2. FOUNDRY UPDATE

I. New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) Neighborhood Remediation Update

Note: The NYSDEC update is for Winter 2020 covering December 2020 through March 2021.

Remedial Design

- NYSDEC's engineering contractor continued development of remedial design plans for the group of properties bounded by Genesee Street, State Street and Clinton Street.
- Laboratory analysis was conducted on soil samples collected in October from properties on Wadsworth, Exchange, and Middle Streets. Upon validation the Department will share the analytical results with the respective property owners by January 2021.
- NYSDEC's contractor will continue development of remedial design plans during the winter months.

Remedial Construction

- NYSDEC's construction contractor conducted restoration activities at properties along the east and west sides of Genesee Street north of Genesee Park, as well as properties on Genesee Park Place, the north side of Lewis Street between Exchange Street and Genesee Park, and 19 Lafayette Avenue.
- Landscaping items were installed at additional properties on Genesee Street. Landscaping activities will resume in late spring 2021.
- NYSDEC's contractor has now shut down field activities for the winter. The 2021 construction season likely will begin in March or April 2021, depending on the weather. Work is expected to begin in 2021

at four properties along the east side of Wadsworth Street and then resume in the area of Genesee Street, Lewis Street, and Goodelle Terrace.

II. City Foundry Site Remediation

Foundry remediation and restoration is complete.

Genesee Park Remediation

The NYSDEC and consultant team continue to work on potential alternatives to the Genesee Park remediation plan with the goal of saving more of the trees. City staff will provide updates when available. City Council will ultimately decide on doing the remediation or not.

Resident outreach – City of Geneva

FoodLink Curbside's mobile market's voucher program for fresh vegetables and fruits is operating with strict COVID-19 guidelines on Friday at the Salvation Army from 11:15 AM to 12:30 PM, Seneca Street Apartments 1:45 PM to 2:45 PM, Elmcrest Apartments 3:15 PM to 4:15 PM. The Farmer's Market voucher program is done for the 2020 season. The voucher program for the Dog Park is available. All voucher programs are available for residents waiting for remediation.

The City's liaison for the Foundry work is currently not available. Residents with questions on the NYSDEC's remedial design or construction activities can email Bob Gibson from the State's consultant team from Ecology and Environment, inc. at rgibson@ene.com.

7. PUBLIC COMMENT

David Linger said he is a proud resident of downtown Geneva, and he is asking for common sense winter parking guidelines. He told council that there are only about 12-15 days during the winter that require emergency parking rules. He said that downtown has become a residential location with over 150 market rate apartments and public parking is a necessity. He thanked the DPW for their hard work, and he feels we can all work together and improve communication to the public.

Heather May said I've watched nearly every working session and Council meeting where Local Law 1-2020 has been discussed and I witnessed the difficult and messy process of dialoguing about vitally important issues in an attempt to make a better city in response to the people's calls for transformation. This version of the People's Peaceful Protest bill is not perfect, but it is an essential step forwards in building trust between our community and the police charged with protecting and serving us. It bears the imprint of ideas from all members of this council on all sides of this issue. It is the result of six hard months of talking and listening and researching and I am so excited that we are at the point of voting on a Police Review Bill. Local Law 1-2020 isn't anti police, regardless of what it is named, and it doesn't defund the police. Despite what the detractors of the bill think, it will actually make policing safer for police. If individuals are held accountable through a process involving people and the police leadership, then Genevans will trust they will be treated fairly and have recourse if they are not. You are helping to build trust in our community by holding the police accountable, providing a mechanism through which Police successes can be celebrated, and failures can be rectified. This is a huge thing and you will be remembered by us for being brave enough to make this happen. I am sorry that you voted on Monday to change the name to remove the accountability from the name – not the in the least because the necessity of changing the name throughout the bill has no bearing on the contents of the bill itself, but creates unnecessary labor for city staff and the potential for errors that could drastically alter the bill. I think about the changes that were made between city council meetings that drastically impacted the wording about membership on the board and nearly derailed negotiations on this bill. I know in the urgency of all of the discussions that you have held over the past six months it is easy to feel as though you are working quickly and that it would be best to slow down, but I want you to realize the depth of the work you have done and the potential you have to send us into the new year with hope for a better future. I urge you to set a date tonight before Council adjourns to put this bill up for public comment before Christmas so that you can vote on Local Law 1-2020 in January. What an amazing way that would be to start the new year. Democracy is a process not an end point. A final vote is a victory for everyone on the council because it demonstrates that governance is possible, which is no small thing in the current political environment. Every further delay when the work has been done serves to

diminish faith that council is interested in governing, and to feel that politics are all that matters. You are ready to vote. You are ready to take this important, historic vote to make Geneva a leader in police – community relations and accountability. Your constituents want to witness you taking this brave vote and breathing our hopes for a more perfect city into reality.

