




QUOTATION SCRAMBLERS

This is a great game to help students learn how to correctly write dialogue.

NOTE: This game can address the following Common Core Standards:

Setting up the Game:


1. Draw a box in the top center of the whiteboard.
2. Write words from the quotation sentence in a scrambled fashion.



3. Capitalize the first letter of the first word to help them know where to begin.
4. Include any punctuation in the box as well.
5. The students then write the words in order to make a complete and correct quotation.

In order to earn a point, the quotation has to have correct capitalization, spacing, correct spelling and punctuation.

6. Once they've completed their sentence, the students hold up their white board.





7. Look at it. If there is one mistake, hold up 1 finger. If there are 2 mistakes, 2 fingers, 3 mistakes, 3 fingers, 4 mistakes, 4 fingers.
8. If there are no mistakes, give them a thumbs up and they tally a point.
9. If they have a mistake they continue to correct the sentence until they get a thumbs up.
10. Once each pair has correctly written the sentence, move onto the next turn.
11. Below is a list of sentences for you to use. You can add or replace sentences according to the needs of your students.
