## Japan Matters:

## Why Japan Will Always Be Important to America

As Asia continues to grow, American eyes wander. How important is Japan to the United States, now and in the future? Dr. Satu Limaye will compare Japan's relationship to the United States with that of other Asian nations in investment, imports and exports, and educational and cultural ties. For the past three years, the East-West Center has carried out an important project - Asia Matters – that surveys not just the "macro" ties between America and Asia, but goes into detail, country by country, and state by state, to show the ties between America and Asia. Dr. Limaye will present the project's research and data, which shows how important Japan is – and will continue to be -- to the U.S. economy and our national interests. A Q&A will follow Dr. Limaye's talk.

**Dr. Satu Limaye** became director of the East-West Center Washington in February 2007. Prior to that, he was a researcher at the Institute for Defense Analyses in Alexandria, Va. and director of research and publications at the Asia Pacific Center for Strategic Studies in Honolulu. Dr. Limaye was an Abe Fellow at the National Endowment for Democracy's International Forum for Democratic Studies and a Luce Scholar at the Japan Institute of International Affairs in Tokyo. He has also written, edited, and co-edited numerous books, monographs, and studies, including US, Australia and Japan and the New Security Triangle, Japan in a Dynamic Asia; Special Assessment: The Asia-Pacific and the United States, 2004-2005; Religious Radicalism in South Asia; and Special Assessment: Asia's China Debate. Dr. Limaye earned his Ph.D. in international relations at Oxford University's Magdalen College as a Marshall Scholar. He did his undergraduate studies at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service