Jessica Farrell thanked council for their hard work and said she looks forward to the final version and public hearing for the PRB as soon as possible. She said this has been unnecessarily delayed enough, and this cannot wait any longer. She reminded council that our COVID numbers are steadily rising and it is the time to be social distancing. She said that this council has seen record numbers of people on Zoom. She finished by saying she supports winter parking legislation.

James McCorkle thanked the councilors who have been forward thinking toward an equitable and sustainable future. He said that exclusion of law enforcement members is essential and changing the name of the board may allow for additional complaints. He said that opposition to the PRB has nothing to do with justice, ethics, financial responsibility or crime rate; it is to protect special interest. He said that since sewers are on tonight's agenda, one might ask why the city's infrastructure is constantly being stretched to the breaking point. He questioned why there is no city pool or after school programs, and why we task the GPD to tackle problems that others may be more equipped to solve. He said these issues should compel Geneva to be forward thinking, noting that the PRB will not solve all problems. He said everyone should support the PRB and thanked council for their work.

Hannah Dickinson said that she has watched for months with dismay at the misinformation peddled by some councilors. She said she wanted to clarify her comments from last month as it is her understanding that Officer Montisanto is still receiving insurance and retirement, but is not being paid by the city at this time. She said it is confusing since staff and council cannot discuss his employment, but he is still listed as a city employee on the city website. She said that councilors have worked diligently for the past 6 months on this and she heard that some have received threats and intimidation because of it. She commended council for seeing this through, and asked them to schedule a public hearing tonight. She said the losing side has ways to stall and chip away at this bill.

Michael Bogin said that the proposed zoning change needs to allow more neighborhood participation. He said that the zoning laws last a long time, but right now we are dealing with a short amount of time to notify

all of his neighbors on Slosson Lane about the proposed change from Glenwood to his street. He said there is a potential for creating a tremendous amount of traffic for Slosson Lane as that is the only actual access to this property. He noted that a large buildout using a minimum lot size of 2500 sq ft would be 16 or 17 lots or over 600 housing units. He said he will follow up with a letter, but he is asking council not to rush the rezoning.

Mary Bogin said she also wants to speak about the 38-acre parcel for sale and its impact on Slosson Lane. She noted that the current zoning is agricultural, and by changing it to mixed use, it could produce 17 to 18 houses per acre. She said that traffic would drastically change on Slosson Lane. She asked council to have a public hearing on Zoom, because not all residents know about the changes proposed. She urged council to push this back to March, to consider the changes more carefully, and to allow everyone to speak and be informed.

Christopher Annear said he is in favor of the PRB because it allows us to build trust together, and data will allow us to right-size the police department. He said we can all learn what is needed and where our tax dollars are going. He said he and his ward 2 neighbors would also like to know how we can support our police department. He thanked council for their hard work and encouraged them to set a date tonight to finalize this process.

Leslie Hebb said that she wanted to speak about the rezoning of the area around the cemetery because she lives on Slosson Lane behind the cemetery. She said that her street is quiet with little traffic, but if many houses are built in the lot behind her, traffic will increase and the nature of her street will change. She said that she is concerned with the zoning of mixed residential that will allow more houses than this area is used to.

8. WINTER PARKING PLAN FOR 2020-2021 SEASON DISCUSSION AND COUNCIL DIRECTION

Asst. City Manager Blowers told council that his goal is to get direction from council how to proceed. He said that in the current city code, parking is restricted from 2am to 6am December 1st to April 1st. He said that staff can bring back a plan to update the code as they have been gathering data and include council's input tonight. He noted that there are a lot of people who follow the code, but there are dangerous conditions that arise when there is alternate parking on streets like South Main Street and we have to plow around parked cars. He said that towing has been an issue in the past because there are only so many towing services in and around the city, only a four-hour window, and there are times when there are up to 200 cars. He said that there is definitely a financial impact, but that is not the sole reason, because in the

past three years that the ban has been lifted, DPW crews have had to go out an extra night with overtime to clean where cars were parked and ticketed. He said that ticketing itself is a problem because a \$20 ticket does not always get a person to move. He said that the financial gain is not a reason to change one way or the other.

