## A WORD FROM THE RECTOR


Dear Friends,

Your vestry and I have been investing a good deal of time, prayer, study and reading trying to figure out what changes are needed in the life of St. John's to ensure our health and vitality into the future. I have shared with them, and you, that as I grew up and even as I was trained in seminary, the unspoken assumption was that if you could preach a decent sermon, provide decent pastoral care and make sure the bills get paid, then you would have a good congregation and everything would be OK. In that world, leadership was knowing what tweaks to make in programs and worship, then selling them to the congregation. That would keep things humming along.

That world is gone. Of course, it was never really that simple, but the cultural landscape in which we live as a church is dramatically different than it was.

I do not mean to say that we are becoming a pagan nation. What I mean is that there is a clear shift away from the traditional, mainline congregations to newer, entrepreneurial churches. As we in the traditional churches struggle for new members, there is a virtual explosion of new, non-denominational churches. I keep seeing new ones pop up and grow.

It would be easy to think we just need to copy them, perhaps in music style, programs, preaching or other features. But it is not so simple. What we are learning in our reading and study is that new ways of seeing ourselves and new ways of leading others in the faith are needed.

A book we are reading, "Canoeing the Mountains" by Tod Bolsinger, puts it this way: "In a Christendom world [that is, one where Christian faith is assumed and normative], vision was about seeing possibilities and communicating them with excitement. In uncharted territory [such as we now inhabit] — where no one knows what's ahead — vision is about accurately seeing ourselves and defining reality."

Once we understand who God has made us to be as a congregation, we can work on linking that to the people around us. It is by creating connections and community that the church grows today. It may look like loud music and a casual, informal style is what attracts, but that is not what is actually driving the growth of these newer churches. It is no longer simple attraction, good programs or advertising, but creating a common life that brings transformation for the members in a way that is magnetically attractive to others.

On one level, this is not new. At its best, the church has always been about transformation and transformation is facilitated in relationships. But we got lazy and became complacent, so others have stepped up and filled the gap.

One of the things I often do in preparing to write this letter is to read past ones. I don't want to be too repetitive, and there may be an insight I want to take further. With all this in mind, I came across what I wrote three years ago, right before beginning my sabbatical, and it still seems pertinent, so I will resurrect a portion of it:

"I keep coming back to discipleship. Discipleship is the thing that feeds all the others and makes them possible. Gathering a group of people together in a certain type of building and having them repeat some phrases or sing some songs does not make it worship. Hearts that desire to turn to God and to be touched by him engage in true worship. Disciples love and care for one another. Disciples reach out to the larger community, seeking to live out the love of God for all people. Disciples read the Bible and work to apply it in their lives, so that others may see its wonder and beauty. I believe that it is discipleship that feeds all the other elements of healthy church life.

So, what, you may ask, is discipleship? A disciple is committed to the master, Jesus, and seeks to be formed and shaped by him. A disciple isn't just looking for a little comfort and encouragement for the week — a disciple is ready to be changed and to work for change. A disciple doesn't expect someone else to feed them. A disciple works at their faith and their growth.

My experience has been that there are several essential elements to the life of a disciple and I usually talk about them in four categories.

First — worship. We need to gather for worship as a community of disciples. This is not just to get a little "self-help" message or a word of encouragement and support. Disciples gather for worship because it is essential to their character and life which seeks to be bound to the life of God. To stop worshiping is to stop breathing for a disciple.

Second — personal time in prayer and study. Once a week is not enough. A disciple carves time out of their schedule to pray and to study the Scripture. There won't always be fireworks, prayer can be flat sometimes, or even frustrating. We may not always understand what we read in the Bible. But a disciple keeps at it knowing that over the long haul, God is at work in us.

Third — gathering with other disciples for prayer, study, support and fellowship. This is different than gathering for corporate worship. Even in a smaller church like St. John's, there are simply too many here on Sunday morning, and too much else going on for the kind of relationships to be built than foster discipleship.

Fourth — outreach, both in compassion and in evangelism. We are bear a responsibility to reach out in whatever ways we are able to the needs of others. Since God has made each one unique, they will look different for each one. But as the body of Christ, we each have a responsibility take part and to support our outreach.

But the common denominator is that each of these requires disciples."

Ordinary church members are not up to the task. Please keep me and your vestry in your prayers as we continue this reflection. We will be holding a vestry mini-retreat on Saturday, May 4 when we will carry on some of these discussions.

## Bring Dad to Church!



## Communion Bread

Many folks have commented on how delicious the Communion bread is, so we are happy to provide the recipe. It was developed by Hope Johnson and others.

- 1 package dry yeast
- 1 cup warm water
- 3 ½ tablespoons honey
- 3 tablespoons olive oil (little extra to coat bowl)
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 cup unbleached flour (little extra for kneading)

Using a stand mixer with dough hook, combine yeast and water to dissolve yeast. Add honey, olive oil, salt and stir, then let rest for 5 minutes. Add both flours while stirring with dough hook. When the dough forms a ball (5 min. or more) place dough on a board and knead using extra unbleached flour as needed, until smooth and elastic.

Clean the bowl and rub with olive oil. Place dough in bowl and cover with linen towel. Let rise in a warm, draft free location.

When it is doubled in size, form into 2 to 16 loaves, as desired. Roll with heavy pin and place on parchment covered pans.

Bake in 375 °F oven for 9 – 11 minutes. Will be light brown in color.

## School of Healing Prayer

There is a training session for new volunteers scheduled at First Church of Melbourne, September 16 from 2:30- 4:00 pm.



"You're the Key"! This is a new initiative kicking off April 25th. It focuses on county wide homelessness in Brevard as a major problem and asks each of us to be advocates for promoting awareness of the homelessness problem and the agencies and services available to the homeless. There will be a "Landing Page" on the FPOB website, [familypromiseofbrevard.org](http://familypromiseofbrevard.org), where information and comments can be shared. More information will be available soon.

The three FPOB programs; Prevention and Diversion, Shelter (which we participate in), and After Care, continue to grow. The Prevention and Diversion program has been extremely successful preventing homelessness and will be getting increased emphasis hopefully including more resources. It is run by one full time employee and since inception has impacted over 1300 families.

The Shelter program, since inception about six years ago, has hosted 166 families, including 402 adults and 241 children. The voluntary AC program which offers one year of follow up counseling after a family moves into housing, continues to have approximately 80% participation rate.
