2.0 Meeting Notes – August 17

Welcome and Virtual Arrival

Melissa thanked everyone for joining the call and reminded attendees the call is being recorded and will be available after the meeting. She reviewed the web meeting software functionality and provided an overview of the agenda.

FTSDC Housekeeping

Member Biographies

Melissa said the new coalition member questionnaire will be included in the meeting summary. She asked new members to send her a short biography and headshot in addition to their responses to the questionnaire. She said member headshots and biographies would be include on the FTSDC website.

LifeSavers Conference Webinars

Melissa reminded participants the LifeSavers conference has been changed to a virtual format and a webinar series focused on several traffic safety topics is available [online](#) . Melissa encouraged members to review the resources related to teen traffic safety.

FTSDC Web Analytics

Melissa discussed FTSDC web analytics highlighting web traffic fluctuation between October 2019 to April 2020. She noted web traffic increased significantly from May 2020 to August 2020 due to an increase in available web content and strategic marketing of the website. She said there were approximately 1,220 active users per month in the last three months.

She said 54% of active users are male with about 60% of visitors between the age 18-34 age bracket. She noted the demographic data reported does not include visitors under the age of 18.

FTSDC Strategic Action Plan Update

Melissa said an update was made to the strategic action plan (Strategy 2.3.13). The following action was added to strategy 2.3:

Update/revise the Florida Driver Education Curriculum Framework in partnership with the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) and the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) to expand teen driver education on safe driving practices and knowledge of Florida's Graduated Driver Licensing Laws.

She thanked Eric Stern for building and maintaining a relationship with the Florida Department of Education and getting their feedback on this strategy and Elise Batchelor for developing the framework for the language provided above.

Derek Stewart, Florida Virtual School, I shared the FDOE Objectives that are included in [Collaborate, Play, Align, Learn, Motivate and Share \(CPALMS\)](#). CPALMS is the State of Florida's official source for standards

information and course descriptions. This source provides access to thousands of standards-aligned, free, and high-quality instructional/educational resources.

Chris Keelin, St. Johns County Tax Collector, said the program was piloted last year and saw a success rate of 89 percent pass rate for first-time test takers (permit exam) using this framework.

Teen Driver Safety Week

Melissa reminded members that teen driver safety week is October 18-24, 2020. The event will be virtual and will be focused on educating teen drivers on safety issues. Melissa said FTSDC is interested in partnering with three volunteer organizations.

As a reminder, Melissa provided reviewed the 2019 teen driver safety week activities, including:

- A distracted driving PSA in partnership with State Farm. This content is available at www.flteensafedriver.org/put-it-away
- Three coordinated social media campaigns resulting in 16,174 impressions
 - FDOT Social Media
 - FTSDC Social Media
 - MADD, FTSDC, and SafeKids social media (focused on impaired driving)
- A Graduated Driver License (GDL) public service announcement contest

She asked participants to consider potential digital campaigns to conduct during teen driver safety week and be prepared to discuss ideas later in the meeting

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- FDOT D6 has extensive content they are happy to make available for use during teen driver safety week. The material is available at available at FDOT safety resources.com.
- FDOT D6 has partnered with Ford Academy, a comprehensive online safety course. This could be a good partnership opportunity for the FTSDC. D6 is willing to introduce Melissa to their contacts at the Ford Academy.
- Lori Burke said, MADD would also like to be involved in any PSA's regarding impaired driving messaging.

Open Forum

Melissa opened the conversation for member updates.

Carlos Sarmiento, FDOT D6, said the district rolled out a digital Drive Safe campaign with an emphasis on aggressive driving and speeding. This three-week digital campaign will conclude on August 28. This content is available at www.fdotsafetyresources.com.

Matt Nasworthy, AAA, introduced Lindsay Pavlick and Michelle Harris (Traffic Safety) and welcomed them to the call. He said AAA is also considering teen driver safety week and is considering options for contactless drive-through events. He said AAA's School's Open, Drive Safely campaign is usually coordinated through the school resource officers. He said those materials have been distributed.

Ginger Regalado, FDOT CTST D7, said she is focused on distributing resources to teachers. She noted outreach has been hampered as a result of COVID. Ginger mentioned teachers are very supportive of the program and materials and are asking for in-person presentations. She noted the district is currently offering in-person and virtual meetings to discuss traffic safety. The virtual presentations are pre-recorded and includes questions for students to respond to. This format has worked well.

Melanie Brocato, Broward Sheriff Fire Rescue, conducts a summer program every year and is conducting it virtually this year. There were over 200 presentations for 2,500 kids during July. The virtual camp included numerous safety topics. She said the digital format and content provided was very well received. She said these materials, including lesson plans, are all available to anyone that is interested.

