LEARNING OBJECTIVES & PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE GAP(S)

After this session, participants will be able to:

1. Review normal and abnormal uterine bleeding (AUB) in teenagers
2. Generate a differential diagnosis for girls with AUB
3. Discuss the diagnostic criteria and treatment options for AUB, including anovulatory bleeding and PCOS in teenagers
4. Define reproductive justice
5. Recognize the role of healthcare professionals in reproductive injustices in adolescents
6. Identify advocacy initiatives in your clinic, hospital or state
7. Be able to counsel adolescents about both the contraceptive and non-contraceptive benefits of LARC methods
8. Identify and be able to manage common LARC side effects
9. Identify special considerations for LARC insertion and use in adolescents
10. Be aware of the basic terminology used to refer to gender non-conforming and transgender adolescents
11. Review the medical transition options for transgender adolescents
12. Review the surgical transition options for transgender
13. Articulate the importance of fertility preservation in pediatric/adolescent GYN
14. Discuss the use of GnRH agonists in female cancer patients
15. Describe the range of options available including egg cryopreservation, fertility sparing surgery, and ovarian tissue cryopreservation

Practice Gap(s) for this session: The Practice Gap is the reason a conference or CME activity needs to be held. The "gap" between the current and the desired will be used to identify conference needs, purposes, objectives, and desired outcomes.

1. *According to ACOG, over half of women surveyed (54%) consider their ob-gyns to be their primary physician – the first doctor they see for all their health care needs*
2. *Without continued professional education, integration of practice guidelines is not optimal by OB/GYNs. This series will reinforce appropriate practice guidelines during selected quarterly sessions throughout the year.*
3. *Despite the development of evidence-based recommendations, it can be difficult to identify and incorporate new evidence into practice. Providers identify and apply new evidence-based practice approaches.*
