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

**WANT TO HELP ADDRESS ADDICTION?
START WITH YOUR MEDICINE CABINET.**

SAFELY DISPOSE OF OLD AND UNUSED PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION.

Prescription medications can be extremely dangerous if they fall into the wrong hands. It takes mere moments to safely dispose of old medications, but this precaution can have a lifelong impact.



Use a Deactivation Kit



Home Disposal

No kit? No problem! Mix (don't crush) your old and unused medication with cat litter or used coffee grounds. Put this mixture into a sealed container, such as a plastic bag or coffee can, and throw it away.



Drug Take-Back Locations

Take Back Events

The DEA hosts National Prescription Drug Take Back Day events every fall and spring, as well as permanent collection sites year-round.

Follow these simple steps to dispose of medicines in the household trash.

MIX

Mix medicines (do not crush tablets or capsules) with an unpalatable substance such as dirt, cat litter or used coffee grounds.

PLACE

Place the mixture in a container such as a sealed plastic bag.

THROW

Throw the container in your household trash.

SCRATCH OUT

Scratch out all personal information on the prescription label of your empty pill bottle or empty medicine packaging to make it unreadable, then dispose of the container.
