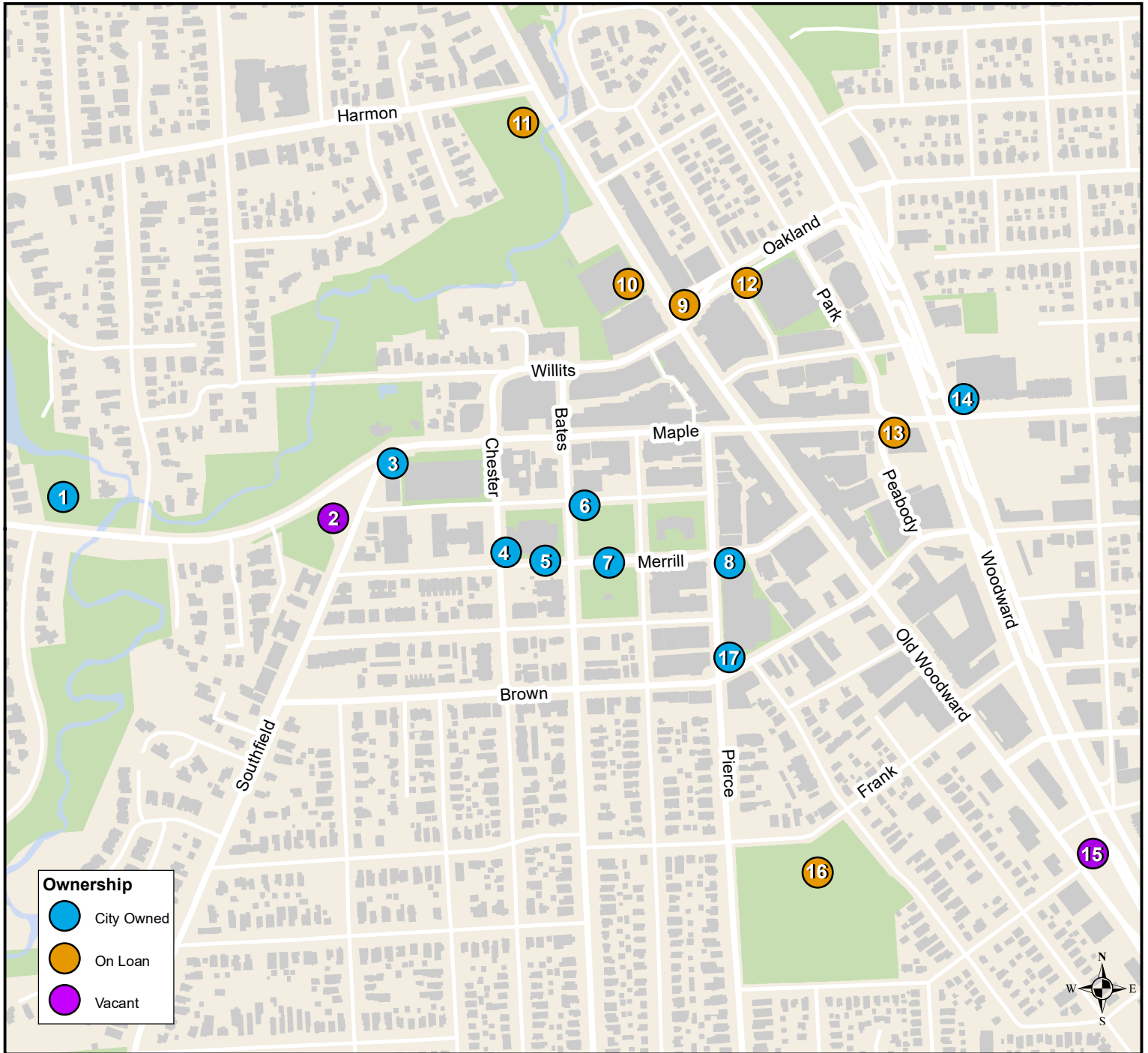


















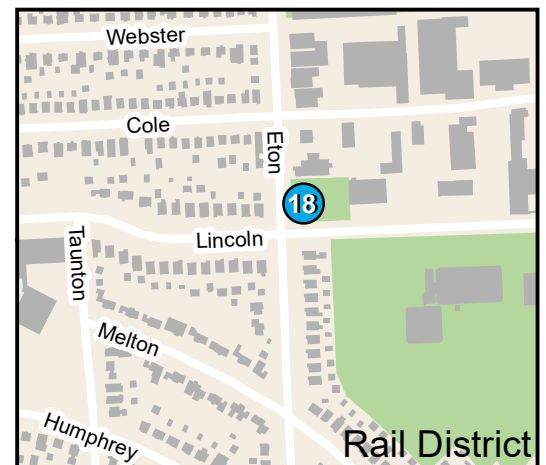

Art in Public Spaces (Formerly Known As Cityscapes)

In an ongoing effort to promote art in public places and enhance the community, the Cultural Council of Birmingham Bloomfield has collaborated with The City of Birmingham's Public Arts Board to create an outdoor sculpture program. The program is managed under the terms of the existing Birmingham outdoor sculpture agreement between the City and the Cultural Council of Birmingham Bloomfield and allows for the temporary installation of art on public property.

The objective of the CityScapes program is to enhance the visual character of Birmingham and to promote a rich, diverse, and stimulating cultural environment for residents and visitors. By placing the work of artists into the community, ideas can be encountered and explored on a daily basis.
