meeting, where teachers meet parents and discuss all the problems regarding their student's performance. In PTM parents are suggested to spend more time assisting their daughters in studies and monitoring their activities.

Remedial classes: Departments conduct remedial classes with an aim to improve the academic performance of slow learners. Remedial classes are also very useful for the absentees and for those students, who are engaged in sports or other activities. Remedial classes help the slow learners who are struggling to improve their subject knowledge.

For academic growth of slow learners, teachers provide personal books and notes to their students who need extra attention and care. Teachers also issue books to slow learners from their personal / departmental library.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process**2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences****Response:**

As the Indian society itself is evolving and attaining new heights everyday, the students need to be prepared for the rising opportunities. Education is a tool which helps the students to shape themselves for a brighter future. In the journey of our students towards self-exploration, our college leaves no stone unturned in providing them with the top-notch facilities to meet the needs of today's competitive world. The college uses student centric methods that pave the way for students to actively participate in educational process. The faculty members facilitate the students by imparting the skill and knowledge that enable lifelong learning and independent problem solving. Various methods of experiential and participatory learning are adopted to ensure that the students are active participants rather than the passive listeners in the teaching learning process. The following student centric methods are being taken up by the teachers-

The faculty members conduct group discussions, role plays, debates, subject quizzes, news analysis and educational games which help the students to get a clear understanding of the topic as these activities allow for direct verbal questioning and answering with the teacher. The students learn how to express themselves as the above-mentioned activities encourage students to think and to speak out what's in their mind, all at the same time.

The college is well equipped with the tools of latest technology which ensure ICT enabled teaching for better visual interpretation of the lessons. The faculty members upload their lectures on various educational forums like YouTube etc. and help the students to revise their lessons. LCD projectors are used to give the students the desired feel of the topic. The facility of digital library provides access to innumerable e-books and e-journals to broaden the knowledge of the learners. M.Sc. (Zoology) Department conducts online tests to evaluate the learning process of the students. Productive use of educational videos and access of non-print material make the students adapt themselves to the emerging educational trends of the world.

All the departments are inculcating in their students, the quality of working and thinking together in a

group by making groups of students and by letting them participate in various intellectual discussions, debates etc. Various assignments and projects are also assigned to groups to encourage group learning, teamwork, and familiarise them with environment etc. Project work is also mandatory for all the courses offered at the college.

The college aims at building learning environment by participating in rich experiential content of teaching through experimentation, demonstration, educational visits, organising exhibitions and presenting papers. Lecture method supports the teachers to lay the seed of understanding among their pupils and introduce them to the topic and its content.

Regular monthly seminars are conducted by the departments in the college. Students present seminar on the topics prescribed in their syllabus and contemporary issues. This enhances their public speaking ability and instils confidence in them by eliminating stage fright. National seminars are also held yearly where students are encouraged to present papers.

Our college encourages the use of the latest and innovative teaching learning methodologies and approaches with ICT tools. The faculty members of all the departments are provided with LCD projectors, Visualiser, CDs, DVDs, over-head projectors, audio visual facility and computers with internet facility which tries to do away with the boredom of traditional chalk and talk method.

The college has an e- library (<http://www.kmgcbadalpur.org/library/>) with INFLIBNET and DELNET facilities for the benefit of the students. The login Id and password has been provided to the students as well as faculty members to access these facilities. The teachers encourage the students to use e-books and e-resources. These resources can be easily accessed anytime and anywhere.

The first time in the country KMGGPGC introduced a paperless/Eco-friendly class in M.Sc. Zoology as a pilot project to save the environment and make students IT-friendly (<http://www.kmgcbadalpur.org/paperless-ecofriendly-class/>).

The teachers give various assignments to the students which help them to dig out details on any given topics prescribed in the syllabus and on contemporary issues. Several industry visits are planned to provide the students with hands-on experience of the field and to update them with the current technology. Through these site visits, students understand the practicality and implementation of the concepts studied by them.

To know the latest development in certain field, the students are motivated to use internet, YouTube videos, e-books, magazines, newsletters, e-journals and such other tools. The college encourages the students to formulate groups on WhatsApp or any other platform of social media to be connected with their teachers and other classmates for clearing their doubts and sharing new ideas. Assignments and question banks are also shared in these groups with a purpose to encourage the interactive classroom environment that help improving students' creativity and a better understanding of the subjects.

Every department provides Career Counselling lectures related to their subjects to make students aware about various career goals. Students are given information regarding several courses and available vacancies. Departmental seminars are conducted regularly in the college where students present papers on the topics prescribed in their syllabus and contemporary issues. For their holistic development, students are encouraged to take part in various competitions organised by Departmental Associations.

In our college Home Science Department, Drawing & Painting Department and Science Faculty organise exhibitions annually to explore the creative talent of the students and force them to think out of the box. The college has made a mark in innovations and constantly pursuing creative strategies in its system with the help of different practices. The college has developed a mobile app titled 'KMGGPGC' to update the

students about college and university news and happenings.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

Quality education requires an effective teaching and learning environment both inside and outside the classroom. Assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning process and the college tries to achieve it through the following means-

- At the beginning of every educational session there is an orientation program which gives an insight into the Vision-Mission of the College, the course curriculum, facilities in the college, committees, staff introduction, rules etc. to the students so that they get an idea about the college at the start of the academic year.
- At the beginning of the session a time table is made separately by each faculty and subsequently by each Department; regular classes are run on the basis of this time table.
- If students are absent on frequent basis, postcards are sent to their parents to communicate regarding the same. Attempts are made that maximum students attend their maximum classes and gain maximum knowledge from the faculty members.
- Mentoring system is implemented in the college, so that students can approach their mentors regarding any query related to the course curriculum, or stress issues.
- Remedial classes are conducted on regular basis for students who score less marks in assessments or those who are slow learners, so that they can become competent enough to clear their exams.
- Tutorial classes are also arranged on regular basis, so students can clarify their doubts regarding complex topics of the subject and prepare for their assessments.
- Multiple seminars at departmental and national level, assignments and projects are conducted in every academic session to bring out the oratory and public speaking skills of the students.
- Important questions are discussed with the student so that they can get an idea of trend of questions and prepare in a better way. Students are advised and encouraged to solve previous years question papers so that they can self assess their performance & improve accordingly.
- After every internal examination, the answer sheets are shown to students so that students can understand the evaluation process and if there are any queries it can be considered for rechecking & queries can be addressed.
- The college's career counselling committee encourages and guides the students to take up a career. There is separate notice board wherein various career related information and advertisements are put up so that students are benefited through the same.
- The college also arranges industrial visits so that students get exposure towards industries and trade practices also.
- Tests are conducted periodically in some of the undergraduate course.
- Assessment is part of all the post graduate courses which is held at the end of each semester.
- The college organizes parent teacher meet and parents are given information about the students & college and if parents have any queries about the college or their wards, it is also resolved in parent teacher meeting.

These initiatives have helped the students to enhance their performance levels on various aspects like understanding of subject matter, writing skills and sharing of thoughts amongst each other.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The internal assessment of examinations is the mirror of the success of teaching. This helps in upgrading the graph of students' academic success. Internal Examinations are conducted by the institution to evaluate the teaching learning process and is carried out with utmost transparency.

- At the start of academic session there is a session on the internal assessment in the orientation program for the students. This session helps the student understand about the internal assessment, practical, viva and university examinations.
- The syllabus of the course of the entire year is also shared with the students at the start of the year and if there is any change in the syllabus the students are guided accordingly.
- In post graduate courses, two internal exams and seminar presentations or assessment are held in each semester and at under graduate level in some departments tests are conducted.
- In every semester there is an internal examination of total fifty marks in each paper which consists of two internal examinations of twenty marks each and ten marks of seminar presentation or assessment consisting of quiz, short and long questions,
- The dates of the internal examinations are marked in the academic calendar at the beginning of the year. If there is any change in the dates of internal exams, students are informed through notice board notifications and whatsapp group notification.
- The college adheres to the guidelines and instructions strictly issued by the university for the internal exams. The question papers of the internal assessments are also designed in the manner as prescribed by the university. The examination schedule is communicated to the students well in advance so that they can prepare for the examinations accordingly.
- After the internal examinations are over, the students are shown their answer sheets in class so that they can evaluate their performance & if any correction/revaluation has to be done, they can discuss it with the concerned faculty.
- For seminar presentations, the topics are selected from the course curriculum of the students which helps the students to become the experts on their subjects both theoretically & practically. The seminar presentation is given by the students to their entire class & the concerned faculty. The evaluations is done on the basis of the content, presentation & oration skills.
- The college also has Students Grievance Redressal Cell, which enables the student to approach the Cell in case of any grievance or issue student has regarding the assessments.
- There are suggestion box kept in each faculty in which students can put in their suggestions or advises for the betterment of the college or courses.
- The faculty members ensure by various vigilance methods that none of the students use unfair means during an examination.
- If the students have some issues in their mark sheet regarding their internal exam marks or absenteeism, there is an internal examination committee in the college which helps the students to coordinate with the concerned university department.
- In M.Sc. Zoology department, surprise and online paperless tests are held.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

In the teaching learning process, a fair system of examination and grievances related to it provides the required transparency and provides credibility to the institution concerned. Marks are the most important part of any assessment as they demonstrate the level of knowledge of any individual who has undertaken the assessment. If the individual is not satisfied with the results of the assessment, a fair chance should be given to the individual to discuss the doubts arising in the mind. The college completely agrees with this and follows it in the conduct of internal/external assessments and redressal of exam related grievances.