Andy Johnson, Florida Law Enforcement Liaison (LEL) Program, Andrew Johnson said enforcement focus varies throughout the state due to COVID-19. Law enforcement's handling of School Resource Officers (SROs) is highly dependent on the area but they are typically aligned with school reopening and the number of students attending in-person.

Art Bodenheimer, Florida Police Chiefs Association, said the state provided a grant to support enforcement activities and messaging for COVID-19. He said the materials and equipment purchased through this grant will help support traffic safety enforcement as well.

Chris Swinson, CSPD, said the Broward County schools will be starting virtual classes next week. He said the CSPD's enforcement activities have shifted to focus on education. Currently, there are challenges with officers appearing in court virtually (via Zoom) rather than appearing in person to provide documentation and/or testify related to their cases.

Lori Burke, MADD said she will be filling in for Sharon temporarily. During April and June, they focused on providing targeted social media activity about safe driving and teen education on the Florida Instagram and Twitter pages. This was a successful effort and they will continue to engage in targeted social media education. She said in August, MADD is focused on providing materials on healthy ways to handle stress with the understanding that stress is one of the reasons teens choose to drink or do drugs. She said MADD is developing a digital book of teen safe driving resources that can be shared with schools as a resource for teachers to provide to their students. Lori said MADD is interested in ways to fundraise by providing virtual and socially distant events to compensate for a loss in income.

David Summers, Health Care District Palm Beach County, has been able to adjust his presentations to students for a virtual format. He expects to be able to participate in virtual driver's education courses.

Petra Vybiralova, Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital, noted the traffic-related traumas have been increasingly severe during the pandemic.

Dekova Batey, Gainesville Bicycle and Pedestrian Program, said he will share some resources related to bicycle safety for teens with the coalition.

Chris Keelin, St. John's Tax Collector Program Director, said his team cannot go into the schools to conduct their programs. He is looking for a virtual platform that can be used for students to take the course and take the test until his team is allowed back into the schools in-person.

- Florida Virtual School is always an option for conducting online courses.

Andre Jamison, Drive Trainer, said the organization has been significantly impacted by COVID. They are currently focused on driver simulations and could partner with instructors to conduct driving simulations as an educational tool during these trainings.

Melissa Valido, Teen Safe Driving Coalition, said the grant funds teen traffic safety presentations (costs of speakers, etc.) and has put a hold on conducting these presentations for now. She said if anything changes, they might need to revisit the process. Many speakers are uncomfortable having their messaging recorded and there are concerns with conducting these presentations virtually.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Eric mentioned, Palm Beach county is still hiring SROs. He asked participants to contact Detective Sal Longo at salvatore.longo@palmbeachschools.org if they know any recent retirees from LEA's that would be interested in a support role as an SRO.
- Ginger enquired whether law enforcement is seeing an increase in the number of people not wearing safety belts.
 - Yes, this is something we're seeing in several communities throughout the state.
 - David said data is lagging behind, so it is difficult to tell if this has been a trend in hospital data. He can look into it further prior to the next FTSDC meeting.

Teen Driver Fact Sheet Overview

Danny Shopf, Cambridge Systematics, gave an overview of the Teen Driver Fact sheet. The fact sheet covers topics related to Florida's Teen Traffic Safety Challenges during the period from 2014-2018. He said the fact sheet will be updated annually.

Danny gave an overview of Florida teen traffic safety data. He said that 97% of the teen-involved crashes, fatalities, and serious injuries involve FL residents. From 2014-2016 there was a slight increase in the serious injuries involving teen drivers, but it dropped significantly after 2016. Danny reviewed teen driver fatalities, serious injuries and crashes by day of week and by month. Data showed March and October had the highest teen fatality rate. Participants speculated this could be due to the fact that March and October include spring break, high school homecoming, Halloween, the return of winter visitors, day light savings time. Teen drivers with a teen passenger in the vehicle represent a high rate of teen fatalities. Male teens are more likely to be involved in crashes than females. Danny said teen males should be a target audience for future outreach. The maps of teen fatality and serious injury rates (per 100 million VMT) revealed that Hardee, Manatee, Gulf, Putnam and Glades have the highest rates of fatalities and serious injuries.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Cars with more safety features will assist in reducing teen serious injury rates.
- Mark Allen said they are seeing the average age of new licensees is increasing which results in fewer young drivers on the road and older teens with less driving experience.
- Rural two-lane roads and more frequent speeding may be the contributing to higher crash rates in Florida's rural counties.
- David asked when will the fact sheet be available. Danny said we will make revisions based on today's feedback. Chris Craig said it should be available within a month.

