Thursday, November 26 – Happy Thanksgiving!!

Read II Samuel 23:1-7. Two of the “job requirements” for Christian Leadership are following God’s Spirit and fierce love. What does it mean to follow God’s Spirit? How do you know God’s direction for your life? There are many paths to understanding God’s Spiritual guidance – too numerous to mention.

Read again II Samuel 23 verses 3 and 4. David says that “ruling in the fear of God” – that is ruling with a keen awareness of God in our lives – is “like the sun rising on a cloudless morning.” There is such clarity when we are following God’s Spirit! David concludes, “Is not my house like this with God?” Our “house” is in order when we are following God’s Spirit (vs. 5).

David also expressed his tremendous love for God and rejoiced in God’s love of him. That assurance gave him the confidence to follow God’s Spirit without hesitation. Pray that God’s guidance will be clear to you and write your thoughts here.

Friday, November 27

The third “job requirement” for Christian leadership is giving others encouragement. How do you encourage others? This study guide is designed for you to daily, throughout this next week, consider the lessons of today’s message and delve further into scripture that will enhance your growth as a Christian.

Monday, November 23

Read John 18:33-37. Pilate tried to understand Jesus’ Kingship in earthly terms and was frustrated by Jesus’ words “My Kingdom is not from this world.” Of course, Jesus was speaking about the spiritual kingdom of God that provides a vision for the earthly kingdom of God.

As people who live in a representative Democracy, we sometimes have difficulty embracing the concept of a Kingdom. A King is one who is sovereign – has full authority over others. The issue is does Jesus Christ have full authority over you? Meditate and pray on that question today. You may want to write your thoughts here.

Tuesday, November 24

The message suggested that we embrace the concept of being Kings ourselves – to exercise our authority in the world for the sake of Jesus Christ. How comfortable are you with this concept of being a King as we proclaim Jesus as King of Kings?

Read John 1:1-13. If we are children of God then don’t we have a claim on Christ’s royalty? I Peter 2:9 proclaims that we are a “royal priesthood.” It’s not such a crazy idea for us to be kings after all! Jesus is our King and we are his Kings on earth. Meditate on this idea and write your reactions here.

Wednesday, November 25

Jesus said, "The son of man did not come to be served, but to serve" (Luke 28:28). Leaders are servants first of all. Jesus did not define his ministry in terms of ruling over others, but serving others. "This is how one should regard us," Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 4:1, "as servants of Christ and as stewards of the mystery of God."

How do you feel about being a “servant-leader?” There is a lot to say about leading by example. Jesus is God but yet his role on earth was one of service, healing and helping others through his teachings. What