- The senior most faculties are the members of Examination Committee. The first step towards a fair examination is the information of the examination schedule being displayed at the notice board well in advance & if there is any change in the schedule of the examination, it is ensured that this information is communicated to every student.
- The exams are conducted in the manner as exactly prescribed by the university in terms of seating plan, invigilation etc. The question papers are set by the university itself.
- If students face challenges like filling up the subject codes or doubts in examination fee, problem related to downloading of admit card etc., the college examination committee coordinates with the university and gets it resolved.
- Also sometimes it happens that student are shown absent in a particular exam while actually they had given the examination. Then the examination committee intervenes in this case and a proper application is sent to the university with proper attendance records & the problem is resolved.
- For internal examinations, there is a separate internal examination committee. If the students face any issues in the internal exams, this committee resolves the issue in coordination with the concerned department.
- If some of the students miss their practical exams, the dates of re-exam of the practical examinations which are given by the university are communicated to the students so that they can successfully attempt it.
- Syllabus is completed on time so that students get enough time for the preparation of the examination.
- There is facility of scribe in the college for the blind students.
- Separate seating arrangements are made for students suffering with contagious diseases and /or other reasons.
- For the students who are weak in studies and slow learners, the department organizes remedial classes so that these students can also come up to the level of well performing students.
- Any grievances related to university question paper like questions out of syllabus, repeat questions in the same paper, improper split of evaluation marks, marks missed, wrong question numbers are reported to the university by the examination committee through the Principal so that when the final

results are declared the student don't face any issues in the results.

- The decision of the university or any other information related to their problems after the resolution of the grievances is communicated to the student immediately.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

Academic calendar is the foundation of a successful academic session which clearly defines the various components of a successful academic session. It also helps the teachers and learners to co-ordinate in a planned and disciplined way, so that the objectives of the curriculum and the vision of the College is achieved in totality.

- Generally academic calendar starts from the month of July and ends in June. As this is a government college and affiliated to CCS University, Meerut, so before finalizing the academic calendar of the college, the concerned committee goes through the UP Government yearly calendar and university academic calendar.
- The academic calendar is displayed on the notice boards, WhatsApp group, website so that students get to know about the entire year's calendar and they can prepare their studies and participation in different activities accordingly.
- The college academic calendar includes all the important activities like-orientation programs, starting of classes, co-curricular activities, annual sports, celebration of important days, examination schedules, holidays etc.
- The college runs Under Graduate and Post Graduate courses. Graduate courses are of three years duration, based on annual system and their exams dates are declared by the University every year Tentative dates are marked in the academic calendar.
- The Post Graduate courses of two years duration are based on the semester system, divided in two semesters in each year. There are two internal and one external exam in each semester. Internal exam dates are clearly declared in the academic calendar. The dates given in the calendar may differ slightly due to unavoidable reasons. In that case students are informed by notices pasted on notice board, WhatsApp groups and through teachers. The external exam dates of Post Graduate courses are announced and also conducted by the university.
- Once the academic calendar of the college is finalized, individual department also prepare their departmental calendar and lesson plan and display it on the departmental notice board and college website.
- The departmental academic calendar includes the division of the syllabus of the subjects, unit wise teaching plan, seminar/presentation dates, tentative internal/external examination dates, educational tour dates etc.
- The teaching plan includes lecture no., unit no., practical classes, remedial classes etc.
- It also includes departmental level information about different competitions i.e. poster, debate,

essay, quiz etc to describe a few.

- Extension lectures given by guest faculties, career counselling at both external and internal level and academic tours are also included in this academic calendar.
- Every department follows the academic calendar while preparing the departmental level calendar and ensures that the same is being implemented as planned.
- The academic calendar is prepared by the committee in such a way, that all the departments get a chance to participate and organize at least one event in the academic year.

The head of the institution approves the final draft of the academic calendar & also monitors the academic calendar closely on a regular basis so that teaching, learning and all the other activities are held accordingly and completed as per schedule.

B. A.

The B.A stream of education develops the ability to think critically. It gives a fair idea on civic society, constitution, economic environment etc. & thus helps to develop the minds of students towards the creation of a healthy society. It also develops the students towards creative writing abilities and thus creative communication of society keeps on enriching.

B. Sc.

Students possess the knowledge to define, explain and demonstrate the major concepts in the biological and Physical Sciences. They use proper laboratory techniques in Sciences and can determine the appropriate level of technology for use in: (a) experimental design and implementation, (b) analysis of experimental data and, (c) numerical and mathematical methods in problem-solving.

B.Com.

The students develop the ability to understand principles, concepts of Accountancy and tactics of marketing. They learn the Banking Regulation Act, Companies Act etc. They demonstrate the in depth knowledge on the provisions and amendments of Income tax and fundamental concepts of Auditing.

B. Ed.

The B.Ed. program gives the trainee teachers an overall view on how education should be imparted to the students and the ability to engage with different types of students to understand their ability of learning in various situations. It also develops the overall personality of the trainee teachers through curricular & extracurricular activities so that they can also work on all round performance of their students.

B.Voc: ATHM

B. Voc Course Develops professional skills and an insider knowledge of the tourism industry to make them understand tourism management aspects to respond to specific industry requirements in national and international context. The course equips the student to become confident enough in making professional and ethical decisions, work effectively in the airline and hospitality industry and communicate effectively using both written and oral skills.

B. Voc: MMDT

The course develops the competency to perform a full range of testing in the contemporary medical laboratory encompassing pre-analytical, analytical, and post-analytical components of laboratory services, including hematology, chemistry, microbiology, urinalysis, body fluids, molecular diagnostics, phlebotomy, and immunohematology. Students exhibit the proficiency to problem-solve, troubleshoot, and interpret results, and use statistical approaches when evaluating data.

M.Sc. (Zoology)

Students gain knowledge and develop the skill over animal sciences, understand the interactions among various living organisms. Students correlate the physiological and biochemical processes of animals. They understand various concepts of genetics and it's importance in human health. They apply the knowledge and understanding of Zoology to one's own life and work and develop empathy and love towards the animals.

M.A

Students become Master of their chosen subject with command on all the aspects of the subjects. Master's degree can be used as a stepping stone before applying to doctorate level programs and develops a reasonable & analytical approach towards the development of new concepts. As a Master of the subject, the students get more confidence on the subject and help the society to get more insights on any subject and its scope in various fields/careers.

KMGPGC has a research and development cell to monitor and address the issues of research activities. Faculty members are engaged not only in research activities but also undertake minor and major research projects from various research funding agencies like ICSSR, UGC etc. A total of 21 teachers of college are engaged in research activities. Students are guided for publication of papers /articles in reputed journals. Seminars ,conferences and workshops are organised to enhance and update knowledge of faculty and students. College organises national level seminar every year with a huge number of participation of delegates ,researchers and students. College motivates the students to prepare slogans, posters exhibiting the transfer of knowledge on current issues. It also arranges industrial visits and tour to impart subject knowledge to the students. Publication of college magazine and newsletter provides students and teachers an opportunity to express their views on different topics and also encourages them to be more aware on current national and international events,competitions of essay writing and debates. Eminent resource persons are invited to deliver lectures which prove helpful for creation and transfer of knowledge. Students are encouraged to use computer lab. English Department runs language lab where students can use technology to enhance their language skills. In a number of ways, College conducts various activities to nurture and nourish the mind of youth. Department of history frequently conducts innovative activities which give exposure to historical events incurred in the past to acknowledge the history in present context. Numerous activities conducted by Hindi and English department such as Kavi sammelan help in enhancing the skills of language and creative thinking. Add-on courses and BVoc courses are beneficial in developing leadership qualities,various skills such as planning ,budgeting, marketing and organising .There is no separate incubation centre but college has tried its level best to register itself for set up of incubation center. Dr.D.C.Sharma, HOD Zoology has taken the initiative to get the college registered under MHRD Innovation Cell for the establishment of Incubation Center. KMGPGC provides e-resources through e-library and internet connected computers. Linkages and MOU with a number of organisations like Namogange Trust, Jaagruti waste paper recycling services,National Medicinal Plant Board,Monad university create opprtunities for exchange of new knowledge and technologies . Fitness being the mantra Namogange Trust is conveying the message of health,peace and happiness. Heading towards this direction Jaagruti waste Paper recycling Services organize sensitizes the students to make them understand the relevance of recycling and inculcate the habit of reusing paper or recycling them, rather than wasting them . The institution through NSS,NCC,Rangers mobilizes and harnesses knowledge, talent in order to address diverse range of problems faced by the society. NSS has two functional units. Villages are adopted and various social and innovative programmes are organised with the help of students and faculty to create awareness. The innovation ecosystem aims for students and stakeholders involved in innovative projects

to reach out to each other directly to solve mutual problems.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