Mr. Blowers said that staff has come up with a couple ideas such as not allowing parking in the streets but opening up parking in parking lots with no tickets. He said that staff is trying to find one in every neighborhood, although they may not all be convenient. He noted that safety concerns are always there, and notifications have been an issue. He said another though was to just have everyone go to one place to get the information about parking restrictions such as the front page of the city website. Reduced staffing has made text notifications more difficult, and plowing around parked cars leaves a mess or even icy conditions.

Clr. Gaglianese said we are not going to make everyone happy, but we need a plan for those who it will work for and who are asking for it. Clr. Camera said that he likes the idea of putting alerts on the city website and removing restrictions in parking lots, and asked why we can't increase towing capacity by taking cars to an empty city lot rather than out of town.

Clr. Regan said there are so many reasons to go back to the pilot program, and it seems to boil down to notifications. She suggested putting alerts on the radio at the same time every day so people know when to tune in or setting up a toll-free phone line for people to call into. Clr. Pealer said he is also in favor of the pilot, but the problem of people not moving their cars needs to be addressed. He asked if the city could increase the ticket fees to make parking illegally a deterrent. Asst. City Manager Blowers told everyone that his office tried increasing the fees for red tagging and water shut off several years ago, and they cut the number of shutoffs in half. He said that council will want to look at this for a long-term approach. Clr. Pealer suggested robocalls as a way to communicate this information.

Clr. Burrall referred to the number of parking spaces on S. Main Street and the abundance of signs that make it clear when to park from the Prouty Chew Museum to Seneca Street. He then said that there are areas further down where the signs become sparse. He said there are challenges with both systems, but there is common sense which tells people not to park in a certain area when there is snow coming. He also said that common sense should tell us not to give parking tickets to cars when there is no snow on the ground. He said that in order to drive common sense into people, the price of the ticket could be increased to the amount it costs to get a car towed in order to get people to park in the correct places. He noted with COVID, there is more of a need to park at home for residents. He said it is up to the city to find a solution in common sense.

Clr. Salamendra said she agrees with most of the councilor' statements saying that the parking restriction is not necessary especially when it is not snowing. She said she is concerned with the price of the ticket going up and staff levels needed to send out text messages. She suggested a phone line such as the one Connect Geneva uses would be better. She agrees with opening up the parking lots and allowing on street parking if it is not snowing.

Mayor Valentino said that this is all good input and it seems to come down to those who violate the parking ban. He hates to penalize those complying with the law, but finds it challenging for people who repetitively park illegally. Mr. Blowers said he will put a plan together for council tomorrow, noting that for the time being, the restriction will be lifted unless there is a weather event. Staff will put a notice front and center on the website and look into alternative ways to notify residents. Clr. Camera suggested that a press release go out as soon as a decision is made.

9. LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING SEWER RATES

Asst. City Manager Blowers presented the following local law:

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Geneva as follows:

Section I. The purpose of this law is to establish sewer rates for the use of public sewers as set forth in Article #14 of the General Municipal Law.

Section II. Article #14 of General Municipal Law is hereby amended to establish sewer rates based on metered water consumption. The rates established are as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Geneva City Council, hereby and in due form, does amend Chapter 341-19B and 341-21C of the Geneva Municipal Code to reflect changes in the sewer rate table, as illustrated above.

This Law to take effect upon affirmative vote of the Geneva City Council.

Clr Regan said she has been thinking about this and the fact that council was not able to cut taxes as much as they wanted, and would like to kick the list of projects down the road. Clr. Camera said he agrees with Clr. Regan noting that the city still has reserves in case something unexpected happens. Clr Noone said that he was against the rate increases from the beginning, but council needs to be aware of issues needing attention rather than waiting until something goes wrong. Mayor Valentino reminded council that water/sewer bills cascade beyond city residents and both fund balances are well below the established levels, and he is dead set against pulling from fund balance for repetitive costs.

