History

Still bordered on all sides by original colonial roadways, the church and cemetery capture one's imagination for those who may have traveled this very parcel of land throughout the past 200 years. Ranging from horse-drawn carriages traveling up and down Delaware's first "National Scenic Byway" to lavish events just across the road at Henry DuPont's famed Winterthur estate, the church and cemetery have always been cast as favored landmarks along the way.

For more than 200 years, a number of celebrated business leaders, politicians, and otherwise

influential community notables have been interred at Lower Brandywine. It is our rich history, fabled setting, and thoughtful attention to duty that sets us apart from others.

Lower Brandywine Presbyterian Church

One of the oldest churches in America and the oldest in Delaware, the Lower Brandywine Presbyterian Church was originally established on land deeded by King George I in 1720 and was then in "the County of Chester, in the Providence of Pennsylvania," 56 years before the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The original building was log construction which was later renovated to include new exterior clapboards and plastered interiors making it more comfortable and inviting. The church building at its current location was erected in 1860 using some materials from the original structure. Through the years, the building has grown in size along with the congregation into a place of worship rich in history, fellowship, and community.