Provisions of adequate infrastructure facilities for teaching and learning has always been the priority area for the college. College is spread in total area of 1.7160 hectare (4.24 Acre) of land on which two robust buildings have been constructed for various academic purposes. This college was established in the year 1997 and initially started with under-graduate program in B.A. In a decade, college flourished enough to turn into a PG College having M.A. courses in nine subjects. B.Sc. B.Com, B.Voc, followed with B.Ed.starting in 2014 and M.Sc. in Zoology in 2018. This college has following blocks:

1. Administrative block
2. Science block
3. Arts block
4. Commerce block
5. B.Ed block
6. M.Sc. Zoology block

These blocks have their departments classroom, laboratories, smart rooms, common room for students, multipurpose hall, computer lab and library.

- There are total 35 classes for teaching of U.G., P.G. and B.Ed. classes. Each classroom has adequate size and has enough lighting, air ventilation and good ambience. Each Classroom has enough seating space and furniture. As the college is located in a rural area, classrooms have limited access of wifi due to network issues.

Laboratories: There are 12 labs. There are 5 Labs in science faculty, 5 labs in art faculty, one lab in B.Ed faculty and a computer lab. All the labs are well equipped and have sufficient equipment to carry experiments and other practical work. Each lab is equipped with LED projectors that facilitate teachers to teach their students in effective manner.

Smart room: College has four smart rooms with LED projectors and white board. In one seminar room, interactive board with digital podium is available for organising seminars and other educational activities. These smart rooms are otherwise also used for teaching purpose and lectures.

Classrooms, laboratories, MP Hall and Principal rooms are eco-friendly, energy saving and 100% fitted with LED light.

Multipurpose Hall: A modern and well equipped multipurpose hall was renovated for organising various seminars, cultural programmes etc. hall has enough lighting, well ventilated, digital podium, two LCD projectors and white screens. It has approximately 150 sitting capacity with size of 2231.91 sq feet.

Computer lab : Computers laboratories comprises of 30 computers and with proper table and chair.

Institution has exclusive Physical Education Department that provide technical training of various sports. In undergraduate program, compulsory subject of physical and sports education is included by the affiliated University to encourage sport related skill and participation for overall development.

The institution organises annual sports meet which is widely participated by students and staff. The winners of the events are felicitated in prize distribution ceremony.

The institution is equipped with multipurpose hall of approximately 2231.91 sq ft area equipped with modern facilities like e-podium, screen, projector and is fitted with state-of-the-art acoustics & visual /

lighting effects. The multipurpose hall is used for organizing seminars, lectures, debates, kavi sammelan, cultural activities. The institution has literary & cultural committee, departmental council and cultural committee. The Departmental Council is at both UG and PG level and organises various cultural competitions. Literary & cultural committee organises kavi sammelan, debates, drama, folk dance & folk music competitions. College also organises Annual Function on a grand level and provide opportunities and stage to students to showcase their talent.

The institution has full-fledged Music Department equipped with two pairs of tabla, three harmoniums, two naals, two dholaks, two khanjaris, two casios, one guitar, one ghungru, two tanpuras, two sitars, one electronic table, one electronic tanpura and two music systems. These instruments are used by 50 users per day on an average.

Response:

College has central library which was established in 1997. Most of the funds for up gradation of library were received from Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh. As our college is Government institution, appointment of librarian is done by Uttar Pradesh Government. The librarian was served for 17 years for the betterment of college library and retired in 2014. From then college doesn't have permanent librarian. Thus, additional charge of library is given to one of the Faculty members and also, one assistant librarian has been appointed on temporary basis for day to day functioning of library.

College received LIBCARE Integrated Library Management System from Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh in year 2014 (letter no: Bips\UPDECO\HE\SW\23 dated 05.06.14). It is MARC 21 format for retro conversion and AACR2 for cataloguing and ISO2709, but due to technical problem and other reasons, it is not operational.

In 2019, college has opted for full automation by software KOHA. We are seeking different facilities such as RFID Tags-Book, Anti Theft Sticker, Standard Middle Ware Application, Koha LMS Installation of latest version, basic customization, Gate Antenna System, Self Check-Out Kiosk, Book Drop, Smart Card Printing.

College website has a separate page for library facilities where list of all the books, login to e-library, download links, digital library are present.

Km. Mayawati Govt Girls P.G. College, Badalpur has central library which comprised of 11,825 text and reference books published by renowned publisher. Library also includes Encyclopedia, dissertation of P.G. students, year book, newspapers (Times of India, Amar Ujala, Dainik Jagaran and Nav Barat Times) competitive books and magazines (Pratiyogita darpan, Kurushetra, Yojana, samsamaik). It also consist of books of general reading covering areas of fictional, non-fictional, motivational, granth, leadership, current affair, personality development and hobbies related books. Library is also enriched with the dissertation reports and projects reports of P.G. students of different subjects. It also covers of reports of sponsored projects and original books published by faculties. Library also has all previously held university question papers and current syllabus. All questions paper are arranged as per subjects then subdivided by year. It also has system of feedback and as per their response facilities of library are improved. Online Journals of different subjects, e-books, research reports etc are also available on DELNET and INFLIBNET.

The college has 7000 e-books that are available for the students to access in the central library and computer lab/e-library.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

In last five years, the College has provisioned IT infrastructure in college in ways better than before. Initially the college established a Network Resource Centre since 2008 for facilitating internet and ICT facilities. It was established with the aim to facilitate the internet facility for students.

Department of Higher Education, UP, funded the establishment of computer lab by providing 15 computers. The lab is equipped with internet facility and it is regularly used by students and faculty.

Presently all departments of college have desktops, UPS & printers with scanner. College also has three all-in-one machines which are used for photocopy, printing, fax, scanning etc. College campus has free Jio Wi-Fi with limited access and LAN connectivity provided by Dev internet solution to facilitate internet availability.

From the session 2018-19, college has digitized admission process, library, attendance, scholarship, notice board, examination declaration and fees collection. Also from this year, college has promoted cashless system of fees collection by using proper MIS (Management Information System). As this college is affiliated with CCS University, which declares online results, the examination related activities are also done in online mode.

Biometric attendance system for faculty, non-teaching staff has been operational since the last four years and for B.Ed. students from the current year.

Presently college has 21 LED projectors in different departments, 14 laptops, four smart rooms with e podium, NRC (Network Resource Centre), and modern multipurpose hall with e-podium. These facilities are being regularly used by faculty members for conducting their classes to make teaching- learning more effective. Various videos, PowerPoint presentation, documentaries etc. are made available to students.

In Zoology department, 13 Apple IPADs are available to students to facilitate teaching and to conduct online examination.

Language Lab is also well established in college by English department which helps the rural girls to learn and communicate in English in an effective manner.

Different e-contents and lectures links are available on college website. In future, college is planning to upload and ensure 25% lectures to be conducted by using ICT.

Sixteen CCTV cameras are also installed in college campus at various locations for monitoring and surveillance purpose. Recently as per university examination norm 24 audio-video cameras were installed in different classrooms to monitor the examination and other activities. Geography, Botany and Zoology departments are having Visualizers for facilitating lectures. College has original Microsoft license software and antivirus software in computer lab and all departments. The college has its own mobile app (KMGGPGC) and website. College App is available on Google and contains facilities of attendance, fee deposition, feedback, attendance etc. In college there is Website committee and web manager for updating college activities. Presently college website is managed by Gurgaon based I-Made Company. College has dynamic website with various interactive module like feedback module, alumni module, e lecture module etc. Majority of students have Email id and whatsapp group, through which various assignments and information are shared online in more effective ways.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

The College adopts standard established systems and procedures for maintaining the physical, academic and support facilities that are mentioned in the maintenance policy document of the College. There are college level committees that look after the various aspects of the utilization and maintenance of the physical, academic and support facilities.

Annual Physical stock verification of all laboratories equipment, office equipment, furniture, computers, departmental and central library is conducted by different committees constituted by head of institution and report is registered in specific stock register. Every department has its own stock register to maintain and record the equipments available in the laboratory. Also new purchase is listed in the record and if there is any write-off, its process is well documented in stock register. Apart from this, annual financial audit is being conducted at college level and by Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh.