10. SECOND READING OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 341 – WATER RATES

Asst. City Manager Blowers presented the following ordinance for second reading:

WHEREAS, the City's Comprehensive Plan charges us with financing necessary infrastructure and service delivery in a fiscally responsible manner; and

WHEREAS, a robust water treatment and distribution system is critical to attracting and retaining residents and industry; and

WHEREAS, in order to maintain the highest level of service possible for the best value, City Council needs to adjust water rates from time to time to reflect changes in costs of treatment and distribution.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Geneva City Council, hereby and in due form, does amend Section 341-17 and 341-18 to affect the changes to water rates for residents and non-residents, as is outlined on the schedule below. This change to become effective upon two readings of this Ordinance.

11. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY COMPTROLLER TO COLLECT TAX LIENS

14. MAYOR AND COUNCIL REPORTS

Clr. Regan said that the Green Committee continues to meet and have changed the meeting time to the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00pm, and continue to attract new comers. She said that she wanted to set the record straight on a comment she made regarding the PRB and whether there cannot be anonymous complaints. She had referred to the Ethics Committee and apologized and wanted to set the record straight that the Ethics Committee does not accept anonymous complaints. She spoke to the committee members and learned that they do not accept anonymous complaints. Clr. Regan said that the city needs to work on communicating better to residents and neighborhoods deserve to hear how the zoning changes will affect them. She said we need more meetings by wards or zones to help people understand. She said that the public hearing for the PRB also needs to be as accommodating and well-advertised as possible for residents. Lastly, she warned that the number of COVID-19 cases in Ontario County have increased and we need to do all we can to keep it away – wearing masks and social distancing.

Clr. Pealer said that he has nothing to report for the Housing Authority and the Recreation Board is planning to meet next week. With regard to the zoning update, he said that council has heard from people in areas where it will touch their neighborhood. He said that our Comp Plan needs to come into play, but there are contradictions in the plan. He said that one of our large drivers for development is that we need more affordable or low-income housing, but we already the highest number in the region along with the lowest rents. He wondered if we had a large market driving low income to Geneva. He said that he hopes next year council spends more time looking at the issues in the Comp Plan. Lastly, he said that he realizes we try to communicate information to residents, but he feels we need to try for consistency of communication.

Clr. Salamendra said that she is interested in holding the public hearing for the PRB very soon. Attorney Emil Bove said that council could set the public hearing tonight, but they will also need to set a special meeting to agree on the wording of the local law. Clr. Pealer said he wants to make sure everyone has time to read the local law.

After some discussion, council decided to set the special meeting for December 8, 2020 to establish the local law and the public hearing for January 13, 2021. Both meeting will be at 6:00pm.

Clr. Burrall said that the BID recently held their first annual Commit to Geneva Downtown Restaurant Week, and \$3,000 was raised for the Boys and Girls Clubs. He said that the BID had a meeting with

their concerns for the zoning update and a special meeting concerning outdoor dining. He applauded Neal Braman and Joe Venuti who are anxious to do whatever is necessary, including safety issues. He said that the Historic District Commission held a special meeting with the zoning consultants, and many of their issues were addressed. Clr. Burrall said he agrees with Clrs. Regan and Pealer about the zoning and how there seems to be pressure to keep the process moving. He said communications need to go out to the public and we need to work toward more meetings with the consultants. He said he does not feel our January goal is still possible. He said there will be a blood drive December 23 from 9-1:45 at Finger Lakes Medical Associates on North Street.

Clr. Pruettt said that the Historical Society is holding their holiday sale on December 3rd at Prouty Chew Museum, and they just sent out their annual appeal letter. He said the Shadetree Committee will be resuming December 17th, and he gave a hats off to the City Manager, Mayor, Shadetree Chair, Jim Norwalk, and Director of Public Works, Joe Venuti who have all been working exceptionally well to rejuvenate the mission of the Shadetree Committee. He said he would like to resume with the regular work sessions for open communication. He said he resents the way Monday's meeting ended abruptly, and he would have liked to have given his opinion.

Clr. Noone said that the Community Compact held a meet and greet Monday for new members. He said they will meet this month to set their goals for 2021. He said they have been working tirelessly and making extreme efforts to make a difference in our city. He noted that at the beginning of January, one of the staff initiatives was communication, and a majority of council told staff not to place so much emphasis on communication as an initiative, and he hopes council will redirect staff in January to place more emphasis on communication. Clr. Noone wished everyone a Merry Christmas, Happy Holiday Season, and a prosperous and healthy New Year. He noted that our city has become divided, and he hopes he and council can strive to set a better example along with the entire city.

