Dr. Roberta C. Bondi



Dr. Roberta C. Bondi is professor emerita of church history and spirituality, Candler School of Theology, Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. In her work as a church historian Dr. Bondi has sought to make the wisdom

of the early church and the insights of monastic spirituality available to contemporary Christians.

Her books, *To Pray and To Love* and *To Love as God Loves*, explore the life of prayer as exemplified by Christian monks of ancient Egypt. Dr. Bondi, also wrote *Memories of God*, *In Ordinary Time: Healing Words of the Heart*, and *Wild Things: Poems of Grief and Love; Loss and Gratitude*. In addition, Dr. Bondi is a retreat and workshop leader.

Dr. Robin Darling Young



Dr. Robin Darling Young is a historian of early Christianity and its literature. Her work concentrates upon the regions of Eastern Mediterranean: Greek, Syriac, and Armenian.

She graduated from Mary Washington College, and received her MA and PhD from the University of Chicago. Professor Darling Young has written extensively on topics and authors from the late-first century through the sixth, directed numerous dissertations in early Christian history and thought. Most recently, she has concentrated on the works of the monastic philosopher Evagrius of Pontus. She is directing a translation project of his Gnostic Trilogy, is the solo translator of his Letters from the Syriac in which they were preserved, and is finishing a book-length study of his extensive work on the implications of Christian askesis, or discipline, in the context of early Egyptian monasticism. She is the President-of the North American Patristic Society.

Dr. Gary W. Moon



Gary W. Moon (PhD, MDiv, Fuller Theological Seminary) served as the founding director of the Martin Family Institute and Dallas Willard Center for Christian Spiritual Formation at Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California. He also served as the founding director of the Renovaré International Institute for Christian Spiritual Formation and the founding editor of *Conversations Journal*. Presently he serves as distinguished professor of psychology and Christian spirituality at Richmond Graduate University, the director of *Conversatio Divina*, the resource development center for the Martin Institute, and as co-director of Fuller's doctor of ministry degree program in spiritual direction, which blends ancient Christian spirituality, Ignatian spirituality, and spiritual formation insights from Dallas Willard. Recent books include: *Becoming Dallas Willard*, *Apprenticeship with Jesus*, and *Falling for God*.

Dr. Charles Nienkirchen



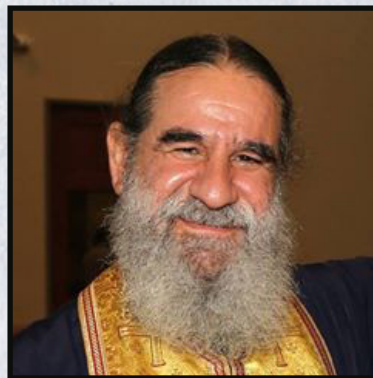
Dr. Charles Nienkirchen is professor of Christian history and spirituality at Ambrose University in Calgary, Alberta. For many years he was visiting professor of Christian spirituality at Tyndale Seminary in Toronto, Ontario. As well, he has been visiting scholar in

residence at Oxford University, England, Tantar Ecumenical Institute in Jerusalem and Tamilnadu Theological Seminary in Madurai, South India. Concern for integrating academics and spirituality took him to the Pecos Benedictine School for Spiritual Directors near Santa Fe, New Mexico.

With German Methodist roots and a surname that translates as “new church”, his teaching, research, writing, and ecumenical retreat ministry have focused on the historical, theological, and practical dimensions of spiritual renewal. Also, he is the founding director of Down Ancient Paths, a government award winning travel study program at Ambrose University, which explores and seeks to dialogue with the oldest Christian traditions in the world. He has been a global traveller across North America, Central and South America, the British Isles, Europe, Russia, the Middle East, Asia, and Africa, giving him an extensive exposure to Christianity’s capacity to incarnate itself in a broad spectrum of host cultures. His personal spiritual journey has been “multi-culturalized” and immeasurably enriched by life-empowering formational experiences in Eastern Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Anglican, Protestant, and Pentecostal/Charismatic traditions.

The Rev. Joshua Toepper is a priest in the Anglican Church of North America and the pastor of adult discipleship at Mt. Bethel United Methodist Church in Marietta, Georgia. He holds a Master of Divinity and Master of Arts in intercultural studies from Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky, and a ThM from Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. He will begin work on a PhD in missiology studying the missional spirituality of John Wesley’s English preachers at the University of Manchester (United Kingdom) in early 2020.

Rev. Dr. Panayiotis Papageorgiou



The Rev. Dr. Panayiotis Papageorgiou was born on the island of Cyprus. He holds a Bachelor’s Degree in Chemical Engineering from City College, New York, a Master of Science in Chemical Engineering from the University of

Notre Dame, a Master of Divinity from Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology, Brookline, Massachusetts and a PhD in Early Christian Studies from the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC.

He has served as a priest in the US and Cyprus and taught Orthodox Theology and Spirituality in Cyprus, Jerusalem, Canada and the US. Presently, he serves as pastor of Holy Transfiguration Greek Orthodox Church, in Marietta, Georgia.

Fr. Panayiotis continues to pursue research in the Late Antique Roman History and Theology and is the author of many articles. He has recently published the book: *Homilies on Romans by St. John Chrysostom, Volume 1*, (modern English translation) Holy Cross Press, 2013 and is working on the second volume.

Fr. Panayiotis and his wife, Catherine, have two children, a son (Efstratios) and a daughter (Olympia).
