



WHAT IS INTERGROUP?

A central or intergroup office is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community — just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

Your Sara-Mana Intergroup Association has recently been incorporated as a 501(c)(4) non-profit, public benefit organization. This organization serves all of Manatee County and all but the most southern part of Sarasota County. We have published Bylaws and Chair, Co-Chair, Treasurer and Secretary officer positions. Intergroup meets each third Tuesday evening at 7:00 PM at the Central Office in Sarasota (except that we have no meeting in the month of December). Visitors are welcomed. If you'd like, come and see how this organization serves our community.

Our current Chair is Matt D who started out as an Intergroup Representative and eventually became the Treasurer and then Finance Committee Chair, and finally Co-Chair. During the current pandemic he took it upon himself to start virtual Intergroup meetings via Zoom. We are currently holding hybrid monthly meetings: In-person and via Zoom.

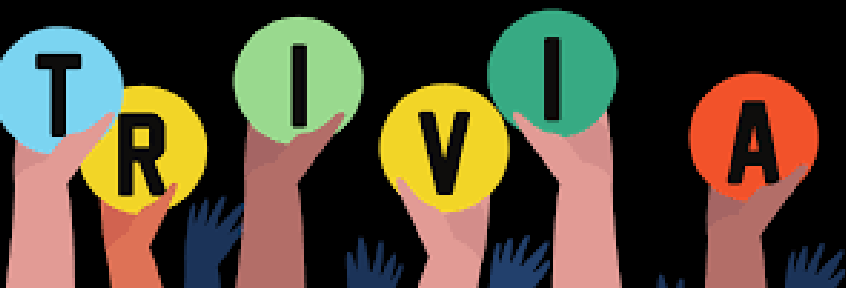
We interviewed Matt about our Intergroup. Matt said that our Intergroup puts out a Newsletter, runs a Help Line, publishes our local Where & When's and coordinates with Central Office on the new Meeting Guide app. Besides the functions already mentioned, we have Archives, Current Practices and District Intergroup Liaison.

Intergroup typically puts on a Gratitude Dinner in November, although we were not able to do so last November and we are not likely to this November. We hope to have Covid-19 behind us so that we can put on a memorable dinner in November 2022. In order to pay for our administrative costs, Newsletters, Where & When's, etc. we depend upon contributions from AA members and groups throughout our service area. We collect a 7th tradition during our monthly meetings, but most of our funding comes from voluntary group contributions. Unfortunately, contributions to Intergroup are not tax deductible.

Intergroup participates cooperatively with the rest of our local service structure, Central Office and General Service. We usually have representatives from these groups in our meetings and we attend theirs, in order to fully coordinate our activities. The Central Office Board has representatives from Intergroup and General Service.

Intergroup is your voice. Each organized AA group in our area is entitled to be represented. In this way these individual representatives can bring their group's concerns to the Intergroup body and go back to their groups with the information that is provided during these meetings. Although each organized group is entitled to have a representative, many groups have no representative. If your group has no Intergroup representative, you can bring this up at your group's business meeting or, better yet, volunteer to serve yourself.

Intergroup meetings start each meeting by reading the Twelve Traditions. We have been doing this for years. No one knows for sure but we think that maybe it's because Intergroup quite literally is what keeps the wheels greased and the train running. Our mantra for the Twelve Traditions is, after all: WHY IT WORKS!

In a recent meeting I heard a fairly new gentleman say that he was tired of trying to beat the disease of alcoholism on his own. He had finally realized that he needed help. He'd stopped trying to fight it himself and he now believed that he was in A.A. to stay.

I absolutely love to hear what the newer folks bring to the meetings because it's fresh and new and often allows me the opportunity to see through a different lens.

In this case, it caused me to reflect on my own struggles towards sobriety. I am not one of the people who says how glad they are that they're an alcoholic. I hate it! I do not want to be an alcoholic. Like this gentleman, I finally realized that I was not going to be able to beat the disease of alcoholism on my own. This caused me a bit of an identity crisis because I couldn't stand having to admit that I was an alcoholic. Once I did, it was cathartic. A whole new world opened up for me as I began to embrace my alcoholism.

Gradually, I began to learn to define myself as a sober alcoholic. The gentleman was correct in that I will never be able to beat the disease of alcoholism. But I'll be damned if I'll let it define me! I used to be a scared little (grown up) boy, whistling in the dark. Now the darkness does not frighten me. I will never be able to beat the disease of alcoholism but, with the love, support and mentorship that I find in the rooms and my higher power, I know that I will never be beaten.

Everything that I need to fight the beast to a standstill can be found in the Serenity Prayer: God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference.

A. Rely on your sponsor for guidance -- most of us learn by modeling our sponsors. But remember you can't want for another person what they don't want for themselves. Good suggestion for a shaky sponsee is "how do you want to feel afterward?" If that doesn't work, you can try "imagine I relieved myself in your drink – still want it". You'll do fine and don't be afraid to ask for help.

Random thought that works if you're in a good place or not: "If you keep doing what you've been doing – you'll keep getting what you got."
