

Breaking Open the Word

First Sunday in Lent

In today's Gospel, we observe the Devil's plan of attack. The strategy is quite brilliant. He hones in on three of our greatest weaknesses: hunger, ego, and ambition. Just think about the times we've been "hangry," or even the insensitive way we use the phrase, "I'm starving." These are inconsiderate hyperbole and lousy attitudes that lead to spiritual malnutrition.

The devil also goes for our ego. We hear his whispers, "Go ahead. It's no one else's business. Whatever makes you happy! You're the only one that counts. If it feels good, do it! You're better than them." We indeed throw ourselves down when we heed these cursed words.

Finally, he aims for our inordinate desire to succeed. Again, the traps are laid before us in lies, "Life is a game, there will be losers-- who cares about the other person? That person knows nothing, you are entitled."

These are where the devil is most successful.

But the good news for us is that we always have in our arsenal, access to the same weapons of defense against these attacks that Jesus used: the word of God. At each temptation, at every dastardly whisper, at all the traps, we are able to deflect the devil and be just as victorious as Jesus was. As we begin our Lenten Journey, we ought to commit some effort to arm ourselves with the knowledge of Scripture. Whether we pick up an easy-to-read or scholarly work on Scripture; join a Bible-study group; or take a formal class online, there are many ways we can dive deep into the word of God and elevate our Lenten efforts.
