A WORD FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

It is stunning how fast the new and flashy becomes old and ho-hum. A two year old cell phone is hopelessly outdated. At four or five years, computers are ready for the dumpster. In case we think this is a brand new phenomenon of technology, how fast did skirt lengths or tie widths change in years past? The "tyranny of novelty" is a cruel master because it is never satisfied and always requires the next thingamabob, the new color, the next purchase.

In some ways, there is a rebellion afoot. Millennials (roughly, those 15 to 30 years old now), when they go to church, are spurning the contemporary churches of their boomer parents and going for much more traditional forms of worship. But the general cultural obsession with novelty is undeniable.

Preachers are not immune to this. We want the latest program, the newest insight. And when it comes to preaching on holidays like Christmas and Easter, we feel the pressure every year to come up with something new and shiny. But the reality is that novelty never satisfies. Its titillation lasts only until the next, slightly more glittery thing comes along.

Before I was ordained, I worked as a youth minister at a large parish in St. Louis. The Associate Rector that I worked with had long wanted a Jeep Cherokee. Finally, the time came for him to trade in his old car and he leased a new Cherokee. Initially, he was thrilled, but within a month, he confessed to me that he had gotten into a friend's Cherokee that had more bells and whistles and he was already finding himself dissatisfied with the vehicle he had so long wanted.

The tyranny of novelty is not new. St. Luke, with great disdain, wrote that "all the Athenians and the foreigners living there would spend their time in nothing but telling or hearing something new." (Acts 17:21) St. Paul warned that the time would come (and I think it is here) when "people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires." (2 Timothy 4:3).

On the other hand, the church is about the business of the Gospel. Not an ever changing Gospel of modernity and flash and glitter, but the unchanging bedrock of Jesus, and His love for us worked out on the cross and in the empty tomb. Remember the chorus of the old hymn?

I love to tell the story, 'twill be my theme in glory, To tell the old, old story of Jesus and His love.

So I'm going to make the choice this Easter season to be satisfied with the old, old story. I'm not going to get caught in the tyranny of novelty. I will join St. Paul who said, "I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified." (1 Corinthians 2:2) Let's celebrate Easter as a reminder of the unending truth of Jesus' death and resurrection at work in our lives today. Most of us need to be reminded of the basics pretty often anyway!



St. John's will be hosting families the week of **Sunday, April 29** through **Sunday, May 6**. As of this publication date, we don't know the number or composition of families, but we look forward to them being with us. We are learning to mold our efforts to the ever changing needs of this ministry - sometimes with little advance notice! But at the end of every hosting week, we feel blessed that we were able to support homeless families finding permanent housing and employment if needed.

We recognize a need, actually, an opportunity, for any St. John's parishioner who has 2 hours to spare. While not one of the formal teams, if we had one or two people willing to come in for 2 hours between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. they could greet our guests as they gather for dinner, socialize, and act as a hospitality 'bridge' until the overnight hosts arrive. Our meal preparers can focus on their chores and our guests would have more friendly St. John's folks with whom to interact.

Fourteen (14) willing people could make this happen, each 2-person team spending one dinner time (5 p.m. to 7 p.m., Sunday through Saturday) performing in this capacity. See **Lee Steinger** or **Steve Manzer** if you are ready and willing to invest 2 hours during a hosting week for this worthy endeavor.

The "Good News" is going to every two months.

In a desire to control costs while maintaining quality, the vestry has decided to begin publishing the Good News every two months. We will still produce a weekly bulletin and a weekly "eNews" (electronic newsletter).

This means that in April, we will produce a May-June issue, then in June we will produce a July- August issue and so on. This will likely mean a slightly larger "Good News" and the need for a little more advance planning.

Please note that the deadline for the May-June issue will be **Tuesday, April 17**.

Thank you for thinking and planning ahead as we make this transition.

Embracing Our Neighborhoods — And One Another

Bishop Brewer's convention address stresses service, unity.

From start to finish, the Rt. Rev. Gregory O. Brewer's annual address underscored and extended this year's 2018 Diocesan Convention theme, "Evangelism—Embracing Our Neighborhoods."

Uniting for Relief

This past year, diocesan outreach efforts have included food distribution (including 250,000 pounds of emergency FEMA relief channeled through St. John's, Kissimmee); food pantries; two shipments to the U.S. Virgin Islands; and financial donations sent to St. John the Divine in Houston in the wake of Hurricane Harvey, Brewer said. Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) also assisted in ministry to community and clergy during Central Florida's own recovery from Hurricane Irma.

But an ongoing need exists, he said, with the influx of more than 250,000 transplanted Puerto Ricans displaced by Hurricane Maria. Brewer emphasized how relief work can fulfill Christ's words, "I was hungry and you gave Me food. . . . I was naked and you clothed Me."

Growing in Leadership

The Episcopal Diocese of Central Florida also saw 31 ordinations in 2017, including more young adults and women than in the past, said Brewer, who also emphasized the group's racial diversity. The diocese has students at various seminaries, its Timothy Fund providing financial help for aspiring priests. The Institute for Christian Studies (ICS) continues to improve vocational training for deacons and make it more accessible through online classes.

Moving in Missions

Brewer also highlighted God's work in reaching diocesan neighborhoods via food distribution and other relief, numerous new and creative services, ministry to the LGBTQ community, and countless other mission efforts. He stressed the need to examine whether these ministries move people to faith in Jesus Christ, reiterating the Great Commission's call to "go and make disciples of all nations."

In that light, Brewer said, new church plants are beginning or planned for Lake Nona, Horizon West, and The Villages. The Fresh Expressions movement, with its emphasis on new forms of church, is also growing. In areas where the population is declining, however, some congregations may close.