For maintenance of computers and other equipment, annual budget is sanctioned by Department of Higher Education. As this college is Government college, college does not have the authority to appoint personnel such as electrician, plumber etc on permanent basis. Majority of expenditure for maintenance of college is incurred from the fees and Grants received from the UP Govt.. Most of the fund utilized for maintenance and repair work is done from the college fund. The purchase committee handles the repair/maintenance/calibration request appropriately by placing order to the respective equipment experts. As a precautionary measure laboratory in charge, ensures proper working of all equipment at the beginning of each academic year.

Generator and electricity facility: The college has Generator sets to provide full power backup to whole campus. The institution has a number of offline and online UPS for safe guarding sensitive equipments against voltage fluctuations and spikes etc.

Minor maintenance of furniture items, metal fixtures and electricity faults is carried out by the approval of concerned committee of maintenance of electricity and office staff. Thus for maintaining cleanliness and to upkeep proper maintenance of college, temporary staff are hired on daily wages, due to absence of appointment of permanent cleaning staff by the Government Of Uttar Pradesh.

Regular refilling of fire fighting equipments, Water tank cleaning, drinking water testing, computer maintenance and photocopy machine maintenance is being conducted for smooth functioning of college activities.

Anti-virus software is purchased and are renewed for the smooth working of all the computers in the institute.

The classrooms, laboratories, seminar halls, and library facilities are utilized regularly by the students for the learning process and timetables/logbooks indicate the regular utilization of the respective facilities.

Aqua guards are attached to each water cooler to provide safe drinking water for staff and students. These are cleaned and maintained regularly.

The maintenance and housekeeping of the classrooms, laboratories, library, and the college as a whole are taken care by non-teaching staff. Various laboratories, library and sports room are maintained by the concerned Teachers-In-Charge. The college has network administrator and other personnel to check and update the college website.

The College has large open ground for cricket, gym, meditation centre, court and other sports that is utilized by students. Maintenance of these sports facilities is taken care by Physical Education Department. The institute has adequate number of computers with internet connections and required software's distributed in different locales like office, laboratories, library, departments etc.

For safety of college premise, security camera (CCTV) is installed and security guard for day and night is appointed through external source. Also during examination and other special occasions, police personnel are approached.

The college had a Building and Infrastructure Committee to look after the renovation of building and approval of proposals regarding improvements of facilities in the college. This committee also maintained infrastructure facilities and equipments of the college. Recently multipurpose hall, toilets, administrative blocks, laboratories were renovated under RUSA. Apart from this, CCTV, computers, printer, biometric machine, equipments, water and drainage, overall building etc were also repaired as per requirement. In the preceding academic years i.e. 2017, e-tendering was floated for renovation and upgradation of hall, upgradation of laboratories and campus development, sports equipments, administrative building renovation and toilet renovation. Out of them for sport equipment, toilet and administrative block renovation, no bid was applied. Thus, renovation and up gradation work of Seminar Hall, upgradation of laboratories and campus development were done through e-tendering process. For other three, college opted for manual tendering. In the month of January, college uploaded e-tender for M.Sc. Lab equipment, computer lab, other equipment and books. This college being a Government institution follows the policies, procedures, terms & conditions laid down by Government. The procurement process followed by college based upon the policies laid down by Government of Uttar Pradesh in its Financial Handbook. Based upon the requirements, tendering process is initiated by estimating the quantity and the cost of the items to be procured. The estimates are approved by Competent Authority i.e. the Principal of college and purchase committee to ensure transparency. Based upon the estimated cost and time frame of procurement, tender type is decided and accordingly notice inviting tender is released as per the orders of Government of Uttar Pradesh. Procurement or invitation of service is also done through GEM portal. In case of unavailability of product /item/ service on GEM portal, the procurement is done through open market on lowest price. Although every effort is made by College to procure through e-tendering website of Government but in some cases of procurement of less than Rs.10 lakhs value, product / items / services e-tendering process is not followed. 6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

The college is practicing decentralization and participative management. Both teaching and non-teaching members actively participate in making and implementing different policies. Responsibilities are decentralized and participation of each member is defined. Principal formulates committees like IQAC, Examination, Student Welfare, Parent Teacher Associations, Alumni, Scholarship, Grievance Redressal Cell and many more. Meetings are held and policies are being formulated to implement the strategic plan of the college. Responsibilities are distributed through face to face meetings as well as by notifications. Principal including faculty is responsible for both the academic and administrative functioning of the college. It helps to make educational leadership effective for implementation and monitoring of various policies.

- There are about 64 committees and all faculty members are part of some of them. Committees are formulated at the commencement of the academic session. Convenor including members are free to formulate plans and give final shape to them after discussion with the Principal.
- IQAC, Proctorial Board, Swachhta Committee, and Students' Council are the perfect example of participative management where students along with teaching, non-teaching staff, are working for upliftment of the college. Alumni are also actively participating in these programmes.
- The college has a Purchasing Committee. This is functioning for the welfare of each department of the college and following transparency. College is getting funds and grants from Govt., UGC and RUSA. Purchase is being done through these funds and utilised efficiently.
- The committees are responsible for the college time table, admission, examination and attendance of the students.
- Similarly, students are also the part of management. Students have representation from all the faculties. Class representatives play a vital role to maintain the discipline and decorum of the college.
- Student association also helps to maintain the management in the campus. Student participation is integral for all the activities of the college. The college has an organized Student Council. The members of the Student Council are elected by class representatives. Class representatives are elected by students of each class. Student Council body consists of a President, Vice-President and a Secretary. The Student Council members and members of all other committees are involved in all college activities. Members of the committees are selected by the faculty members incharge of the committees. Besides this, student representatives are nominated for all the committees of the college.
- Seminars, Workshops, Sports events Orientation Program, Guest Lectures and Annual Functions are being organized successfully every year. This success is the result of the effort of every person related to the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

Response:

The policies and the strategies for the development of the college are formed on the rules set by the State Government, Affiliating University and the UGC. All the policies and deployment documents are available on the website of State Government and university. Many of the academic and administrative policies are framed by the college level committees and implemented through various committees which are directed and monitored by the Principal. During the last years, college is continuously developing infrastructure under the effective scheme of RUSA. It is a holistic scheme of development of higher education initiated in 2013 by MHRD. The college established its own RUSA committee on 12/12/2013. It includes two bodies:

1. **Board of Governors:** Its chief aim is to constitute the strategic plan for the development of the college.
2. **Project Monitoring Unit:** This body implements and monitors the plan prepared.

Both the bodies work according to norms to decide how the implementation is to be done to achieve the Institution's vision statement into reality. The departments prepares a list of requirements and on priority basis, the work to be done is decided. The project include the creation of ICT based infrastructure in teaching-learning and administration as well as upgradation of college infrastructure. In this way, the strategic plan of the Institution reflects the vision and missions to develop the excellence in higher education. Based upon the requirements, tendering process is initiated by estimating the quantity and the cost of the items to be procured. The estimates are approved by Competent Authority. Based upon the estimated cost and time frame of procurement, tender type is decided and accordingly notice inviting tender is released.

As per the orders of Government of Uttar Pradesh, procurement is also done through GEM portal. In case of unavailability of product /item/ service on GEM portal, the procurement is done through open market on lowest price. Although every effort is made by College to procure through e-tendering website of Government but in some cases of procurement of less than Rs.10 lakhs value, product / items / services. E-tendering process is not required. For the implementation of all the project ,the budget was first released on 01/11/2016.Till the date ,the sanctioned amount for the college is Rs.2 crore.1.8 crore is received by the college in three installments. This amount was received for the:

* renovation of the Principal office

*construction of new building for M.Sc. (zoology)lab ,class rooms toilet block ,lab equipments

*renovation of labs and computer lab development

*renovation of multipurpose /seminar hall

* Admin Block's development.

*renovation of existing toilets

*drinking water facility improvement

*development of college campus

*purchasing of sports equipments

*establishment of Smart Class

All the above work have been done through proper planning and strategies. Many of the projects are in pipeline such as Hostel facility, PG block, floor extension, round table conference room, Bio –musicology lab,etc.

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

Response:

Our college is fully funded by the U.P.Govt. All the procedure regarding recruitment, selection, posting and promotion is as per U.P. Government rules. Govt. appoints a Secretary Higher Education under whose guidance all the policies are executed. Govt. appoints a Director of Education under whom three more directors work. Director promotes the teachers as Principal of college by Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC) which includes Secretaries of Dept of Personnel, Higher Education and Finance. The principal is the head of the institution. There are Associate Prof. and Assist. Prof. according to the seat available in the college. The chief work of the faculty is to teach but simultaneously they have to perform administrative work. Office is also the important part of college administration. There is one office superintendent in the college above junior clerks. and other non-teaching staff. To run all the set up of the college, various committees are formed at the beginning of the new session. The work of each committee is defined, every year there are more than 60 committees such as : Building & Maintenance Committee, Purchase committee, Time Table committee, IQAC committee, Research &Development Committee, Scholarship Committee, Admission Committee and many more. All the committees work under the guidance of Principal to achieve the planned goal of the session. The Principal, at the beginning of the academic year, convenes the General Staff Meeting, discuss and finalize academic plan for the year. The College committees plan all important activities to be performed during the year. like academic calendar, Internal examinations, extracurricular and co-curricular activities and holiday list etc.

