

On 24Aug1832 in Ripley County IN, **Isaac Way** of Johnson Township, age 70, applied for a federal pension under the Act of Congress passed 07Jun1832.

He enlisted with recruiting sergeant Benjamin Martin in 1780 in the 16<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment under Captain Francis Triplett. Isaac enlisted in Front Royal VA and marched from Fauquier Court House to Fredicksburg, to Hillsborough NC, to Charlotte. There they joined General Daniel Morgan's army.

“At the **Cowpens** he was engaged in the Battle and was **severely wounded** on the side, back, arms, head and in the face by the cut of the sword of a British dragoon. He remained near the field of Battle for near **two months**, He then returned back to Fauquier County in Virginia and immediately started to join General Morgan's Army then lying in Little York. He proceeded on his march as far as Fauquier Courthouse, where he fell in with the Colonel Elias Edmonds, when he asked Colonel Edmonds if he could not go down to Little York with his Regiment. The Colonel came up to him and **removed the bandage then around his head and face, and told him that he was too disabled to serve as a Soldier. There are already too many such men** in the service, and offered him a discharge.”

On 24Jan1831, the Indiana House of Representatives voted to add Isaac Way to a bill for support of Revolutionary War veterans. They said he was a resident of Dearborn County. So many delegates added so many names that the bill did not pass.
