PUBLIC SAFETY IN RURAL ALASKA: FROM STATE NON-ENFORCEMENT TO A FEDERAL EMERGENCY DECLARATION

Despite the best efforts of a number of well-intentioned people, the state has been unable to stand up a sustainable public safety system in rural Alaska. This caused U.S. Attorney General William Barr to declare a historic federal law enforcement emergency earlier this summer. To ensure parity between Alaska's urban and rural public safety systems, the congressional delegation and the state must work with the Native community. This panel will explore options.

INVESTING IN OUR FUTURE: ALASKA'S CONSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

Article VII of Alaska's Constitution requires the state to establish and maintain a public school system, including a state university. Governor Dunleavy's last budget called the state's commitment to educating Alaskan children, particularly those in rural areas, into question. The Native community fought hard to end the harsh boarding school system that existed before the *Molly Hootch* case. PROTECTING OUR FUTURE: ALASKA'S CONSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES FOR PUBLIC HEALTH

Alaskan children in state custody have worse health outcomes than those raised at home with their families. In 2017, the State of Alaska signed a landmark agreement with 17 Alaska Native tribes and tribal organizations to revolutionize Alaska's child welfare system. The purpose of the 'Alaska Tribal Child Welfare Compact' is to help the state deliver services and support at a lower cost and at a higher quality. The Compact, which is also a public-private partnership with Casey Family Programs, is a model of #GoodGovernment. This panel will provide an update on the Compact's implementation, including its current status.