Service Rules: The institution strictly follows the service rules according to the norms of Government of U.P.& UGC. The teaching and non-teaching faculty has the benefits of PF, Casual Leaves, Earned Leaves, Medical Leaves and Maternity leaves etc.

Recruitment& Promotional Policies Recruitments are done by the UPPSC, Allahabad and support staff by UPSSB, Lucknow. UPPSC advertises the vacancy in the leading newspaper. Eligible candidates after the written examination are called for interview .Successful candidate after medical examination are appointed at the place where the seats are vacant. Promotion is also time bound according the rules of UGC. The API scores as endorsed and verified in the PBAS proforma are the primary means of assessing a Faculty member for the purpose of promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS), increments and other award/Incentives including key appointments/assignments and deputations.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: The college has its own grievance redressal committee for staff and students. The committee reviews the grievances received and resolves it. Based on severity of complaints, it is resolved within time limit . Identity of person filing complaint in suggestion boxes are kept confidential. The solution/decision with regard to suggestion is communicated to related committee/cell or individual of the college for further action. In case of emergency members of the Proctorial Board and Grievance Redressal Committee, Women Cell can be contacted whose number has been displayed on notice board and website.

6.2.4 Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions

Response:

Various committees are formed with the teaching and non-teaching staff and students to groom their leadership skills. Admission committee, Academic committee and Attendance Committee, Examination Committee, Counseling Committee, Anti-Ragging committee, Cultural Committee, Sports Committee, Library Advisory Committee take the responsibility of the academic aspects of the institution and work hand in hand.. All the above mentioned committees have senior faculty, the teachers of various departments and the Principal as its members contribute constructively for the welfare of the students. All activities of the college are planned together by the heads of various committees and Coordinators of the clubs with the approval of the Principal. The Anti Ragging committee ensures a ragging free campus, Library committee smooth functioning of the library, Cultural committee organises functions and Sports committee ensure participation/organization of sports related events.

Along with these, N.S.S. is one of the committees working efficiently with all its volunteers and Program Coordinators. In our college, we have two units of 100 students each .N.S.S. organizes One Day and Seven Days camp in an academic year around the area of the college. This activity makes them confident, develop leadership skill, and gain knowledge about different people. It helps to cultivate the quality of selfless service .At the commencement of every academic year, students are registered for this program .An orientation Program is organized to make them aware with all the activities and events of the year. They are divided into the batch and each batch has its own Leader .These volunteers are guided by the Program Officers. These volunteers organizes rallies on different subjects to make the people of villages aware such as Swachhta Abhiyaan , Beti Bachao, Bet Padhao, Plantation, Women Education ,Women Rights, Save Environment, Gender Equality, Superstition ,Female Feticide, Dowry System. Villagers come to the volunteers and ask them about all the programs and the students satisfy all their queries. Students also perform Nukkad Natak on all the above subjects with a social message. Every people of the area ,where the camp is being organized, give their blessing to our sincere volunteers. Beside these ,during this camp, a variety of competition are arranged for the students like banner making, Poster making ,Dustbin making, Cultural Program etc.

Lectures on different topics such as Youth and Their Problem, Joint Family, Nutrition, Avoid Plastic, Cleanliness and Health, are given by the experts in these camps.

These student also make people aware about voting and helped them during the camp for Voter ID Card.. N.S.S. also organized The Blood Donation Camp, Plantation, Yoga Diwas, Yuva Diwas, Health Camps, training of paper bag and envelope making. These volunteers also cleanse the near about area of the college

and village and they are awarded as a Green Ambassador. Three students also nominated for Swachh Bharat Summer Internship Scheme. These type of activities boost their personal development, students learn team work, address the problems of the village adopted and get inclined towards social service, developing leadership skills at the same time.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The college is totally governed by Govt. of U.P. There are several schemes which are functional for the welfare of staff. The college employees also take benefit of these schemes every year. The welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff as per the norms of the Govt. of UP are:

- National Pension Scheme (NPS)-All the teachers and employees, who have been appointed after April 2004, are covered under this scheme of the U.P. Govt.
- Pension Scheme- Employee recruited before 2004 are entitled to life time pension.
- Gratuity -This is a defined benefit plan and is one of the many retirement benefits offered by the employer to the employee upon leaving his job.
- Encashment of Earned leave- Leave encashment refers to an amount of money received in exchange for a period of earned leave, not availed by an employee.
- Medical reimbursement facility – In several medical illnesses, the teachers get benefit of reimbursement as per Govt. rules.
- Maternity/Adoption leave – Total of 180 days leaves are given to female employees for the delivery/adoption of maximum two kids.
- Group Insurance Scheme- Group insurance offer personal insurance. All the teachers and employees have to pay a fix amount of RS. 400 as a part of GIS.
- House Rent Allowance.-All the teachers and non-teaching staff are provided with HRA as per Govt. rules.
- Medical leaves- 365 days medical leaves are given to the employees for any medical illness during whole period of service, on doctor’s prescription with full pay and two years without pay.
- Casual Leave-In every academic session, 14 casual leaves are provided to the staff members.
- Child Care Leave – A total of 730 days leaves are given to female employees for taking care of their children upto 18 years of age. More than 20 teachers availed this facility during the last five years.
- House building Loan/ Vehicle purchase Loan by the govt.- Housing loan is given by Govt. upto 7.5 lakhs against the construction of house.
- Duty leaves are granted for attending meetings, seminars, workshops and for other programs under faculty development programme.

Additional welfare schemes for non-teaching staff

- Bonus to Non-Teaching Staff- On the occasion of Diwali, the non-teaching staff get the facility of bonus from the Govt.
- Second Saturday leave is also given to non-teaching staff of the college.

Welfare Schemes at college level

Beside these, the staff association provides financial aid to the needy staff through contributory collection of funds as per requirement. There is facility of Day Care centre in college for the children of teaching and non-teaching faculty of the college, which has been equipped with all necessary facilities required by children. Guest house facility is also available in the college for teaching and non-teaching staff if and when required. A canteen with wide variety of food items is fully functional in college premises for students and staff.

6.3.5 Institution has Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The college has well defined procedure for performance appraisal system for Teaching and Non-Teaching staff. Every employee performance is assessed in every academic year. There are different parameters to assess the performance of Teaching and Non-Teaching staff.

1. Teaching:-

1. Every Faculty Member appointed in Govt. College, Uttar Pradesh is assessed for his or her performance based on the API score of PBAS proforma. The PBAS proforma has been evolved as per guidelines stipulated in “UGC Regulations on Minimum Qualifications for Appointment of Teachers in Universities and Measures for the Maintenance of Standards in Higher Education-2010” no. F3-1/2009 dated 30 June, 2010, hereafter referred as UGC regulations. The API scores as endorsed and verified in the PBAS proforma are the primary means of assessing a faculty member for the purpose of promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS), increments and other award/Incentives including key appointments/assignments and deputations. The PBAS proforma filled by the faculty member is checked and verified by IQAC Committee at first level. The staff provides information which is then verified by the Principal. At final level a committee appointed by the Director, Higher Education Commission, UP, verifies the application for promotion and then it is sent to Secretariat, Lucknow for the final approval. Recommendations are prepared on the basis of rating and grading derived from the API score and the appraisal is granted on the basis of grading. Performance appraisal is done through API report as per UGC guidelines. It is a key parameter for promotion of employees.
2. The performance appraisal of teaching staff is also done through ACRs based on their performance on various parameters throughout the academic year. The outcome of performance appraisal is promotion and incentives which is done by the Departmental Promotional Committee at govt. level. All academic and administrative activities and relevant information concerning the faculty are recorded in their respective service books also.
3. Feedback of the students is also another effective technique to assess the performance of the teachers. The feedback form is designed by the IQAC in the college. Students have to fill these forms related to their subjects teachers. Their teaching techniques, way of delivering lecture is assessed on four point scale.
4. Senior teachers are promoted as the Principal of UG & PG colleges through Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC) . DPC is conducted every year.

2. Non-Teaching:-

The performance appraisal of non- teaching staff is also done through ACRs based on their performance on various parameters throughout the academic year. The office superintendent is given appraisal of his work in a form while for the rest of the office staff, support staff appraisal is entered in their service book. Their performance appraisal is done by the Principal based on the quality and quantity of their work, nature of their work, their enthusiasm, skill sets and efficiency. The appraisal of the non-teaching staff is conducted informally by the Principal and they are counseled to improve their work if necessary

6.4.1

The college is governed by U.P. State government. As per the norm, the financial audits are conducted by Internal as well External methods. The external audits are conducted by two methods.

