



Private John Fagan served in Captain Robert Lanier's company of Colonel Isaac Shelby's militia. He was wounded at the battle of Kings Mountain 07Oct1780 (Draper p304, p580 spelled the name Fagon). John married Martha Lanier 05Jan1786.

John S. Fagan was born in Virginia about 1760. He was a Private in Captain William Johnston's company of the Eleventh Virginia Regiment of Foot from 1777 to 1779. -

John S. Fagan died in Rutherford County Tennessee in 1819. He married Patricia Martha Lanier who was the daughter of Lemuel and Hannah Peteres Lanier. They were the parents of Robert Lanier Fagan. The poet Sidney Clopton Lanier (1842-1881) was a relative of Patricia Martha Lanier Fagan. He is known as simply "Sidney Lanier".

The enclosed copy of the agreement entered into by the Coachman who is now with the President of the U. S. explaining the terms upon which you will be employed: if they are such as you can comply with in all respects, you will come on as soon as possible (By Wednesday's stage as you proposed will be agreeable) and take your station as Coachman in the President's family. -

The President wishes you to make your arrangements in such a manner as not to be obliged to return to Susquehanna.
