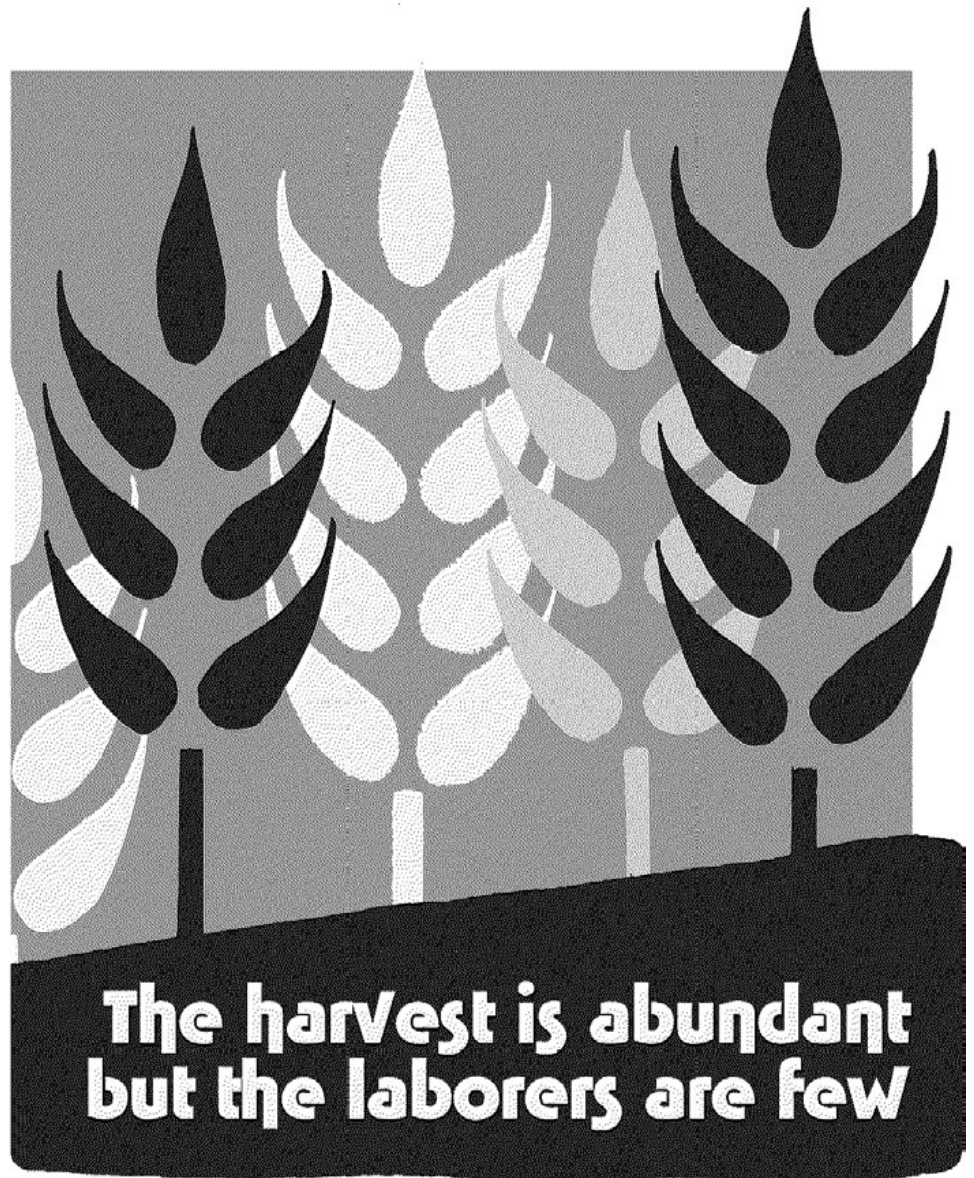

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Breaking open the Word

10th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Life and death are great mysteries. We know we are born to die. We know that we live in gradual diminishment.

With the coming of Jesus, we also are people of hope in Life beyond this life. We need not even ask for what will enhance our life; Jesus comes with all we need. We accept the Life and Hope he offers us when we in turn give this to others. A smile showered on an overly exhausted parent towing a youngster along in the supermarket can bring Life and Hope. A word of encouragement to the insecure can bring Life and Hope. A touch of comfort for the sick can bring Life and Hope. None of these simple gestures needs to be requested.

Like Jesus, our compassion spills over without asking. Like Jesus, we die to self for the good of the other. The cadence and rhythm of our daily living is the paschal mystery where self-giving and Life-receiving are a defining rhythm of all our works and deeds.

In Jesus "God has visited his people." He brings gifts that are only God's to give: Life and Hope. No wonder news of Jesus' words and deeds spread rapidly! In him something new is happening. Death is not an end, but a sign of God's power and saving grace.

In Jesus God continues to visit us, offering Hope and Life, even without our asking. Do we accept?

Daily Prayer

Having celebrated God's love for us through the Eucharist on Sunday, we are ready to enter this week to explore the depth of that love and the powerful call each of us is given to love one another. The Sermon on the Mount can help us be contemplatives in action this week. The Beatitudes are not eight new commandments. Rather, Jesus saw those following him and saw their weakness and their need, their goodness and their desire, even the cost they pay to follow him. He looked at them and called them "Blessed."

Let us all begin this week letting Jesus look at us and call us blessed. Each morning we can practice choosing to focus our attention on some way we are spiritually poor or desiring justice, some way we are merciful or a peace maker, some way we might be experiencing the cost of being a believer, and simply asking our Lord to convince us of our blessedness there. It is likely that each of us, every day, can be attentive to some aspect of our daily lives, some part of our relationships or responsibilities, that place us right there in a place for Jesus to tell us that we will be comforted, satisfied, blessed beyond our imagining.

Some day this week, each of us will have the opportunity to be the salt that makes relationships, faithful living, have its flavor. We will have our chances to be light in the midst of the darkness that crosses our paths. We can ask Jesus those days - whether in the morning, or in brief background moments during the day - to have us not lose our flavor or to cover our light. And, all of us will face the greater responsibility of a disciple of Jesus, to avoid anger and find the path to reconciliation, to turn from lust and greed and to love genuinely and honestly.

Tenth Week in Ordinary Time

During the week, we begin a three week period of looking at the Books of Kings. Elijah follows the Lord's direction and changes the hearts of many. The week ends as Elijah calls Elisha into service for the Lord.

This week we begin reading the Gospel According to Matthew, starting with the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus is the new Moses, and offers us a new and radical teaching. It begins by his telling small group of followers that they are blessed - not because they have their acts together, but because they are spiritually poor, meek, those desiring justice, the merciful, the clean of heart, the peacemakers and the persecuted. Salt and light explain who they are as disciples. They are to obey the law and prophets which Jesus came to fulfill. Whereas the law forbade killing, Jesus calls his disciples to be reconcilers. The law forbade adultery, but Jesus warns about lust and whatever is an occasion for sinning. The law forbade taking false oaths, but Jesus calls his disciples to a deeper fidelity and integrity.

In this encyclical, Pope Francis asks us to look deeply at our consumer-driven society and throw-away culture.

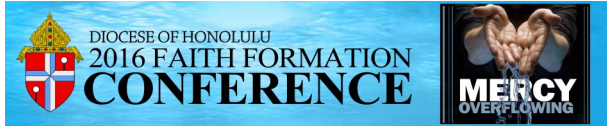