1. The external auditor is appointed by Government of U.P. from A.G. office and conducts the audit of the college accounts to verify the correctness as per rules and regulations provided by the government. The auditor mainly audits the grants sanctioned and finances approved by the state government. The funds received and expenditures are audited. Last audit was done in the year 2010 By Auditor and General, Prayagraj. Government to decide the schedule of the audit time to time.
2. The finances sanctioned by other than Govt. agencies are audited by a registered chartered accountant. These include the funds of Research Projects of teaching faculties, National and international Seminars, workshops etc.

The Internal Audit is also conducted at the college level annually. Physical verification committees are formulated by the principal including teaching and non-teaching staff as members. At the end of every session, the nominated members of these committees physically verify and check the consumable and non-consumable stocks of each and every department including library books, lab equipment and office financial records. Objections marked by the committee are recorded for actions to be taken accordingly.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The college is fully funded by the U.P.Govt. The budget is allotted by the Govt. as per the requirement and proposal sent by the college. Required amount is received in installments which are mostly inadequate. Being a Govt. college, fees of the students is also not sufficient for the development of the college but college is bound to follow the structure of the fee set by the Govt. of U.P.

The college sends proposals for additional grants to the University Grants Commission (UGC) and DST in order to meet expenses for construction, repair and renovation of the college building and premises and upgradation of library. The college moderates student's fee structure every year in order to procure additional funding. Other than the routine Government and UGC grants, the institution has been able to secure additional funding from various agencies such as DST, RUSA Grant, MLA-LAD fund. After receiving the grant it goes through various processes involving the Principal who is the Drawing and Disbursing Officer, the Finance Committee, the Purchase Committee and the College Office Superintendent before it is finally disbursed to the concerned person or the respective department(s). For instance in 2017, multipurpose hall/seminar hall was renovated with the funds received by RUSA.PG in Zoology was started and its building constructed with the grant received by RUSA . All the department of the college are equipped with computers, printers laptops, books while they are given funds .Laboratories are renovated .musical instrument, sports material are purchased. Adequate funds are allocated for effective teaching-learning practices that include conduct of FDPs, orientation programs, workshops, inter-disciplinary activities, training programs that ensure quality education. The budget is utilized to meet day-to-day operational and administrative expenses and maintenance of the fixed assets. The grants received from the external funding agencies are effectively utilized in implementation of projects by procuring the suitable equipment. This equipment is further utilized in the established advanced laboratories of the institute. Availability of such equipment has further improved the research interest of the faculty and students. Enhancement of library facilities leads to novel learning practices and accordingly requisite funds are utilized for this every year. .Adequate funds are utilized for development and maintenance of very good infrastructure for the institute. Some funds are allocated for social service activities as a part of social responsibility. The college is also applying for funding from various other bodies such as UGC,ICSSR, DST ,and ICMR for organizing seminars/ conferences and for carrying out research projects. As a part of Outcome Based Education system, this institution has given utmost importance for the generation and utilization of funds to meet the objectives of the institution. The institutional strategy to generate funds is primarily based on quality enhancement strategy. This strategy is essential in teaching learning and scientific-work environment. By quality enhancement, the scope for increasing consultancy widens which leads to generation of more funds.

Every teacher of the college has about 40 students as mentees. The primary role of a mentor is to provide guidance and support to the mentees based upon her unique developmental needs. Mentors give advice and guidance, share ideas, and get feedback; and discuss personal issues if required. 6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

Response:

IQAC is a important administrative body of a college. To maintain the quality standards after the first cycle is a major step and it is the responsibility of IQAC which has been functioning at the college level since August 2012. After the first cycle of NAAC, it was constituted as per NAAC/UGC guidelines which is as follows-

Under the Chairmanship of the Principal it includes senior-most teachers as a convener, co-convener and members. There is one representative of the Govt. Some educationists, one or two nominees from local society as a public representative, NGO., Industry parent representative, students, alumni and stakeholders are an essential part of IQAC set up.

IQAC has fostered innovation and creativity in the college by improving the work culture of teaching, non-teaching staff and students through exhibitions, group discussions, poster presentation and study tours etc. IQAC initiated a significant tradition of taking feedback from students and ensuring their complaints/suggestions be implemented regarding teaching and learning process. It also motivated the faculty members to organize Conference/Seminars/ workshops, participate in FDP and increase research-extension activity etc.. As a result Departmental workshops/seminars were successfully organized by different departments. IQAC prepared and submitted the proposal for vocational studies to U.G.C. and successfully started these courses. IQAC prepared and submitted the proposal of College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) and submitted it to CCS University, Meerut and UGC.

Skill development programs were conducted. In every quarter IQAC organized the meetings with teacher & students separately to upgrade and monitor the teaching & learning process. Biometric Attendance System has been installed for teachers since 2016, and for B.Ed students from the current year. However, conventional attendance register exist simultaneously. Feedback form were printed and distributed to the students. The feedback committee collected and analyzed the forms and handed over the Annual Feedback report to IQAC Cell. Recently a link was created on the college website where students, alumni, parents send their feedback online. SmartBoard, Visualizer, PRS, Online Test were used in teaching by some departments. Electronic Media and Social media platforms like Whatsapp were

extensively used for P.G. students for delivery of educational content. .

Academic Audit and monitoring of students attendance is the two best example of reviewing and implementing teaching learning reforms. After the end of each academic session, the teachers have to submit online academic audit. This is a performance-based appraisal system. It scrutinized the teacher's work for an academic year.

Monitoring of the attendance of the students helps the teachers to find out the reason of their short attendance They are counseled and postcards are sent to the parents who are also convinced of the need for regular attendance. Short attendance noticed are circulated and displayed and students are personally informed. This system helped to stop the low percentage of attendance.

It is very important to inculcate and enhance the values and norms of gender equity and sensitization among the students and teachers. Institution shows gender sensitivity in providing facilities regarding safety, security, counselling and common room facilities.

Safety and Security:

This is a girls' college for higher education situated in rural area. The college is in advantage in the perspective of gender sensitization as the majority of the college faculty including the principal are females. Moreover, various college level committees are constituted for the goal of gender equity which are as follow:

1. Women Cell

Women cell has been established for the overall safety and security of the college students. The gender related problems and issues are taken care under the cell. The members of this cell organise extension lectures, competitions, nukkadnataks, presentations and awareness rallies related to legal and social initiatives. "Power Angels" have been nominated among the students to bridge the gap between teachers and students. A "Pink Box" has been installed on the college wall for those students who hesitate to speak up the gender related problems. The new schemes and policies of Govt. and Police have also been communicated to the students. Women Helpline nos. and information regarding different apps like "UPCOP" have also been published on wall magazine and notice boards of the college time to time.

1. Women Harassment and solution (Internal dispute) committee

This is initiative of U.P. Government and constituted under Govt. norms since 2017-18

This committee takes care of all the harassment related issues, if any. A monthly report of this committee has to be submitted to Director, Higher education and regional director.

1. Student welfare Cell

This cell works for the meritorious poor students for providing them with financial help. A fund with willing contribution from the staff members is mentioned for the purpose.

1. The proctorial board

The proctorial board of the college is working in the field of Discipline and order among students. Any problem or issue is solved under this board as per the norms. To ensure the anti social elements can not enter into college campus, a guard has been appointed. CCTV camers have also been installed in different spots of the college for safety and security.

1. A National Seminar on "Role of education in protection of women safety and security" was held in the college in 4th February 2015.

There are separate complaint cum suggestion boxes in each faculty building for the quick redressal of any Gender specific problem which requires sensitive handling and special care. The students can drop their complaints and suggestions inside the box. The identity of such students are not disclosed. Besides, the concerned committees also ensure the timely redressal of these complaints.

Other units of college like NSS, NCC, Rangers and cultural committee also organise cultural programme and awareness activities about gender sensitization which have great impact on the students.

Our college also organised National Seminars on Gender issues during last five years, in which learned professors, research scholars and students had great discussions and presentations related to the issue, hence asserted strong commitment towards the goal of gender equity.

Counselling:

Counselling aims at helping the students in solving their academic, social and/or stress related issues. The

subject teachers are closely associated with the students therefore helps in counselling them as they are comfortable in discussing the problem with them.

Apart from it, the college has 'Student Mentoring System'. All the teachers have been allotted nearly 40 students as mentee. They take care of these students in every field. The mentors counsel their mentees time to time in the groups as well as personally. The counselling activity is really helping the students with respect to their problems. The issues, girls can not discuss with their family have also been discussed with the mentors. This is a major step taken towards the goal of providing solutions to student problems.

