# 2005 Highlights of 2005

## Securing priority lands for conservation

The Carden Alvar, a mosaic of globally-rare vegetation communities and significant habitats for grassland and shrubland birds, is clearly a high conservation priority. In recent years, we worked in cooperation with Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC), Ontario Parks, and other conservation groups to purchase Cameron Ranch. This year, we contributed another \$125,000 from local donations to help secure the 1600-acre Windmill Ranch, which will transfer ownership in late January.



We also negotiated the part-purchase, part-donation of another significant property, Prairie Smoke Alvar, from Ms. Karen Popp. This 700-acre parcel, which is scheduled to close in February, contains good-quality alvar habitats as well as limestone forests and wetlands, and abuts the corner of Cameron Ranch.

All of this activity raised the question of long-term targets for the Carden Alvar, so we worked in conjunction with NCC staff and others to develop a 10-year conservation blueprint for this site. By 2015, at least 12,000 acres will be secured, with the Couchiching Conservancy taking on the primary role for stewardship of these lands. This will create the largest area of protected alvar in the world. With current projects and conservation easements, we are already half-way to this target.

Elsewhere in our region, we welcomed the donation of an 86-acre parcel on the Head River near Sebright from Mrs. Gladys Leslie. This property, which will be known as Waterthrush Woods, consists mostly of mature Silver Maple swampland accessible only by canoe.

## A tipping point for The Land Between

Naturalists have long suspected that the band of shallow granite and limestone rocklands along the edge of the Canadian Shield were exceptionally diverse. After several years of urging by volunteer Peter Alley, we formed a collaborative project with the Kawartha Heritage Conservancy, and in

May 2005 hired Ben Porchuk as coordinator for The Land Between project.

Ben has developed a series of partnership projects with universities, provincial and federal agencies, and other nonprofits. These projects are confirming and clarifying the special ecological and cultural values in this corridor, and identifying gaps and opportunities for further protection. We are currently seeking funding to continue The Land Between project for two more years.

## Reaching out to the community

With the help of Rosalie Pratt, 2005 was an exceptional year for community outreach. Our first Earth Day celebration, though cold and wet, was well-received by the 350 participants. A fall event featuring Bob McDonald from *Quirks and Quarks*, a series of workshops, and a Members bus tour provided other opportunities for learning.

A partnership with Scienational Ssnakes enticed hundreds of people at fairs, festivals, and malls to learn first-hand about reptiles and our conservation programs. Our Carden Plain

natural heritage conference was also very successful, leading to follow-up discussions with local landowners and with the aggregate industry.

Printed materials were another important avenue of outreach in 2005, with new publications including a Grant's Woods brochure, Carden Plain Nature Guide, and a Conservancy poster. Major media partnerships with *Orillia Packet & Times*, *Midland Free Press*, and *JackFM* radio also helped promote community involvement.



This year also saw increasing public use of Grant's Woods, including a collaborative educational program delivered by Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre. As part of that project, our tireless volunteers build a new washroom building with composting toilets, and several new footbridges to complete the Grant's Woods trails.

## Building a sustainable organization

Donors to the Conservancy want to know that we will be here for the long term, and we have taken a number of steps towards that goal in 2005. Members are the core of our support, and we achieved a modest growth in individual members this year, with a 78% renewal rate. A major new initiative was our corporate member program, with over 40 local businesses signing on and attending a recognition event in October.

In the past, the Conservancy has benefitted from one major bequest, and we are encouraging this important avenue of support through a planned giving program. A new colour brochure is now available, and we plan to develop fact sheets on various options shortly.

We also approved new guidelines during 2005 for the management of our funds for acquisition and stewardship, including the creation of the Presidents' Fund to provide a reserve for future operating expenses.

Public recognition also helps us build support. This year, we were honoured to be recognized in NCC's national newsletter *The Ark* as a model community partner. We were also selected to host a visit by federal Environment Minister Stephane Dion to celebrate the first 10 years of the Ecogifts program.

