

## Breaking open the Word

### 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### Reflection

As we near the end of the liturgical year, our Gospel reading focuses on life after death, the resurrection of the dead. In today's reading from Luke, the Sadducees set a trap for Jesus. The Sadducees did not believe in life after death and set up an improbable scenario and cited Jewish law and Moses. Jesus deftly upends their absurd example and uses their own citations to refute their argument and affirm life after death, the resurrection of the dead.

Each time we recite the Nicene Creed, we affirm: "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." And our Catechism tells us: "Christ will raise us up on the last day, but it is also true that, in a certain way, we have already risen with Christ. For by virtue of the Holy Spirit, Christian life is already now on earth a participation in the death and Resurrection of Christ. (CCC1002)

In the first reading, from Maccabees, the seven brothers judged their present on their hope for the future and our responsorial psalm today reminds us "in justice I shall behold your face, on waking I shall be content in your presence."

In the Gospel, Jesus differentiates between the children of this age who have their sights set on material concerns and those who live their life focused on the "coming age." As we go forth from Mass into the coming week, how will we live our lives as messengers of the promise of Jesus?

## 32nd week in Ordinary Time

As we draw toward the end of the liturgical year, our first reading this week is taken from **Wisdom**, a book written to encourage a downtrodden Jewish community. The vivid imagery offers us a view of the glory and justice of the Lord. "The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them." In **Luke's Gospel**, Jesus turns his focus away from the Pharisees and back to his followers. "If your brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him." He tells them the duties of discipleship, asking if a master should be grateful to a servant who does what is commanded. "So should it be with you." We read of the curing the ten lepers - yet only one returns to give thanks. "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you." He also tells us that we should not spend our lives looking for the coming of the Kingdom "for behold, the Kingdom of God is among you." The Kingdom of God is coming, when we least expect it and, "Whoever seeks to preserve his life will lose it, but whoever loses it will save it." We must "pray always without becoming weary."

## Our daily and Sunday collections

As good stewards, we are grateful to God for his many blessings. In gratitude we share with those who are in need. The collection at Sunday AND daily Mass is a part of our liturgy, not apart from it, and is a sign of our willingness to give all that we have to the Lord for the maintenance of the church and the care of the poor. It is also expressive of what the Eucharist means in terms of our relationship with others. In the early Church, everyone brought up what they had brought, eggs, or produce or chickens or grain, or bread or wine. Some was used for the celebration and the rest was used for the benefit of the Church so that all were taken care of and no one was in need. Today, we share what we have with money. Our collection—daily and Sunday—gives tangible support to our faith in action and to our thankfulness to our Creator.

## Stewardship envelopes for 2014

As good stewards of what is given to us, we must be also good stewards in preserving creation. Paper items must be used appropriately and as we prepare for 2014 we will make a change in how our stewardship envelopes are given out.

To comply with charitable giving for tax purposes, a person must give a minimum of \$250. After looking at our records, those who do not meet that minimum for annual giving will not receive envelopes for 2014. We suggest that you use a plain envelope with your name on it; you will be responsible for tracking your own gift-giving. Therefore, for those who give above the minimum, your assigned number may change.