Common Room:

A spacious and comfortable girls' common room has been established in the college to facilitate the students in their free slots of time during college hours. This room has been designed to give the students a place to relax. They can have informal discussions in the room while socializing with each other. The facilities given in this room are: Bed, Chairs, Television, Magazines, daily News Papers, periodicals and journals to be read in leisure time. Toilet facility is also available next to the common room.

The waste is generated by all sorts of routine activities carried out in the college that includes paper, plastic, napkin, metal food etc. The daily waste is segregated at each level and source. Waste segregation Charts to educate students about the same have been put up in the college at various places.

To reduce waste at college, students and staff are educated on proper waste management practices through lectures, advertisement on notice boards, and display board in the college. Waste is collected on a daily basis from various sources and as dry and wet waste.

Human (Excreta) solid waste disposal system is well connected within the campus and ends up in a soak pit (safety tank) in a eco friendly manner. Through the recent Block Development initiatives the village has got the sewer connection. The college is also planning to get connected to sewer connection.

College has 30 colour coded dustbin which are used for different type of waste. The cleaner collects and segregates and compiles the waste in the dustbin (green and blue) provided at each block and fields into Bio Degradable and Non Biodegradable Waste. Biodegradable waste is used for compost. The College has compost pit in corner of the main ground. The Non Biodegradable Waste is collected by Block Development Waste Collection Trucks on regular basis.

Earlier, in the college the scrap paper was sold to the scrapper after using it on both the sides. But from 2018, an MOU has been signed between the college & an NGO Jagruti, waste paper recycling services, F-3 shopping centre, Man sarover Garden, New Delhi, for the proper and useful utilization of scrap paper. The N.G.O. supplied new rims in exchange of the old used paper on 09.01.2019. JAAGRUTI waste paper recycling services collected 1595.61 kg waste paper. One tonne of recycled paper saves 17 Trees, 26,281 litres of water, 264 kegs of air pollution, 1,752 litres of oil, 4077 KW hours of energy, 82.62 cubic feet of landfill space. The primary goal of solid waste management is reducing and eliminating adverse impacts of waste materials on human health and environment to support economic development and superior quality of life.

On 16 sep 2018 Ozone Day was celebrated in the college. Dr. Dimple Viz , Associate Professor M.M.H. College Ghaziabad was keynote speaker. Since then the red box for e-waste management and compost pit were introduced. Cloth bags were distributed to the teachers and students by Shri Chitragupta Sabha Trust (Reg.) Noida. All the college students and teachers swore not to use the plastic. The trust donated sanitary napkin vending machine and sanitary Napkin Destroyer machine (Incinerators) for the college students.

Liquid waste management

Liquid wastes mainly consist of waste water from residential, commercial and industrial areas in towns and cities. Sewage water mainly has 99.9 percent of water and rest 0.1 percent of organic and inorganic substances. The college focuses on efficient use and proper management of Liquid Waste by following Intelligent practices for reducing Water Footprint:

Intiatives for Efficient Use:

- Sprinkler are used in college for Green Area Watering.
- Double flush toilets are used in newly constructed and renovated toilets in college building.
- Use of push button taps in drinking water supply

- Waste Water treatment plant to be installed in future.

Initiatives for proper management of Waste:

- To provide clean Drinking Water AMC is been done for Water Purifiers.
- Recharge pits are constructed near the hand pumps for percolation of waste water from hand pumps.
- RO waste water is diverted to Rain Water harvesting Structures
- Roof Top Water tanks are Cleaned and leakage is checked periodically.
- Condensed water of AC is used for Gardening.

• E-waste management

The rapid expansion of technology led to surplus use of Electronic goods creating huge amount of e-waste. The college initiated e-waste collection system on 17th Sep 2018 by setting up of a Red Box for collection of Personal e-waste of Teachers and Students in the campus.

The printer Cartridges of printers are refilled and reused. UPS batteries are recharged, repaired and refilled. In the session 2019-20 college has exchanged 24 batteries(Old to New).

We are in talks to sign up an MOU with some e-waste collection Agency for the e-waste disposal.

The E-waste policy of U.P. Govt. is still awaited therefore we are still not able to recycle e-waste as yet at the Institutional level.

Various Awareness programme on e- goods usage and e-waste collection have been conducted by “Eco Restoration and Green Audit Committee” in and around the college campus through Guest Lectures and Awareness Rallies.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

Rainwater harvesting is a technique of collection and storage of rainwater into natural reservoirs or tanks, or the infiltration of surface water into subsurface aquifers. The college has 3 Roof Top Rain water Harvesting Structures in the campus. These Structures help in 100% recharging of Rain Water/ Waste Water in the campus.

The runoff from terrace of the college building is channelized into three recharge units located at three different locations, each measuring 2*9 square feet each. In the college building a network of pipes linked through chambers take the rainwater (RO, A.C., Tap Water etc) to the recharge units. To facilitate ground water recharge all structures are provided with borewells. All concrete structure has a well connected network of PVC pipes which carry the rain water and other water (RO, A.C., Tap Water etc) to the Recharge Structure through Chambers having Filter Media. Various layers of filter media is filled inside the recharge wells to ensure proper filtration of harvested water.

Unit 1 of Rainwater harvesting Structure was built by U.P. Jal Nigam in 2005-2006. The filter Media of this Structure is to be replaced by new Filter Media . The unit 2 and 3 Rainwater harvesting Structures were built by U.P. Rajkiya Nirman Nigam along with the Science/Commerce/ B.Ed/ M.P. Hall. College invites Civil Engineers for inspection of rainwater harvesting structures. The Rainwater harvesting Structures are functioning efficiently and contribution towards a better and greener future.

Response:

To reduce CO2 emission, energy consumption and Water usage the college has active "Nature Club" under the banner of "Eco Restoration and Green Audit Committee". The committee also appointed students as Green Ambassadors for creating environmental awareness among students and in nearby villages. The green practices of college are as follows:

- The feedback analysis of the Student Response depicts that 64% of the students use Public/ sharing transport as a step towards positive green impact, 20% of the students adopt a further more greener way by coming to college on foot, 2% of the students use bicycles.
- The teaching and Non-Teaching Staff use "Car Pool" practice to reduce Carbon Footprint.
- Single use Plastic is prohibited inside the Campus.
- To make the campus paperless, the uses of group mails/ whatsapp groups have been promoted. Nowadays, Online Admission and Examination System and many of the official works are done and communicated through group mails which definitely saves quantum of papers. Teaching and Internal Examination System in M.Sc. Zoology is Paperless.
- 5KVA Solar Invertor with Solar Panels is Installed in M.Sc. Zoology and is functional.

- 324 LED Lights are installed in College Building and the Electronic gadgets are purchased according to Star Rating Guidelines.
- The campus has rich Biodiversity, consisting of 200 big and 295 small trees of various Species. Classification and naming of Flora has been done successfully in the Campus. Some of the common species of Fauna of the college includes parrots, sparrows, crows, earthworms, lizards, spiders, peacocks, butterflies and snakes. The flora includes plant species like Kadamba, Neem, Pipal, Eucalyptus, Ficus, Gulmohar, Kaner, Saptaparni, Champa, Ashoka and variety of Palms etc.
- To follow up Swachh Bharat Abhiyan of Government of India, many awareness programs were organized time to time about cleanliness. Rally and displaying boards like 'Say No to Plastics' and 'Reduce, Reuse and Recycle methods' were made to propagate the awareness among the students regarding the importance of cleanliness. Various Awareness Programmes and Plantation Drives have been conducted in and around Badalpur Village Under the banner of Swachta Samiti of College.

BEST PRACTICE-I

TITE OF THE PRACTICE: The Departmental Council Activities

OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTICE:

- To provide leadership training to students
- Motivate students to be socially aware and responsible citizen.
- Help to enhance the all-round personality of the students.
- To promote aesthetic development, character building and organizing capacity.
- Activities help the talents of the young minds and give them an opportunity to develop their specialized skills.

THE CONTEXT

Each department plans activities which compliment but are not part of the conventional academic curriculum. Participating in them not only develop students academic potentials but also other aspects of their personality such as self-esteem, self-confidence, social cooperation and leadership skills. Activities should be educationally relevant so that they can associate with it. The sole goal of education should be to ensure the holistic development of students. Holistic development is basically the development of everyone's intellectual, emotional, social, physical, artistic, creative and religious values. Activities develop hidden skills of students and provide an opportunity to the students to share their creativity. They are also open to students who show exceptional skill in their studies and are able to develop ahead of their peers.