## Looking ahead to 2006

At its annual planning meeting, the Conservancy Board identified priorities for 2006, including:

- Complete the Prairie Smoke Alvar acquisition and initiate other Carden projects.
- Sign a conservation easement on a property near Waverley, and possibly several other projects in Oro-Medonte.
- Explore several major securement projects in the southern Shield area in Severn and Ramara townships.
- Develop increased stewardship capacity for Carden Alvar and elsewhere.
- Strengthen the Protect an Acre program and new member recruitment.
- Secure funding for second phase of The Land Between project.
- Host a Mother Earth Day event and the Carden Challenge.
- Publish an updated guide to Conservancy properties. ∞

# 2005 An Overview of 2005 Finances

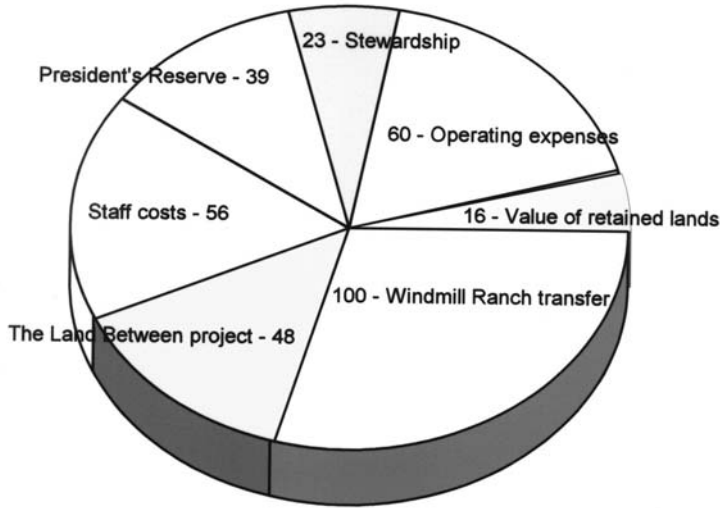
Our overall revenues were considerably higher this year than in 2004, largely because of fundraising for the purchase of Windmill Ranch. Revenue from general donations and memberships increased significantly in 2005, as part of a long-term strategy to decrease our

reliance on foundation grants. As well, several major Foundation grants were received during 2005 to support The Land Between project. The portion of these grants which apply to our 2006 operations are not included as part of 2005 revenues. Approximately \$28,000 in these deferred revenues are on hand for next year.

Overall, our operating expenditures were approximately \$333,000 for the year, including the value of retained lands and a major financial commitment to the purchase of Windmill Ranch (an additional \$25,000 was transferred for that project early in our 2006 fiscal year). As shown in the summary of Allocation of Funds, we were able to allocate approximately \$39,000 to the President's Reserve, as a buffer for future operating expenses.

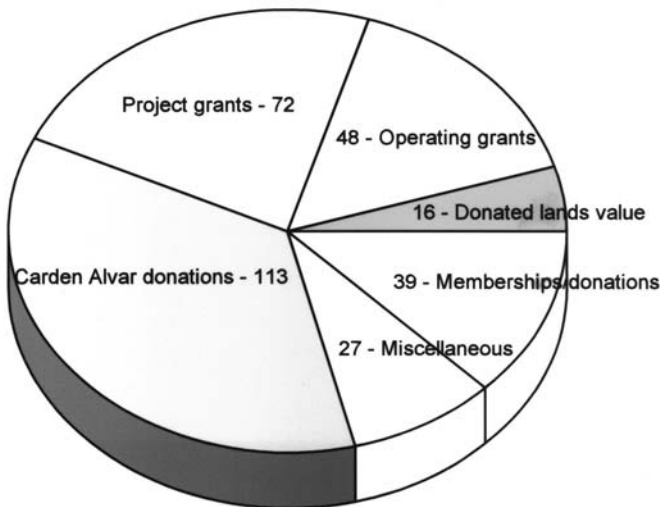
## Allocation of Funds

By Board policy, some funds are held as investments for special purposes. At our 2005 year-end (October 31), the Acquisition Fund contained \$64,042. The Property Stewardship Fund, which is intended to help maintain properties in perpetuity, stood at \$67,709, including a special \$10,000 fund allocated to conservation easement enforcement. Another \$10,000 has been set aside for future major maintenance costs on Grant House. Investments and cash accounts for general operations and projects totalled approximately \$69,000, and our

total equity as an organization has surpassed the \$1 million mark.

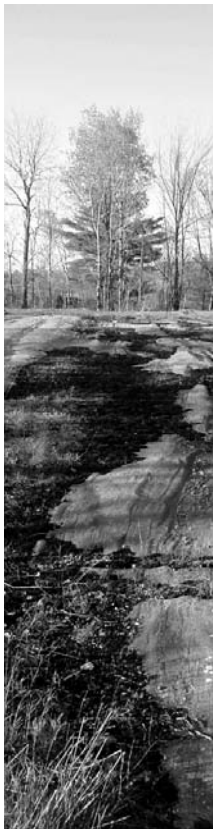