Break/Lunch

Melissa reminded the coalition members that the meeting will reconvene at 1:00pm.

New and Emerging Technologies as Distractions

Dr. Wayne Giang, University of Florida, gave a presentation on new and emerging technologies as distractions while driving. He began the presentation by introducing background information on smart watches and their impact on driving distraction. Results of the study revealed that participants did not perceive smartwatches as more distracting or dangerous than smartphones however subjects were faster to check their notifications on smart watches and took longer to respond to their notification than a smart phone. During the study, drivers checking and responding to notifications on a smart watch kept their eyes off of the road for longer periods of time than those checking and responding to notifications on a smart phone. Both smart phone and smart watch users had slower braking response time. Dr. Giang's findings suggest the risk perception of using smartwatches while driving may not be well calibrated, and users of smartwatch applications should be cognizant about user glance behavior.

He then reviewed results of a distracted walking study. The study evaluated how a variety of different tasks impacted visual attention and balance. Dr. Giang said since 2015 the total number of ER visits associated with phone-related distracted walking increased 1.8 times. Phone related distracted walking injuries typically occur in public areas, stairs, and on the street and sidewalks. Dr. Giang's research determined through self-reporting that distracted walking also occurs in parking lots, plazas, hallways, and stairwells.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Carlos enquired whether Dr. Giang would be willing to share the findings of his research. Dr. Giang explained he would be willing to share but said some of the research has yet to be published. Melissa will follow up with Dr. Giang to determine the best way to distribute the information and other related publications.

Group Updates

Action Step 1.1.3 – Identify and Collaboration with other like-minded coalitions/organizations

Department of Education: Melissa reported FDOE oversees the driver education curriculum. The subcommittee made contact with a representative from DOE, met and created a first draft, and are currently refining the draft. Melissa said the state does not have benchmark to update the education curriculum. Nicole is working on the updates.

Florida Parent Teacher Association (PTA): Melissa noted after the last coalition meeting the subcommittee had a call with the PTA. The Florida Parent Teacher Association has agreed to engage with the FTSDC. FTSDC is coordinating with the PTA to share materials at parent nights for orientation and to bring speakers into the various schools.

Melissa said we can make sure this coalition to has a primary role in the PTA meeting next July.

Florida Managing Entities: Melissa explained the subcommittee oversees mental health, drug and abuse topics. Daphne Lampley leads this subcommittee and could not be at the meeting. Daphne has an appointment to have a conversation after Labor Day and provide an update at the next FTSDC meeting.

School Resource Officers (SRO) & Florida Department of Law Enforcement:

Andy Johnson said there hasn't been much progress related to SROs or the Florida Department of Law Enforcement due to challenges from COVID-19.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- What is the coalition looking for from FDLE?
 - The coalition is looking to designate and fill a spot for a liaison. Juanita said the discussion can be tabled for now as long as law enforcement is well represented.

Action Step 2.1.5 - Create and/or adapt need outreach and educational materials

Graduated Driver Licensing: Melissa reviewed the objective and group members of the GDL subcommittee. Following the last meeting, the subcommittee created a teen status a tip card for GDL best practices. The card has been approved by FDOT, it is being printed currently, and Melissa expects to have it in hand in the next two weeks.

Impaired Driving Subcommittee: Melissa noted there is nothing at a high level to report since the last meeting. The subcommittee created two tip cards focused on teen drinking and marijuana use, and one brochure geared toward parents to speak with their teen on underage drinking. All three materials have been printed and ready and available for distribution.

Distracted Driving Subcommittee: The subcommittee created a tip card focused on teen distracted driving. Melissa reviewed the tip card which highlights how to switch an iPhone and Samsung into do not disturb mode. The handout has been approved by FDOT, it is being printed currently, and Melissa expects to have it in hand in the next two weeks.

The legislative subcommittee has been collecting resource materials from other states. David noted the subcommittee has reached out to a Florida House representative regarding safety initiatives. The subcommittee will provide data support and changing language in the future legislation. Eric said he has some relationships with legislators and offered to help with the legislative subcommittee.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Subcommittee: Melissa reviewed two educational materials on simple steps to bicycle safety that the subcommittee has recently developed. Melissa presented a 11X17 bicycle and pedestrian poster. This document has been approved by FDOT, is being printed currently, and Melissa expects to have it in hand in the next two weeks.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Carlos said scooters and motorized bikes may present additional challenges in the future.
- Elise said recent legislation classified e-scooters as bikes. She said teens are one of the largest target audiences for e-scooters and the subcommittee should consider promoting e-scooter safety for teens.
- Larry said the bicycle and pedestrian subcommittee is currently discussing the inclusion of e-scooters. John Askins, Ginger Regalado, Larry Coggins, Carlos Sarmiento, and Taaka Fields Moore should follow up with all the subcommittee members on the topic during the next meeting. Janice Martinez offered to work with John on e-scooters.

