Bravo to our new Maid Jeanne d'Arc which we all know we will be able to count on to successfully lead us on our upcoming parade.

Krewe de Jeanne d'Arc rightfully highlights the extraordinary accomplishment of an ordinary woman. As residents of **La Nouvelle-Orleans - La - Nouvelle-Orleans**, every year we look forward to the feminine comparison of our city with Jeanne d'Arc. How her faith in her actions led to victory. Earlier this year New Orleans signed a sister city agreement with the City of Orleans. And true to the name of Jeanne d'Arc, it was a delegation of Krewe de Jeanne d'Arc that first represented our city and acted on this twinning agreement. Here you go Krewe de Jeanne leading the way once again for all us here in New Orleans!

But we are at the same time a bit like Charles VII not knowing what to do two months now from the official joining of Louisiana to the *Organisation Internationale de la Francophonie*. That news came pretty much out of nowhere like a gift from God. We don't quite know what to do with it or what will come out of it. But with that same sense of destiny that embodied Charles VII, we have that feeling that things will fall right into place.

I have been fortunate to work in the field of urban planning. Everyday I am reminded of the work that has been achieved to rebuild our city in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina and the work that remains to be done to make our city more equitable, more resilient.
