*I received this as a personal email from a friend, formerly of New Smyrna Beach. It was not intended for the High 'n Dry, but after reading it I asked for her permission to print it. - Tom L, Editor*

Morning Tom,

I hope I'm not an annoyance. I'm just excited. Do I share this stuff where I'm supposed to? Yes, but at 5 am, right after prayer and meditation, is when it's the strongest. And so I write.

What I know, one more time, is that this stuff works. It works when I'm willing to follow a few simple suggestions, even though I'm not sure about any of it at first. It worked when I did that 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>...when I went back to that 3<sup>rd</sup> step work again because when I did, I trusted. It has been a very long time since I trusted anything; yet, I trusted that if this God of my understanding showed something, then I needed to know. It was quiet. I was aware of myself, but quiet. I asked to be shown as I said "I don't know how to do any of this... Show me, guide me, direct me", and I'll be damned if examples didn't just start showing up everywhere. I felt warmth with that. Sometimes I laughed at myself because it is so simple. Two days ago the big example came and I have been given permission to share this.

I know someone who is older and on a fixed income. The temperature up here is cold...currently 31 degrees. She lives in this old dilapidated trailer. Her furnace was red tagged a few weeks ago, no heat whatsoever. An end to that is coming soon, but for now she has to wait. We spend about five minutes talking about how it sucks to get a shower and how cold it is while trying to get something to eat and then she turns upbeat, positive, and is a hell of a lot of fun to be around. But, what's the big thing? The big thing happened the other day when she called and ask me to go to all these food pantries with her, four to be exact. In the middle of this, I did think...do you really need all this??? What the hell??

Thank God I kept my big mouth shut because what I found out later was that she took all the food she collected to a family with little kids who were hurting. Yet, she barely had enough gas in her car to get home. In the midst of all her struggles, all the difficulties that she is experiencing, she gets up and helps someone else. Maybe someday when I grow up, I can be a little more like her.

## From the Archives

### Richmond Walker - Author of the *Twenty-Four a Day* Book

Richmond Walker was born in Brookline, Massachusetts in 1892 to a prominent Boston family. His family owned a shoe manufacturing business in Worcester, Mass. He attended Williams College in Massachusetts and served in the Medical Corp during WW 1. After a two year stay of white knuckle sobriety in the Oxford Group in 1939, he drank again for a year and a half. He joined AA and began his lasting sobriety in 1942. He helped establish the Intergroup in Boston and then the Intergroup in Daytona Beach where he spent his winters.

Did you know that Richmond Walker wrote the *Twenty-Four Hours a Day* book in Daytona Beach? He was influenced by the book *God Calling*, a daily devotional by A.J. Russell. He converted the religious thoughts into universal spiritual thoughts and these became the third section of each day in the *Twenty-Four Hours a Day* book.

He was carrying little cards in his pocket with these thoughts and other sobriety reminders written on them. The "guys" in his group in Daytona Beach suggested he write a daily devotional for alcoholics with these thoughts incorporated into it. He wrote the book and published it himself in 1948, running copies on a printing press in the Daytona Beach City Hall. After producing, binding and filling mail orders for his book for two years (10,000 copies each year) he approached Bill W. about publishing the little book. Bill, after reading the book and showing it to his group, decided against publishing it. There was no money left after just publishing the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions and the "guys" thought there was too much "God" for the membership.

He then asked Patrick Butler, founder of Hazelden, a small publishing company in Minnesota, if they would take over producing the "Little Black Book." They bought the rights to the book in 1954 and it has turned Hazelden into the huge publisher that it is today. By 1994, 6 million copies of the *Twenty-Four Hour a Day* book had been sold.

Richmond Walker died March 25, 1965 in Daytona Beach. When the family came to clean out his home here, they found a box in the back of a closet which contained all his papers and donated them to our intergroup.

We are fortunate to have the Richmond Walker Papers as part our Archives collection at the intergroup office. This collection consists of the outlines of the AA talks he gave in Massachusetts where he got sober and around Daytona Beach after he moved here. There are over 100 talks.

3-14-45 *The Twenty-four program*

3-28-45 *The First Drink*

Among these papers is a group of selections called *Thoughts*. These are the *Staying Sober* messages that he probably carried around in his pocket. These are a few of the 67 paragraphs: *The Drink Problem is Always First in Importance, Stopping Once and for All, Excuses, Surrender, and Seductive Moments*.

This Information is from a talk given by Glen Chestnut, professor of History at the University of Indiana at the *National Archives Conference* in in 2003.in Ft. Lauderdale.

**A. A.'s Country-wide News Circuit  
Plans and Ideas  
(Early Chip System)**

Control Board of the Central Baltimore A.A. Group has asked each group to ask a member to report to *The A.A. Grapevine* each month. All members in the Tacoma, Wash., Group are "in the chips," carrying them in their pockets and purses instead of on the shoulder. A white chip given at the first meeting is exchanged for a yellow one after 60 days; the yellow for a red at the end of three months and the red for a blue at the end of a year of sobriety. At present Tacoma has four blue chip members with one holding three blues while over half have one or more red chips. These chips are felt to signify and symbolize an honest effort to live the A.A. program. Although founded only in January 1947 the members of the Tyler, Texas, Group have prepared a booklet entitled *Slaves of Drink Find Peace of Mind*. In addition to explanations of the A.A. program the booklet includes discussions of alcoholism as a public health problem, questions to determine whether the reader is an alcoholic and how to make A.A. work. Hamilton, Bermuda, A.A.s report a visit from Carla P. of the Manhattan Group who gave first-hand information on the Central Office, as well as a visit and talk from Rita S. of the Boston Group. Bill P. of Cape Cod and Horace B. of Manhattan are reported attending regular Wednesday meetings in Bermuda. A large bulletin board with group news, items and letters of interest is used by the Passaic, N. J. Group to save time usually taken up with meeting announcements. Passaic held a spring party during which 90 members enjoyed entertainment and refreshments.

Editor's Note: The first Chip System is thought to have begun at Indianapolis in 1942 but specifics are uncertain.
