



James Phillips was killed at the Battle of Kings Mountain. He was private militiaman in Col William Campbell's regiment, possibly Capt. Dysart's company.

Captain David Beattie said that Phillips brought at least six days of rations from home.

Samuel Newell's letter to Col. David Campbell, Abingdon, VA from Pulaski County, KY dated August 4th 1823 was Draper's source for naming casualties among the Virginians. It said that **Private James Phillips** was killed. The 1909 battlefield obelisk says that **2nd Lieutenant James Phillips** was killed.

Page 374 - James Montgomery - 400 ac - Commissioners Certificate - on the **west side of Woolf Creek**, the waters of Holstein River - beginning at the **foot of the Great knobs** corner to Samuel Duff's land - by shelving rocks on the bank of Woolf creek - corner of the tract by preemption right - near the foot of the said knobs - August 27, 1785...James Montgomery - 400 ac - on the **south side of the Great knobs on Hunt's and Woolf Creek**, joining John Berry, **James Phillips**, James Doren, Nicholas Fain, David Carr, George Berry and James McFarran, includes his settlement - actual settlement made in 1782 - August 14, 1781

On 21Nov1780 (Summers shows Nov. 24th) Washington County, Virginia commissioners ordered the estate settlement for Phillips. The inventory and appraisal were recorded May 1781.