Reaching the Youth

On a positive note, diocesan youth ministries, Brewer said, increased in number this past year from 46 to 68, thanks especially to a partnership with the Youth Ministry Institute (YMI), where Kirsten Knox has replaced Steve Schneebecker as regional director. Rev. Bill Yates will serve as Camp Wingmann's interim director, with J.J. Joseph on board to oversee summer camps. Brewer has also worked to strengthen relationships with Episcopal schools, especially Holy Trinity Academy in Melbourne and Trinity Prep in Winter Park. Brewer expressed his appreciation for the work of the Central Florida Episcopal Schools Association (CFESA) under the leadership of Mr. Paul Garcia, Head of St. Barnabas Episcopal School in DeLand.

Praying for Discernment

Next, Brewer emphasized his need for counsel and prayer as he seeks God's missionary strategy for the diocese. Three ministry areas, he said, require special guidance: church plants and existing churches, the exploding Hispanic population, and the growing gay population.

Because of a lack of unity, the third area offers a special challenge, Brewer said. His charge as a bishop means his decisions must be coherent with the "faith of the apostles," take into consideration any action's impact on the "faith, unity and discipline of the Church," and be coherent with his global leadership responsibility.

For these reasons and after obtaining wise counsel, Brewer chose not to bring two proposed resolutions on LGBTQ issues, including same-sex marriage, to the Convention floor. Emphasizing his desire to avoid divisiveness, he announced plans for a theologically diverse task force to address these concerns. Chaired by Canon Justin Holcomb, the group will report on its findings at the 2019 Convention.



Impacting the Future

Brewer also spoke with fondness of his friendship with Bishop Lloyd Allen of Central Florida's partner diocese in Honduras, unable to leave his country due to political unrest. Requesting prayer for Allen and his people, Brewer noted that nearly all the bishops in Province 9 (Central/South America) remain opposed to the passage of gay marriage liturgies.

Genuine inclusion, Brewer said, has been thwarted by the denomination's commitment to majority rule and would be more adequately reflected by acknowledging differences in theology, geography, and culture and moving toward a consensus. Working the political system, he said, "doesn't look like the church of the New Testament to me." Instead, Brewer charged attendees to embrace their neighborhoods with prayer, wise counsel and genuine inclusion, acknowledging, "Our help is in the name of the Lord, maker of heaven and earth."

"We are here to serve together," Brewer said. "Let's do it."



Resurrection and Reality

Alleluia! Christ is risen!
The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The resurrection of Jesus on that first Easter day is utterly unique in human history. Some, like Lazarus, have been resuscitated, but only to suffer death and decay at a later time. Jesus' resurrection is a foretaste of what is promised to all believers in the last day. We, too, will go from this mortal life to a completely new life, one where we will enjoy direct fellowship with God and one another that will never end!

We often envision heaven as populated with only our 'spirits,' but that is not the Biblical picture. There will be a reality to heaven that will make this earth seem the insubstantial thing. In his book *The Great Divorce*, C. S. Lewis describes heaven as so real and substantial that visitors from Hell cut their feet just walking across the grass because the blades of grass are so much more real and substantial than they are.

This is a more Biblical vision of heaven than ethereal angels playing harps and floating on clouds. Our God is a God of substance, of reality. Far from the ancient, gnostic ideas of heaven as some final release from the physical world, the Biblical vision is that heaven is where we will finally find a truly physical world as intended by God. Remember that the creation was declared "good" by our Creator! It is not a bad thing to be eliminated but an expression of the love of God to be restored!

As we celebrate the Easter season, we recall that resurrection faith is not 'pie in the sky' faith, but rather a real conviction that God is re-creating his real world, now spoiled by sin. In Jesus, we are promised that heaven will be our world, our true home. And all that troubles and pains us in this will become as insubstantial as a wisp of air when we find the real thing!

C. S. Lewis wrote this description of heaven at the end of *The Last Battle*, the final book of *The Chronicles of Narnia*. I confess that it nearly brings me to tears every time I read it. The great lion Aslan (the Jesus figure in the *Chronicles*) is welcoming the children into heaven:

"The term is over: the holidays have begun. The dream is ended: this is the morning." And as He spoke He no longer looked to them like a lion; but the things that began to happen after that were so great and beautiful that I cannot write them. And for us this is the end of all the stories, and we can most truly say that they all lived happily ever after. But for them it was only the beginning of the real story. All their life in this world and all their adventures in Narnia had only been the cover and the title page: now at least they were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read: which goes on forever: in which every chapter is better than the one before.

Looking forward to the Great Story!

Vestry Notes

The Vestry met on **Saturday, March 17** at the home of Kathy Oas to conduct March business and discuss ways to intentionally and deliberately grow the St. John's congregation. Steve Bradley's Treasurer's report was favorable for the month of February and year to date. The financial result were revenues \$549 better than budget and expenses \$2,396 less than budgeted, leaving a net gain of \$3,282 for the month and \$143 net gain for the year.


Kathy Oas, Junior Warden, reported on the state of the buildings and grounds projects, all of which continue to be resolved or being pursued.

Discussion about the pros and cons of continuing a monthly newsletter were held. The Vestry decided to move to a newsletter cycle of every two months instead of every month. This will begin with the May/June issue.

Fr. Eric led the Vestry in a strategic discussion regarding congregation growth. The Vestry determined that an incremental approach, starting with increasing St. John's visibility through various media (electronic and print), moving into publicized community activities, like concerts in the park and movie nights. As these projects gain momentum we will entertain further neighborhood outreach like neighborhood picnics.