THE PRACTICE

Literary and co-curricular activities are organized by each department for the development of linguistic skill and mental faculties. Debate, discussion, declamation, speech, story writing, essay writing are some of the literary and academic activities. Activities supplement and compliment the entire aesthetic as well as spiritual development, which are the essential components of education .It helps in developing features like speech fluency , creativity and organizing skills and are a good platform to excel. Leadership skills are enhanced by selection of President, secretary, treasurer, class representatives who function as leaders of students of the department for the whole year.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

Departmental council activities not only make the students active and energetic but also enable to harness the in depth potential of students. It enhances knowledge in many domains, which benefits the student as well as college; activities are good platform to promote leadership quality. Creativity form of expression serve as nourishment for the soul. Every year each department conduct many programme/activities under association. These activities provide the opportunity to the learner for self-expression. Activities have academic and literary activities like Debates, painting, exhibition, pot decoration, Rangoli, music and fine arts develop aesthetic sensibility of the learner. These are helpful in unfolding and extracting the hidden beauty in the mind of students. Cultural activities provide better knowledge and understanding of our rich culture heritage.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

- 5.Increase and effectively manage the resources and research support for its members.
- 6.Contribute to the university's strategic educational and research mission and to support synergies between research, teaching, and learning.
- 7.Transfer and mobilize knowledge gained through research for the benefit of society.
- 8.Increase the number of publication in indexed journals.

THE CONTEXT

The college is a unit of higher education which aims at providing high quality education at low cost. Gone are the days when academicians would sit in ivory towers and look down upon lesser mortals. The current demand of the society is for the learned to come down to earth and return to the society what they have received in a more beneficial form. The repute of any educational institution rests on teaching – learning process and research activities. Research therefore is the back bone for the development of the students, teachers and the institution The college being conscious of this state of affairs, has been giving dynamic thrust towards developing and augmenting the research activities of the college to keep abreast of the advances in the fields of science, commerce and arts.. Inculcating research aptitude in faculty members and students has taken priority almost equal to the teaching-learning process. The competency of the students to face the challenges of the society at the end of their tenure will be enhanced not just by their grades and

ranks but the ability to apply their knowledge, analyse the problem, synthesize a solution and value the outcome. These skills are developed by working on real time projects during their academic career. In order to direct the students along these lines, the faculty also have to be fully equipped in planning and guiding research. Just as much as the teaching learning process is a partnership between the teacher and the student, so also is the research and development process in which the guide and the researcher have equal role to play. In most P.G. Courses through dissertations and projects and effort is made to introduce the students to the fundamentals of research.

The outcome of research should be relevant to the societal needs and the society. Therefore, taking up research activities shapes a person with moral responsibility and a value system that enhances his/ her commitment towards fulfilling the needs of the society. Thus the college wishes to show- case the R&D activities of the college as one of the best practices and has worked hard towards its promotion during the last five years.

THE PRACTICE

1. The final year students have to take up and complete project work. Turning this to the advantage of students, the nature of project work assigned to the students is of quality and sometimes if the students wants to do Ph.D. latter on the topic of the project it is expended to lead to her synopsis for Ph.D.
2. Faculty pursuing Ph.D and with Ph. D. degrees are encouraged to attend and present papers in national and international conferences to get exposed to recent and emerging trends in their fields of interest.
3. Eminent researchers are invited to campus for delivering lectures during National and International seminars/ workshops/ conferences organized by the various departments in the college to boost the knowledge level of the faculty and the students.
4. Memorandums of Understanding have been signed with GBU & I.T.S. engineering college and other agencies and such a practice plays a vital role in interaction of faculty and students with the industries and design projects in collaboration with them. These Institutions has rich library facilities also which act as catalyst for students in preparing research materials.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

Eleven departments have been recognized as research centres by C.C.S.University, Meerut since the last cycle of NAAC. We have increased research scholars from 0 to 53 since last cycle of NAAC. Faculty members have been conferred with Ph. D in the last five years and 4 faculty members are actively engaged in pursuing the degree. One Women Scientist of DTS working in college and 5 PDF are submitted in different departments.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:

1. Sustained motivation of students is always a challenge
2. Time constraint is a spoke in the wheel, in planning and execution of research specially during formative and summative assessment processes.
3. Timely funds from agencies are always welcome but in adequate.
4. If the funding agencies can point out the reason for rejecting the proposal or offer suggestions for improvement, it will go a long way in the development to faculty and hence the students.
5. Library resources are not rich enough due to lack of adequate grants.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

Under the flagship of U.P. Govt., KMGGPGC, Badalpur was established in 1997 and is affiliated to C.C.S. University, Meerut. Initially the college was started as a co-educational institution and later it was converted into an all-girls one, with the aim of providing quality higher education to rural girls, and enhancing their opportunities of learning and making them independent. It was hoped that educating rural women would not only change their own life but of the entire family and in turn the entire country. This was in keeping with the **vision of our college is to provide low cost quality higher education to the girls students of socio-economically weaker sections of the area in order to bridge the rural-urban divide and thus bring about holistic national development.** It is, therefore, a matter of pride that our college which was started with 26 students presently has a strength of around 2000 students.

Focusing on the vision, the college provides quality education in professional and vocational courses along with traditional courses at very low cost. The college is imparting professional courses like B.Ed. is being run at nominal fees of Rs.5000 and B.Voc. degree at Rs. 6500, research facilities in the form of Ph.D. and PDF at one time fees of only Rs. 5000 whereas in private institutions one has to pay in lakhs for such courses. For enhancing students' professional skills, 10 Add-on courses and various skill development programmes are being run in the college free of cost. The college also provides a platform to students to enrich their communication skills and basic computer skills through language lab and computer lab respectively. Various ICT tools are used in providing education.

All the faculty members are qualified as per UGC norms and selected by UPPSC, Prayagraj. Initially the college was started with 5 permanent teachers, at present this number has increased to 49. In the institution, 35 teachers are Ph.D. holders and some of them are gold medallists in their respective subjects. In the college, B.A., B.Sc. B.Com. and professional courses such as B.Ed., B.Voc. are running successfully. In Faculty of Arts there are 13 subjects at U.G. level and 9 at P.G. level while in Faculty of Science there is one subject at P.G. level. As a part of B.Ed. curriculum, an Internship Programme is conducted annually in adopted inter colleges. In the Postgraduate Programmes, various field surveys are conducted in nearby villages. The college has also organised various National Seminars, Workshops and Symposiums sponsored by UGC, ICSSR and Dept. of Higher Education, U.P. to energise and channelize the thought process of the intellectuals. The college had the privilege to receive fund from UGC for two study centres i.e. Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Study Centre and Swami Vivekanand Study Centre. The central idea behind establishing these two centres is to propagate the ideas of the luminaries and to inculcate values about the life contribution of eminent personalities to society and the country. Various activities such as lectures, certificate courses, competitions etc. are organised to impart awareness among students. Our

college has a IGNOU centre through which 20 different courses are offered to help in giving wings to productive careers and provide cost effective education.

Most of the students reside in rural areas and belong to economically weaker sections. To meet the requirement of financial need, the college assists meritorious students with scholarships provided by Dept. of Social Welfare, Govt. of U.P. Apart from the Govt., our college has formed a special fund for poor and needy students that helps in decreasing the number of dropouts. Aside from financial assistance, academic assistance such as providing books, organising remedial and tutorial classes, is also given to reduce dropout rate. The college also organises free coaching for various competitive examinations.

Most of the students belong to socially backward classes and their parents have low educational and career aspirations. Thus, counselling is provided to students as well as parents from time to time through parent-teacher meetings, career counselling and mentoring to motivate and encourage them to make the most of their education and also think of having a career.

The college endeavours for the holistic development of the students through organising various extra-curricular activities such as competition, sports, seminar etc. Besides teaching process, Departmental Association is constituted to develop reasoning and intellectual qualities of students. Under the banner of this association various competitions such as debates, essay writing, slogan writing, mehndi, poster and quizzes are organised. Institution has Literary- Cultural Committee that promotes the quality of extra-curricular activities such as drawing, poem writing, rangoli, oratory skills, dramatic skills etc.

To share the social responsibilities and to develop the quality of leadership, NSS, NCC and Rangers Units are actively working at local, state and national level. Presently 200 NSS volunteers, 53 NCC cadets and 132 Rangers are enrolled to participate in social work through rallies, awareness camp, tree plantation, cleanliness, extension activities etc. These units are working to develop quality of team spirit, leadership and discipline among students. Under the banner of Rangers, NSS, NCC, students are trained in self-defence. A Gandhi Gallery is a valuable part of the college that showcases his life history and philosophy. To inculcate patriotism among students, a “Wall of Heroes” has specially been designed in the college which focuses on educating students about the soldiers who won Paramvir Chakra. At the entrance of the Arts block, pictures of prominent freedom fighters are displayed so that students can become aware about the sacrifices made by them. To show the creativity of the students, a wall magazine is maintained on regular basis. Apart from these, various departmental notice boards and career counselling notice boards are exhibited and updated on regular basis.

In short, our college is striving hard to enrich the knowledge, inculcate research aptitude and make the rural girls come at par with the best students in India. Taking regular strides, we have thus been working relentlessly towards the achievement of our primary vision.