Speed, Aggressive Driving, Drag Racing Subcommittee: Melissa said the subcommittee is currently focused on aggressive driving but will focus on drag racing in the future. The subcommittee created tip card which highlights best practices to avoid aggressive driving. Melissa said the subcommittee redesigned the back of the tip card to be more visually more appealing. The card has been approved by FDOT, it is being printed currently, and Melissa expects to have it in hand in the next two weeks.

Work Zone and School Zone Subcommittee: Melissa shared a poster related to School Zone safety. The poster highlights a new law which will increase the fines associated with illegally passing a school bus. The fines will increase as of January 1, 2021. The poster will be printed in FY 2020-21, will be available for Driver education classroom sessions and on the DMV website. There will be a social media campaign that highlights the School's-Open Drive carefully messages.

Commercial Motor Vehicle Subcommittee: Melissa shared a draft of a commercial motor vehicle (CMV) handout, emphasizing "no zones". The design has been approved by FDOT and should be printed and ready for distribution shortly.

Occupant Protection Subcommittee: Melissa shared the completed poster encouraging teens to wear their safety belts. The poster was created as part of a joint initiative with Teens in the Driver Seat. The poster has been approved by FDOT, has been printed, and is ready for distribution.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- David asked whether the Florida Occupant Protection Coalition (FOPC) has similar educational materials that his subcommittee can use or adapt.
 - The FOPC has an online [Occupant Protection Resource Center](#) that includes a variety of educational materials and other resources related to occupant protection. He will contact Leilani Gruener, FDOT, to discuss further.

Parent/Teen Safe Driving Guide: Melissa shared a recently developed Safe Driving rack card. She also presented a Safe Driving Guide geared towards teens and parents. The guide will also be an educational tool for students during school orientation. The rack card guide will be printed in FY 2020-21.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- State Farm issued a guide for parents. The coalition may want to review the contents of the guide and consider adapting it for use in their materials development.
- Matt mentioned including a cover photo with the proper hand positioning and try to add more diversity in the photos throughout the guide.

- Coalition members asked who the guide is intended to be shared with. Melissa said the document is for teens, parents and teachers. The guide can be included in the school orientation content.

Dormant Subcommittee Areas

Melissa noted the Aging Road Users and Motorcycles subcommittees as dormant subcommittee areas. Melissa said she hopes to create content that will highlight the laws for motorcycles. Melissa said she will get back to aging road user subcommittee at a later date. Melissa said all the approved resources are available on [FTSDC website](#). The materials are available online as PDF to download. Melissa will send a separate email on process of how to get the printed versions.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Juanita said FDOT is working on developing a website with all traffic safety educational materials and resources developed by FDOT for Florida's various safety coalitions and other partners.
 - Chris said they are working with the partners to develop the website. It is currently in the design phase and by the end of the year the website is expected to go live. The website will be very similar to [Occupant Protection Resource Center](#). The website will host all of the FDOT funded educational materials related to traffic safety. Users can log in and select the materials they want and where they would like them to be shipped.

Outreach Strategy – Progress Updates and Action Areas

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV): Melissa said the parenting safe driving folder will serve as an overarching tool toward teen driver safety education. Chris is still waiting to hear back from FLHSMV representative about accessing the database to receive new teen driver mailing data. The goal of the MOU would be to send the parent/teen driver folder out to that list.

School Orientation Packets: Melissa said the goal of the school orientation packet will be to be distributed at the Florida Department of Education and Florida PTA.

FL Chapter of American Academy of Pediatrics (FCAAP): Melissa said she developed partnership with the Florida Chapter of American Academy of Pediatrics, and they were receptive to helping the coalition get teen driver safety information in pediatrician offices.

Teen Driver Safety Week

Melissa mentioned that the following three activities were identified as priorities between this meeting and the following meeting and asked for volunteers who could support each of the activities in the next month and a half.

The Teen Driver Safety Week serves to educate teens, parents, caregivers and educators on the importance of staying focused while driving and putting down devices to ensure all teens Arrive Alive.

- Mark said they are working with schools to find alternatives to conduct driver education virtually. He will share some of these resources with the coalition.
