NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES!

The LLANO SECO UNIT reopened on November 2, 2015 after renovations over the summer. A formal grand opening ceremony will this winter occur for the public with family activities. The first platform was rebuilt to enhance wildlife viewing and increase access for disabled visitors. Other upgrades include a new ADA restroom, and a solar security light at the parking area. In addition, the second platform along the trail was replaced with an elevated earthen mound to view wildlife on the interior of the Unit. (see page 4.)

The Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge (Refuge) will be offering a variety of free weekend programs through the winter. The programs include birding tram tours, fly-offs, naturalist at the platform, owl prowls and more will be offered. New for this year will include a variety of activities for families and kids during the holiday break from December 19 - January 3.

A ltacal's Northern Saw-whet Owl (NSWO) monitoring project was up and running this Oct - Nov 2015 due to the resolve of new Research Foundation Reserve Director, Jamie Visinoni. She managed to work through the entanglement of problems from an earlier accident that closed the Reserve to research in the 2014 season. Our banding team was very excited to have Jamie and family see our project, now in its 10th year. We think daughter Izzy brought us a good number of owls that night and she got to



release three of them, naming one owl Crystal as she sent her off into the night.

We had an influx of talented new volunteers this season (Navit, Wyatt, Erika and Julie), and returning veterans (Steve, Sheila, Ken). We said


goodbye to right-hand-woman Raina King and volunteer Tyler (to Idaho), and on sabbatical (in Costa Rica!) Mike Fisher. Volunteer Ken Sobon brought his family and while we waited 2 hours for the first owl (followed by 5!), we were entertained by the Taurid meteor showers, lighting up a dark and starry sky, and Ken's kids, full of life and dreams, fun! Then the owls came, inspiring their creativity. This cool poster-art was the result of their encounter with owls.

These free and unique programs provide exciting opportunities for families to learn and experience some of the incredible and memorable things that the Refuge has to offer. On tram tours, a refuge guide will assist visitors with bird viewing and identification along the 6-mile auto tour. Come see and learn about the fly-off as thousands of ducks and geese fly off about 30 minutes after the sun sets.

Looking for something to do with the kids over the holiday break? Bring the whole family to the visitor center for educational opportunities! Learn to draw a duck or goose, sketch beaks and feet, make a journal and get information about the Junior Duck Stamp program. The Complex's new Junior Refuge Ranger booklet will be available for children to earn collector's cards featuring different animals or plants.

Banding

As of this article we are finishing up the season and have currently banded and released 40 NSWO, including one recapture from October 20, 2014. The recapture owl let us know that she had survived another year and uses the resources (rodents



and roosting sites!) on the Reserve and as a 2 year old, she survived her first year of life- the most difficult for any bird! Other captures include 2 new Western Screech Owls (WESO) and 3 Pallid Bats.

Volunteers are what makes the project work. This season they are Steve King, Sheila Frisk, Ken Sobon, Julie Newman, Navit Reid, Jo Arroyo, Wyatt Hersey, and Erika Iacona. Steve King, thank you for your generous donation for 4 new nets, and the new tooter, upgrading our broadcast level significantly! Sheila donated an lpad to upgrade the project picture taking capacity and bird related apps. Ken Sobon donated an iPod complete with NSWO toots and made a carrier for our new tooter. As of this letter we are in great standing with project and tech equipment. Thanks all!

Bird Walk and Birding Trip REPORTS

September 11-13, 2015

PT. REYES WEEKEND CAMPING TRIP

We all arrived at varying times at the Olema Campground and after chatting for a bit, we headed to the White House Pools trail to do a little birding before dark. It was a nice walk, not super birdy, but we did get a great look at a Merlin as it flew right over our heads. At the campground we got the adorable Pygmy Nuthatches, a couple of Hairy Woodpeckers, a Great Horned Owl and a large flock of noisy American Crows. The next day we got Yellow-headed, Brewers, and Tri-colored Blackbirds, several American Kestrels and a Northern Harrier on the way out to the Fish Docks. We stopped at the Historic B Ranch and picked up Horned Grebe, Yellow Warbler and a pair of Great Horned Owls that we showed to passers-by (when they stopped to ask what we were looking at) who were delighted to get such close-up views.

It was a foggy and windy day at the Fish Docks, but the birding was good - there were over 100 Elegant Terns flying around and most got to see Parasitic Jaegers dive-bombing and harassing the terns; a few of the Jaegers seemed to be much larger and were possibly Pomarine Jaegers. At the cypress trees we spent quite awhile trying to convince ourselves that we had a Pine Warbler, but it turned out to be a juvenile Yellow-Rumped Warbler that did not have a yellow rump (a professor who teaches Master Birding helped). Common Murres were seen in the bay and two were seen on land near the Dock House. Heerman's Gulls were joined by one or two **Bonaparte's Gulls**, and there were several **Pacific** Loons, Black Turnstones, a Red Phalarope and an Eared Grebe close to the docks. We took a walk out to Chimney Rock where we all got great looks at a couple of **Peregrine Falcons**. At the parking lot we watched a coyote pounce on and eat several gophers, mice or voles. We then ventured over to Drakes Bay to try for a Chestnut-sided Warbler that someone had told us about and guickly located it in a small flock of Yellow Warblers and a Common Yellowthroat. We also picked up Marbled Godwits, Sanderlings, Surf Scoters, and California, Western, and Ringbilled Gulls from the beach.

On Sunday we decided to head over to Abbott's Lagoon where we saw several **Red-tailed Hawks**, a **White-tailed Kite**, and **Bewick's Wrens**, and heard several **Wrentits** singing in the shrubs along the trail. At the Lagoon, we got to watch a female **Bobolink** foraging in the rushes close to the shore.

Close to the bridge, there were about 15 Red-necked Phalaropes with one Red Phalarope, along with a mixed flock of Semipalmated Plovers, a couple Black-bellied Plovers, Western Sandpipers and Sanderlings. Across the Lagoon we observed about 45 American White Pelicans joining the usual Brown Pelicans, and more Marbled Godwits with one Willet and one Black-necked Stilt.

It was a pretty laid back trip this year; we didn't even venture out to the Lighthouse because of the wind and fog, but we did enjoy more time hanging out at camp where we ate delicious potluck meals and BBQed Oysters, and birded from our camp chairs.

November 7, 2015

GRAY LODGE WILDLIFE AREA

group of twenty people showed up to explore the Gray Lodge Wildlife Area on this beautiful fall day. The mosquitos were about as bad as most of us had experienced there, but armed with bug repellent, we traversed the walking Wetland Loop Trail and then over to the viewing platform, before returning to parking lot #14 for lunch. Afterwards, many opted to also drive the 3-mile auto-tour loop.

Highlights of the trip included Varied Thrush, Virginia Rail, two Great-horned Owls, Peregrine Falcon, American Bittern, Wilson's Snipe, a good variety of ducks and geese, several American River Otters, and a good number of Sandhill Cranes

seen from the auto-tour loop. The latter is unusual for November at Gray Lodge according to the ranger. She said it was due to less water on the refuge this year. A total of 58 avian species were found.