Clr. Gaglianese said that with regard to communication, he is disappointed that council took \$13,950 out of the budget for it. He noted that council has not had an answer back about the two police officers. He said that the Planning Board will meet on the 14th to discuss the DeSales Building and the Friendly's Building. He wished everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Clr. Camera said that the Lafayette Avenue reconstruction of water and sewer is underway. He thanked the Director of Public Works, Joe Venuti, for the overview of what will happen. He said that the Shadetree committee will be happy to know that the waterline is going on the north side of the street. As for the zoning rewrite, he said that he is for development because the city needs to grow out of our problems. He said the city also needs to address the traffic concerns. He said he appreciated the way council let discussion go on at the last meeting before making motions, but he was disappointed with the way the meeting ended abruptly. As for the PRB, he noted that council has the power to review and investigate, and the council passes along their power to the PRB. He said at the next meeting, he would like to vote on a resolution to cancel the marina for many years noting that we have an inadequate cost/benefit analysis and Seneca Lake Pure Waters is talking about an already stressed-out lake. He referred to the recent sale of city owner property, and said he hoped there are others coming in the near future. He said he would like to hear a report on an ongoing police investigation. Lastly, Clr. Camera wished everyone a Merry Christmas and said that 4th ward residents

and any other residents of the city can keep contacting him by email or phone call, as he is open for business.

Mayor Valentino said that the Local Development Corporation met to discuss an influx of money based on the HWS refinancing and receive a zoning update. He also said that the corporation has three openings, and they are looking for applications and reaching out to larger corporations. He told everyone that the city used the Small Business Disaster Relief Grant to assist 34 local businesses. Lastly, the Mayor said that the Reform and Reinvention Collective met and he gave the following update:

- The Collective (for those who have not been following) is a group of stakeholders in our community compiled to submit recommendations and suggestions on current policies in place for the City of Geneva Police Department. The Collective is charged to ensure that said policies are reformed to help reflect the needs of the community, moreover the needs of communities that have disproportionately impacted by systemic racism with respect to policing. This has led to or resulted in distrust of government intuitions including the distrust of the GPD.
- Collective group hosted virtual public comment meetings, given the low volume of residents for the public comment, collective will seek a 3rd public comment session virtually in the future. Co-Chair Erica Collins, encourages residents whom do not feel comfortable speaking publicly about their experiences with the GPD (positive or negative) to reach out to her via email or phone call. There is also a space on the City website to submit feedback and input to the group. This ongoing journey for the collective is open for residents to comment not only on experiences with the GPD but also to offer suggestions and recommendations for said policies. All materials and policies are available on our City website under 'Police Reform'
- Also, to note once a rough draft has been completed there will be a public hearing set prior to City Council adoption
- Collective Group finished meeting #8 last night; they have established key community needs (list of needs identified are available on our City page as well) and are currently diving into Use of Force Policy and will have edits and suggestions completed for Tuesday.
- The Collective has divided into 3 subgroups tackling certain sections of said policy. Those subgroups will meet this week independently to edit and offer suggestions on their assigned sections. 15. CITY MANAGER REPORT

City Manager Gerling began by saying that we have heard from residents about the zoning update noting that the process has been slowed down. She said that staff went to the LDC to get \$10,000 in additional funds for outreach and meetings, and the IDA had contributed earlier. She said that an interim draft of the zoning update will be out before the meeting on the 14th.

She said that the Let's Talk Blighted Zombie Properties meeting will be on the 10th at 5:00pm, city council will have a zoning meeting on the 14th and a beach feasibility meeting on the 16th. She said that right now at city hall we are open Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and we are trying to limit staff contact even more and may need to adjust schedules. She announced the police department is holding their annual toy drive and there will be no Mayor's Tree Lighting this year due to the pandemic, but a donated tree will be going up on the long pier.

Mrs. Gerling told council that she went back to the unions, and they were not able to get 100% participation, so they will not be coming back to council for the budget amendment for the two police positions. She told everyone that this is the last evening that Finger Lakes TV will be with us, and she gave Kyle Krenzer from FLTV a huge thank you saying that he and his crew have done an incredible job for us.
